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#### .. 1955 ..

Lacking the ability to gaze into the crystal ball and prophesy what is in store for us in 1955, I will use up this space and look back over 1954 and review some happenings which I think portend good for the future.

One signifigant thing I noticed this past year among the dancers, was the growing habit of thanking each other for their pleasure, at the completion of a round of squares, Not too long ago, upon the last note of music, people would immediately leave the square, in which they had been dancing without a word to anyone. Now it is a minute or two before the floor is cleared, due to the exchange of pleasantries.

In the past it was not uncommon to hear folks making remarks about being "frozen out of a square". Contrary to that, folks are now inviting different couples to dance a square with them. In fact, some go so far as to have squares lined up as they would a partner. Some no doubt will frown on this practice, but after all you cannot deny the right of folks to dance with their acquaintances.

I have noted a desire among the dancers to slow down the pace. For a while it appeared that we were stepping up the

speed and no doubt we were.

The dancers are now demanding that most of the dances be called slow enough so they can smile, execute the figures with grace and dignity and when they get through a round not be beat out. They want to be looking forward to the next set and not dreading it. Some callers think they have to call at a speed of 138 to 148 to excite and please the dancers. The good callers know this is not true. A call can be given enthusiastically, exude plenty of personallity and if desired, with a challenge, better at 122 to 128 than at a faster tempo.

As the dance movement has revolved in its cycle, there have been other changes, most of them good, which I think will lead to more Fun and Happy Dancing in 1955. C.B.





Face your partner DO-SI-DO (8 counts)
(The above given before start of music.)

Now pick up the sides and promenade. (8 counts)

\*Its four by four and don't you blunder

\*The inside arch and the outside under.

And those same couples right and left thru. (8 counts)

\*Active couples step in the middle, face down, pick up the inactive couples on the side and walk down the floor five steps. Then the active couple raise inside hands to form an arch at the same time bringing the inactive couple thru under the arch. (as in the Ends Turn In, all come back) up the floor with partners two by two. Eight steps stepping out to the side lines in time to do the ladies chain.

Note: Allemande left may be used for the second figure and a Star figure used instead of the ladies chain for more experienced dancers. Stars and circle figures are very apt to put some of the 'new dancers' back into the wrong line. Also please note: When calling contras to new groups the caller should never fail to call 'Cross over at the head and foot' and 'now on the heads and the actives below'.

#### SQUARE DANCE IN NOVA SCOTIA.

Recently, while on a hunting trip in Nova Scotia, we attended one of the weekly square dances held at Cape Jack. We had heard much about the Canadian squares, but no one could satisfactorily explain the difference between their dances and ours. Here was an opportunity to observe first hand. The people happily told us we were in luck for the best of the area was to be had that evening. Winston Fitzgerald and his band would be on hand. Everyone agreed no one could outfiddle Winston, "I don't guess".

We went down the fine dance hall about nine thirty, which seemed to be the usual starting hour. The placed became packed with very nicely dressed folks. We felt a little conscious of our sport outfits.

Mr. Fitzgerald arrived with his crew in short order had tuned up the amplifier on his fiddle to suit the noise, sat down, and the dance was on.

The people formed their sets. There was no caller. In some sets, one man might try for awhile to keep everything orderly, but mainly they danced with fun in mind. It all looked very confused to us at the start, but as the evening wore on, we began to see the pattern.

Head couples would pass right and left through, and then everyone danced the polka (or waltz depending on what was being played). They'd pass back, and polka again. Gents swing the corner lady, and all polka'd. They'd swing their own and polka. There was a grand right and left, swing the opposite lady, do-ci-do, etc., but after each step, they danced awhile. We couldn't tell how many measures of the music were given to the dancing routine because the tunes were unfamiliar. We didn't see any twn sets doing any two steps in order, but there wasn't a constrained face to he seen. Everyone was out to have fun.

There wasn't a man in that hall that couldn't dance. They did slow polkas, hot ones, waltz polkas, and even Slavic type ones. That fast Midwestern Hayride step which so many of us watched in fascination on television here at home was common practice there. Some people danced that step in various tempos all evening. They employed a very comfortable armhold swing rather than our style in swinging their ladies. And were the people right, in our opinion, concerning Winston's fiddling? Man-for our money he couldn't be beat. The pianist, by the way, played all through, with her legs casually crossed, watching the dancers, hardly ever glancing at the keys. Mr. Fitzgerald played the entire evening sitting down. The whole was very interesting and enjoyable. Just one thing more which I tell about with some reluctance. To make the floor slippery they spread some kind of soap powder, and for awhile we were a pathetic, snuffling, sneezing, red-eyed hunch of characters. Please don't try it. LUCY UPHAM.







Now, Al claims that his Square Dance program has outgrown the Barn which was the original scene of his annual Summer Vacation School - now called the "Funstitute". Funstitute has now moved to the deluxe U.S. Thayer Hotel at West Point, N.Y. where Al and a hand picked staff now conduct two summer session each year.

The Country Barn, now under new management, still stands for high quality Square Dancing and will be open all year round with it's regular Saturday Night Square Dancing party. Travellers from out of State will always be welcomed in true Square Dance fashion and can dance to the calling of Jim Murray or Al's brother Bob while Al himself is away repaying the visits of his many guests of the past.


Ralph Page is calling this year for the annual CCRC dance on Jan. 29th. Eva Pride is general chairman for the affair.

Then back with the left and gon't you blunder.

Now shuffle around with the ones below.

- - - (Every other time "And on the heads and the actives below").

Pick up the sides and promenade.

#### EXPLANATION:

- 1. Active couples step into the center, face down, pick up the people below and march 8 steps down the hall.
- 2. All march backward 8 steps.
- 3. Active couple will go down the center 6 steps and turn in their own tracks on 7th and 8th steps.
- 4. The inactive couples close in and form a tunnel of arches through which the active couple will come back through.
- 5. As soon as the active couple is but from under" the arch made by the inactive they make a star figure with that same couple.
- All DO-SI-Dp partners.
- 7. To "shuffle" all gents take both hands of the ladies and by pushing the ladiesbackward, the gents slide by each other back to back and into line again. Active couples moving down and inactives moving up one place.


This action is like a shuffle in a deck of cards. Thus the cast off is put into effect.


Howie Davison of Newcastle, Me., called for the Shrewsbury S.D.C. recently and the folks attending reported a very enjoyable evening.

## Are You Guilty

of any of these eight bad habits in square dancing?




- Do you jerk and jump on your allemande left? Just a smooth "floating" turn with your corner holds far less risk and saves the liniment for more necessary injuries.
- Do you hold the left hand of your right hand lady all during the half-sashay and full sashay in the allemande "A"? Hanging was outlawed decades ago — release joined hands at the start of the half-sashay and travel alone.
- Do you always box the gnat or try a dishrag loop on the double turnbacks from a grand right and left? It's O.K. if the caller asks for such acrobatics. Otherwise, a simple hand swing is the ticket.
- 4. Do you jerk arms while balancing, or bax the gnat and flea while turning in the "Alamo" style allemande? If the caller wants some boxing of the gnat and flea, he'll call it that way. Hand swings and smooth balancing make for a highly satisfactory "Alamo."
- Do you twirt your partner into an allemande left or a ladies chain? It sure slows up the team and messes up the flow of the dance.
- 6. Do you twirl each lady as she comes to you on a grand right and left? If so, you're just a big, ol' "show-off" and certain to rate as a pest with the fair sex but quickly!
- 7. Do you "back-lash" your lady into a swing at the end of a promenade? This is a pet peeve with many really good dancers because it looks like heck, takes up too much time and often results in an uncomfortable or embarrassing situation.
- 8. Do you turn your lady into a whirling dervish by twirling her constantly during a promenade? Someone once soid that a lady had just so many twirls in her system. Do you want to make her run short before her time?

You'll be a better, smoother and more popular square dancer if you'll observe the "3 C's" of dancing:



Heavy snow storms between Lincolns and Washingtons birthdays interfered with many square dances making rescheduling necessary in many cases. From now on the weather should get better and better.



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

Those of us who were priveleged to call him friend were enriched by his warm personality and modest demeanor. We instinctively recognized his qualities of leadership and magnetic influence, not because of any show of fanfare on his part, but his gentle way of leading us over the rough ways encountered in life.

The countless number of young people whom he has taught not only the art of square and folk dancing and calling, but other valuable activities cannot but be better people because of his guidance. His passing from this world was symbolic of his living, leaving without ado, but his spirit is stronger than even he realized. It will always live with us, and will continue in the life that remains to guide us.

He instilled into those with whom he came into contact, the desire to be better people, because of his own exemplary conduct. He could thus be called "a builder".

This thought is better expressed by Longfellow's poem "The Builders" than any words of mine.

In the elder days of Art,
Builders wrought with greatest care
Each minute and unseen part;
For the Gods see everyhere

Let us do our work as well Both the unseen and the seen. Make the house, where Gods may dwell, Beautiful, entire, and clean.

Else our lives are incomplete, Standing in these walls of Time, Broken stairways, where the feet Stumble as they seek to climb.

Build today, then, strong and sure, With a firm and ample base; And ascending and secure Shall tomorrow find its place.

### NEW ENGLAND FOLK FESTIVAL

The Eleventh Annual New England Folk Festival on April 1,2,&3 was every bit as exciting and enjoyable as we had expected. So much goes onat one of these affairs that a three-ring circus seems dull by comparison, and one would have to be at least twins to take it all in.

We started in with supper on Friday night, eighteen different nationality groups served their foods during the Festival, and even in three meals there wasn't time to sample everything. Italian pizza, Chinese egg-rolls, Scottish meatpies, and shortbreads, English brandy "curls" and fig-tarts, Syrian nightingale's nests, and many, many more clamored to be tasted. Maybe sometime we should have a festival just for eating.

The crafts exhibit was handled this year by the Lexington Arts and Crafts Society, which set up their booths as an Old English village, in which the craftsman of nine guilds- metal, ceramics, leather, needlework, painting, chip-carving, rugs decorating, and weaving-made and displayed their specialities. Some of these were on sale, and that the people attending the Festival appreciated them was attested by the tooled leather belts, and earrings, ceramic and metal jewelry, and the like which were soon being worn by folks all over the Festival. This fine crafts exhibit was enhanced by Ada Page's unusually good display of folk costumes, musical instruments, books, records and so on, which added much to the atmosphere of the exhibit area.

During the three sessions on Fri. & Sat., 44 leaders called for general square, contra, or folk dancing in the main and side halls. Joe Perkins was MC for Fri. evening's program, Howard Schultz (N.H.) for Sat. afternoon, and Ralph Page for Sat. evening. During the three programs ll groups demonstrated American square and contra dances and 10 others the dances of other countries, the 21 together showing the righ and varied folk dance adivities of N.E. There were three choral groups, four folk singers, and four pipers to complete the programs, which were preceded, interspersed, and followed by general dancing. Over 3000 people attended the three sessions, and their enjoyment of the colorful, many faceted folk activities was well summed up by a woman who was overheard saying, "Isn't it wonderful? I came to my first Festival last year, and now I wouldn't miss them."

Roger Pinard, chairman of the music committee, produced the best orchestra we've, heard in the Il years of the Festival. A musical innovation this year was the inclusion, as a definite part of the program, of an hour and a half's folk-sing between the Sat. afternoon and evening sessions. This had been tried on an informal, experimental basis last year. This year, with



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

Oleson of the Univ., who served for several years as treasurer of Loy's festivals. The N.E.F.F.A. in Boston has arranged for demonstration groups to appear at the Memorial Dance Festival. As arrangements are completed by the committee, further announcements will be made. It is expected that Wilbur Waite's orchestra of Florence, Mass. will furnish the music. Contributions to the scholarship fund have already been offered by several folk dance groups. The committee announces that contributions may be made the night of the festival, which in the event of rain, will be held the following evening, Saturday, July 16.

Invitations to call have been sent to New England's outstanding callers. It looks like a lineup never before achieved in the history of New England Square Dancing.



Position: Open, facing LOD, inside hands joined. Directions: For man, woman does counterpart.

#### Part 1.

Meas.

1-2 Step L, Brush R, Step R, Brush L, Step L, Brush R, Step R, Brush L, (Starting with outside foot, step fwd L brush R to outside, Step on R and brush L to inside, step fwd on L brush R to outside, step on R brush L to inside).

3-4 Two Step Turn, L/R, L, Two Step Turn R/L,R. (Turning away from each other (M,L face, W R face) Partners make individual turn to end facing RLOD).

5-8 Repeat measures 1-4 going in RLOD starting step on inside foot and brushing to inside. End by assuming closed dance postion, M's back to center.

#### Part II.

9-12 Two Step Turn, L/R,L, Grapevine, Side R, Back L, Side R, Touch L—LOD, Two Step Turn L/R,L, Grapevine, Side R, Back, L, Side R, Touch L, RLOD (In closed dance position, two step  $\frac{1}{2}$  turn CW so that M is facing center and grapevine Right in LOD, Then repeat two step  $\frac{1}{2}$  turn and grapevine Right in RLOD).

13-14 Slow Rock L, Slow Rock R, Grapevine, Side L, Back R, Side L, Touch R, (Partners facing in closed position, M's back to center. Man rocks back on L, fwd on R, then does grapevine to L. Woman does counterpart). LOD.

15-16 Slow Rock R, Slow Rock L, Grapevine, Side R, Back L, Side R, Touch L (Same as in measures 13-14 but M rocks fwd on R, back on L, and does grapevine to R in RLOD).

Repeat dance for a total of four times and end with slight bow facing LOD with outside foot in point towards partner.

#### SOUTH SHORE HORNPIPE

As called by - HERBIE GAUDREAU Record: Any good Hornpipe

1-3&5 and every other couple cross over exchanging places with partner before start of dance to become active.

Everybody forward and back (This call given before start of music.)

Active couples fwd. & Swing And everybody promenade Down the center Now come right back two by two that same way too. Come right back \*Cast off to a on that same track right hand star Now star with the left the other way back. Then right and left across the floor Right and left back a little bit more And everybody fwd. and back.

\*The cast off done in this dance is a single file cast off. The active couples when coming back from the promenade will let go of their partners hand, have the inactives trailing them. In the case of the active gent he will have a lady trailing him, he making a right turn steps into the vacancy left by the inactive lady, and the inactive lady steps into the vacancy left by the active gent. In the case of the active lady, she being followed by an inactive gent, makes a left turn stepping into his original position.

\*\* Every other time caller should give call, "Cross over at the head" and "Cross over at the foot" if even couples.

#### PROF. L. V. LOY OF UNIV. OF MASS, HEART VICTIM AT 47.

Professor Lawrence V. Lov. 47 extension specialist in community organization and recreation and known throughout New England for his leadership in recreational activities, was stricken by a heart attack in his Pokeberry Ridge home and died shortly after arrival at Cooley Dickinson Hospital.

Mr. Lov - "Larry" to thousands of college students and Amherst residents, had joined the faculty of Mass., State College - now the University of Mass., in September of 1936.

He was born on December 14, 1907 in Bancroft, Kan., son of Verne Lov and the late Mrs. Grace Lov. He was graduated from Iowa State College with a bachelor's degree in 1928 and three years later earned a master of science degree at the same institution.

Mr. Loy held positions as teacher of social science and mathematics and leader in scout work at Thompson High School, Thompson, Ia., in 1928 and 1929, and director of intramural athletics at Ames Senior High School, Ames, Ia., from 1929 to 1935.

Before coming to the Univ. of Mass., he was an assistant in rural organization in the Iowa Extension Service. As extension specialist in recreation at the state university,

Mr. Loy traveled through all New England states, developing state and community recreation programs. His work associated him with both youth and adult groups, including Boy and Girl Scouts, 4-H Clubs, Grange organizations, Parent-Teacher associations, churches and farm bureaus.

As a trained recreation leader, Mr. Loy used to say, "Community recreation means activities for young and old. Too many people get the idea that recreation means major

sports. Every good recreation program should be planned for the entire community." During World War II Mr. Loy made good this statement by

taking community recreation to servicemen. He was flown to Newfoundland as a recreation instructor. His work was sponsored jointly by the U.S.O. and the American Red Cross.

His work was especially popular with young people, For several years he conducted training classes for the leaders of the Youth Hostels. This work included training of leaders who were later visiting Europe., to aid in reconstruction of Youth Hostels there. Word of Larry's leadership ability was nation wide. He

served on the faculty of the New England Rural Church Worker's conference at Ocean Park, Me. He conducted recreational training courses at Jackson's Mill, W. Virginia and for the North Carolina Recreation Commission.

During his latter years at the University, Mr. Loy was also in charge of the Young Men and Women's programs for the

Cooperative Extension Service. Folk and square dancing was his hobby. Here again he be-

came an expert caller and has recorded several albums of square dance records for Victor, MGM and the Columbia studios. Mr. Loy was the prime mover in the annual Country Dance Festival held at the University of Mass., each summer. Some years this Festival drew as high as 5,000 people. This year, the 10th, will be a memorial festival to Mr. Loy

and his leadership work in recreation. Net proceeds from this year's festival will be added to proceeds of other years and the total will be turned into memorial scholarships to send worthy students of the University to folk dance schools or to be used for other worthy causes in promoting square dancing and folk dancing. 5

#### AN EDITORIAL

In the June issue of "The New England Caller", the first public announcement was made of a proposed, Atlantic Square Dance Convention. The proposal, in the past thirty days has become firm and a group of interested dancers have incorporated, under the laws of the Commonwealth of Mass., to enable them to sponsor such an affair in an efficient manner.

The sponsoring group is made up primarily of dancers. There are a few callers among the group, but they are in no way professionals. They are folks who are dancers first and calling is incidental. The fact is, the group individually has no axe to grind. They stand to win neither money or glory only a lot of hard work. Their highest concern is a proper showcase for the whole of the square dance activity, along the eastern seaboard.

To make this first Atlantic Square Dance Convention a success, the sponsoring group are going to need the cooperation of every dancer and leader on the east coast. Every caller should plan his program for next fall around the Convention and leave November 11 & 12th free. The least interference possible, the better insurance there will be of success, especially within a radius of 100 miles of Boston, the convention site.

The square dancer for the past 12 years has been looking for a spot where they can show off their accomplishments to the best advantage. In spite of the good intentions of some organizations, this has not been possible. The program at this point is not complete, but is planned to make it comprehensive, enough so to include all phases of what is termed, American Folk Dancing and European Folk Dancing.

The eastern seaboard abounds with nationally recognized Callers and Teachers in both fields. They, with the cooperation of every dancer who can attend, should make the Atlantic Square Dance Convention the biggest event of its kind ever held in these parts. With just a little push from all, Boston, November 11 & 12th will see a spectacle never before experienced in the Hub.

Warren Bros., who will do the top finish states they can do that end of it in three days, and that a special top  $l\frac{1}{2}$  inches thick, something entirely new is going to be used. This should make it one of the smoothest outdoor surfaces that has been used for dancing.

Three of the dances June 18-25 & July 4 were cancelled but the P.T.C. is still going to have theirs July 2nd as planned, making it a street dance like it used to be in the past before the Wharf was used.

Dear Editor:

A year ago we were dairy farmer's with a herd of contented cows. The farmer and his wife, however, were not so contented - hence the decision to sell the cattle, and the problem of what to do with an empty barn. No square dancer would be surprised at our solution, what else, but the Bay Path Barn for square dancing. Today no self-respecting cow would give it a second glance.

The reason for our choice of a name for the barn lies in a bit of local history. Our farm is typical New England with outcroppings of ledge, a spring fed pond and stone walled fields. While the barn is relatively new, result of a fire some thirty years ago, our home is much older.

It was the discovery of axe-hewn beams; of chestnut floor boards, some of them 21 inches wide; and of heavy plank panelling hidden behind laths and plaster that excited us to investigate the history and age of our house.

First, we found that at one time the farm had been owned by the Town of Boylston and had been known as The Boylston. Town Farm, there was even a "tramp room", with seperate entrance. Going further into local history we were amazed to learn that the main part of the house was built about 1730, over 200 years ago. We came upon some very fascinating names, such as Apron Hill which bounds one side of our 100 acres, and finally The Old Bay Path. This was the original road traveled by the early settlers in 1630 as they moved westward toward Springfield to establish new farmsteads. Our narrow old lane which we have followed many a time thru the weeds, crossing the break, and edging the pond to emerge at our front door is this historic Old Bay Path.

Chet and I are very grateful for the encouragement we have received from so many people, both callers and dancers. The gifts to the Barn from square dance clubs and individuals have made it possible for many things which we could not provided for many years. We are especially appreciative of the





# CONTRA

#### FRENCH FOUR

I have been asked many times for a contra which is different yet simple. In response to these requests, I recommend the following, taken from, Thirty Contras, from New England by DUD BRIGGS, which should be a part of every callers, "stock in trade". Herbie Gaudreau.

Formation: 1st, 3rd, 5th and every other couple are active but do not exchange places.

Record: Glise A Sherbrooke F#1140 MH#1073 Calls

- (X) Active couples go forward and back
- (1) - - Cross right over, below one couple
- - - Active couples forward and back
- (2) - Cross right over and up to place
- - Down the center, you're doing fine
- (3) - Turn by yourself and keep in time - - - Cast off, and a right and left
- (4) Right and left across the hall

Now right and left back and hear the call --- (X)

French four is easy both on the mind, and the feet; yet it is graceful and fun to do.

- (X) This call is given before the dancers begin.
- (1) The active couples, 1st, 3rd, etc., take four short steps forward, "bobbing a bow" on the fourth, and four steps back into line. Then the step forward again on the ninth count and, passing right shoulders, cross right over into the partners place. Without pausing they pass through the line, turn down toward the foot of the set, passing one person only, they step into place in the opposite line. 16 counts.
- (2) They have no rest here, however, for they arrive here just in time to step forward and back again, bowing as before; and then cross over to the original side, passing partners by right shoulders, step through the line, to the outside, face up the set, walk past one person and drop into place right where they started from. Both (1) and (2) each take 16 counts to do. (3) The active couples go down the center and back, and cast off with the person below in the usual way with an arm-around cast off, 16 counts.
- (4) Right and left over and back with the one above. Couples rest out once at the ends, then dance the opposite part.

#### THE KOBROCKS OF NEWTONVILLE, MASS.

The writer suggested a write up of the Kobrock dancing couple, popularly known as Isabelle and John, as the first in The New England Caller series of sketches of New England dancing personalities. Both shy away from publicity and the answer I received was a flat "no". Yet their names slip into the news frequently because of their dancing travels and activities. For instance, the



June New England Caller's National Convention Sidelights mentioned, "John and Isabelle Kobrock of Newtonville, present and doing their good job as ambassadors of good-will. When not on the main convention floor dancing fast western squares, they could be found in the Mirror Room, which was wholly devoted to the dancing of Rounds", and Bill Chattin's Albany (N.Y.) District News in the July Caller, "Seeing John and Isabelle Kobrock from Newtonville, Mass., dancing and in attendance at the National Convention was like a letter from home, such swell people whether in Oklahoma or some place back home. I am very much in favor of the Eastern Convention of theirs." This couple known and their friendship is cherished by many from coast to coast. Their work in connection with the Atlantic Square Dance Convention in Boston brings them into the limelight.

My friendship with this couple stems from a dance I called on the black top at Scituate in August 1950. After the Black Hawk Waltz, this couple approached me and asked, "What dance was that?" From this comes their intense interest in American rounds and my own valued friendship with Isabelle and John. Their earlier instruction on squares and contras was at the "Drop In Nights" with Louise Chapin at the Country Dance Society in 1948 and 1949, and my own classes at the Boston YM after the Scituate dance.

John, an electrical engineer, served the Bell Telephone System on engineering and administrative work for 38 years. He retired from the position of General Plant Engineering Supervisor of the New England Telephone & Telegraph Co., in 1949. He is a member of several engineering, economic and other organizations, and has served them in many official and committee capacities-for instance, Past President of the Engineering Societies of New England, Past Chairman of the Boston Section American Institute of Electrical Engineers. Past Chairman Industrial Development Committee of the New Council, etc. His business and professional activities

his biography in the Who's Who - Engineering, Mass., New England and the East. He is bringing his organization experience over to the Atlantic Convention of which he is Executive Chairman, From 1941 to 1946 Isabelle was particularly active in Red Cross and USO work. John acted as MC and Isabelle as Senior Hostess at the Temple Place USO Boston two nights a week during this period. Both Isabelle and their daughter were active at the Buddies Club on Boston Common and Temple Place service centers. Their son served as a junior officer in the Navy in the South Pacific during the war. Isabelle and John are members of one New Hampshire and four Massachusetts square dance groups. Neither one is a caller. John served two terms as President of the Blue Hill Promenaders. He is now serving several dance groups invarious capacities. This couple's activities cover a wide range. For instance, John in past years has served as editor of the camp newspaper at the annual New England Square and Folk Dance Camp of which the writer is the Director. He will again do so this year.

This couples unselfish devotion to helping others in the square dance field is now paying dividends in the support that is volunteered, both in New England and elsewhere, to the Atlantic Convention. One of the newspapers in reporting the Brockton Fair stated - "Scores of spectators watching the Blue Hill Promenaders strut their square dancing skill Thursday were impressed by a white-haired and very distinguished looking couple. Everyone thought the two were very graceful and throughly relaxed as they went through the figures. The two who caused the comment are John and Isabelle Kobrock of Newtonville, who are highly regarded by all who know them as the first lady and gentleman of square dancing in this section. Every beginner coming in contact with them has reason to feel grateful because they have made them feel so welcome and so much at ease in the set. These gracious people devote themselves to helping others and they have more time than most because John is a retired engineer".

Among the sources from which I have obtained my dancing information for this sketch is an article in the Pioneer Courier, a publication of the Telephone Pioneers of America. For me personally, it has been a pleasure to write this New England Caller sketch.





#### HOW'S THE ATLANTIC CONVENTION COMING? Questions heard from quite a few persons are such as

these - "How is the Convention organized?" etc. Recognizing the "dryness" of Convention operating mechanics, replies will be very brief. Twenty one outstanding leaders in 10 Eastern states have accepted membership on the Advisory Committee. This Committee will help solve policy questions where answers are doubtful. The detail work of preparing for and handling the Convention has been divided into six major classifications, each with its general chairman. Each broad class can be broken down into its component parts with committee handling the specific parts. For instance, under the general class "Convention Housing" are included such items as decorations, check rooms, lounge, dressing rooms, rehearsal rooms, information boards, exhibit booths, conference rooms, acoustics, electrical equipment, PA systems. ushers, police coverage, food and many other items. The General Chairman of the major divisions are: Caller & Dancer Housing - (Mrs.) Barbara Baldwin, Foxboro. a member of two dance clubs and actively interested in both squares and rounds. She has served her clubs in several capacities. Convention Housing - Bob Johnson of Quincy, a member of one club and one callers assn. He does some calling and in recent months has worked particularly with children groups. Dance Program - Ginger Brown of Medway, a member of three dance clubs and one caller's assn. She is interested in all forms of dancing and has acted as Choreographer for the Contraband, an exhibition group that has shown at festivals in Ill., N.J., N.Y., and Mass. Printed Program -Lou Brown of Medway, a member of three dance groups and one callers assn. His interest lie in all forms of dancing. Public Relations - Carl Chace of Easton, a member of two dance clubs. Is interested in squares, contras and rounds. Registration - Walter Reid of Allston, a member of five dance clubs and one callers assn. Is interested in folk, rounds, contras and squares. Has served several club in various capacities. Although several of the chairmen belong to a callers assn., none are so called "professional callers."

One of the largest committees will be the Hospitality Comm., under the Public Relations classification comprising about 60 couples with Dr. & Mrs. O. C. Williams of Brighton as Co-Chairmen. So far about 200 questionaires have been returned by callers in 20 states. Most of the comments in this response are highly encouraging. Approximatley 11,000 descriptive circulars have been requested for distribution to their dancers. Although the circulars have just been placed in the mail, registrations are already coming in. Early registration is advisable. The dance program is under development and its details will be released later. JOHN P. KOBROCK.

When dancing with a Connecticut Club, we (The Do-Si-Doers) danced the following contra to Dick Forscher's calling. He did not know the name, but we liked it as a simple contra--so give it to you here.

1st, 3rd and every other couple cross over.

(Ahead of the music) Circle left with the couple below

The other way back I told you wrong

Right hand star with the couple below

Left hand back and don't be slow

Active couples down the outside

Turn around when you get below

Come on back on the same old track and down the center

four you go

The ends turn in and duck right under Move right back up to place and circle four to the left.

Explanation:

As you go down the center, four in line, the person on each end of the line turns in toward the center of the line and ducks under the raised hands of the center couple. (Same as in "Ends turn in"). The couple ducking under will be facing up the set and will meet a new couple facing down the set. These four will join hands and move in this formation back up the set. They are then ready to start the figure again.



#### Dear Editor:

I have lately been disturbed about the fact that our large annual open dances, folk festivals, and the like often miss the boat in attracting more new people to square and folk dancing as a recreational activity. Therefore, I am indulging myself in one of those "letters to the editor"

My observations have been that many times the newcomers and the just-plain-curious who come to these big affairs go away impressed not with the fact that square dancing is a lot of fun, but that it is a lot of work.

I suggest that such city-wide, sectional, and state-widefestival type or annual dances are essentially one-night-stands and must be programed accordingly. While the majority of those in attendance may be experienced dancers, I feel that the material presented should be carefully selected so that those folks with limited or no experience can participate without danger of embarassment.

It seems to me that we, who are interested in square dancing as a recreation, have a big job of public relations and public education to do. At open, well advertised events such as these big affairs, we have an excellent opportunity to 'win friends and influence people'; by emphasizing, not the complexities of square dancing, but the beauty and simplicity of it.

One of the most damaging and erroneous objections to square dancing that I hear from the misinformed is that "you have to practice a long time before you can do it.' Such may be true in a situation where a closed group is bent on mastering a particularly challenging figure for their own amazement. However, a one-night-stand is a different story.

To my mind, the most fundamental attribute of square dancing is that virtually anyone can do it--and enjoy it--merely by

presenting himself on the floor with a smile and a partner, as long as (1) he is welcome, (2) the music is right, and (3) the calls and figures are elementary. If we wish to promote square dancing on this basis. I think it is a grave mistake to expect first timers to perform dance patterns at a festival which, as has happened, experienced dancers have had to try out in their private groups in advance of the big event. Beginners caught. in such a situation, with the cards stacked against them, may never come back.

I feel that the basic appeal of square dancing has been is, and will be its ease of performance, naturalness, and universality. plus a tradition of good music -- a basic appeal rooted in its value as a wholesome, neighborly form of rhythmical relaxation as opposed to demanding physical dicipline full of tensions and split-second timing.

Many callers have unwittingly furthered this, what I consider, unfortunate misconception of square dancing by instituting "classes" or "courses" and thereby creating false barriers and discrimination among dancers, not to mention spreading the idea that this form of activity has to be worked at and learned the hard way.

Don't get me wrong--of course, there is a place for high level and club dancing, but I will venture a guess that such will prosper only as long as square dancing is left with the people and not to a select handful of so-called "graduates". For square dancing is essentially a form of folk expression in America, and unless it is presented as such, I am afraid that the highly refined by-products, such as club dancing, advanced classes, competitions, etc., -- it will wither on the vire. Baseball is our national game, but those who have studied the problem fear that unless the nation's youth continue to choose up sides on the local sandlot, the future of the Big Leagues is in jeopardy.

There should be nothing "exclusive" about square dancing, in my opinion, any more than citizenship, or whistling "Dixid" or sitting under a tree are restricted to a favored few. Square dancing is, and should be, one of the most practical, manifestations of the theory of democracy. Yet, it can, and often does, deteriorate into one of the snobbiest and most undemocratic at large festival dances purporting to welcome the public.

At dances such as these open, one-shot affairs, I am convinced that we leaders and teachers have a responsibility to help insure that the most of the people leave the hall with the right feeling, -- a feeling of having participated in a pleasurable stimulating, and friendly activity, rewarding not only from its sensation of matching simple movements with famila; music, but also from the social and physchological standpoint of being with other folks and liking them. Too often I have seen would-be dancers leave the floor, frustrates, self conscious, disillusioned, just plain mad, or generally unhappy. Why? Mainly because a thoughtless caller has confused what is actually a one-night-stand with a hopped-up demonstration of specialized skills.

Let's leave the fancy dancing for our private groups and bring it to festivals as exhibitions only. At any rate, if we must perform advanced figures at large, open dances, let's tell unsuspecting novices what is coming while they still have time to gracefully take a seat and watch. Above all, let's not lure them onto the floor under the pretense that here comes a good old easy-does-it American square dance and then throw in the clutch on them. TED KOHLER.





STATE OF MAINE

They say, no news is good news, and right now there seems to be very little square dance activity or news around the state. The summer season has just ended and folks are getting back to routine schedules. The limited amount of square dancing that has been present in Maine in the past appears to be withering on the vine to a very small group in widely scattered areas, with emphasis on simple beginner squares and contras and little or no round dancing, much the same as it has been over the past few years with very few exceptions.

One thing we need in Maine is a callers and leaders association, one with some life, activity and teeth in it; a progressive program and ideas to aid one another mutually, setting up basic training systems and common goals and common definitions for square dancer, square dancing, and all the terms that are used, and some means of improving some of the callers. Some and many kinds of standards could and should be set.

Checking percentages of folks square dancing in Maine, shows a really sad picture. We have approximately a million in population. Of this, we have one thousand, or one-tenth of one percent square dancing. Those dancing at the





#### ALBANY AREA NEWS.







NEWLYWED'S REEL (An original dance by Ted and Jean Sanella)

As called by Ted.

Alternate couples active - do not cross over.

Right to your partner, left to the next and balance four in line (gents facing down and ladies facing up the set)

Turn on your left, go twice around.

(Active couple drop right hand and turn twice by the left like a left allemande)

Ladies up the center and the gents go down

(Active ladies walk up center, towards the caller while active gents walk down center single file) Turn right around and the same way back.

Meet your own with a left hand around (complete turn) and swing your opposite up and down.


(Finish the swing with each gent putting the lady on his right and facing the opposite line. At this point, the active couples have progressed but are on the wrong side.) Cross through the couple above.

9-10 BALANCE FORWARD; BALANCE BACK; WALTZ AWAY; WALTZ TOGETHER; (Bal fwd on Lft, touch R toe beside L ft, hold one count; bal bwd on R ft, touch L toe beside R ft, hold one count; start L ft and take one waltz step fwd and diag to L of LOD away from partner, L-R-close on L; start R ft and take one waltz step fwd and diag to R of LOD twd partner, R-L-close on R, to end with partners facing and taking closed dance position M's back twd center.)

13-16 BALANCE BACK; WALTZ; WALTZ; TWIRL; (Bal bwd on L ft and hold two counts; starting fwd on R ft, toeing out, take two waltz steps making one full R face turn while progressing slightly in LOD, R-L-close on R, L-R-close on L; W then makes one complete R face twirl under her own R and M's arm with three steps, L-R-L, as Mtakes three steps in place, R-L-R, ending with partners, taking open dance position, inside hands joined, both facing in LOD, ready to repeat dance.

Repeat entire dance six times, ending with partners bowing deeply to each other.



Most of the callers seem to have some children's groups, This can be hard work at times, but it is very rewarding to the caller if he has plenty of patience, good nature and the ability to command the respect of the group without spoiling the children's fun in the dance. This is where you really learn to teach because the kids will usually do what you tell them, and if you tell them wrong, they won't correct your mistakes and automatically do the right thing as adults who have been dancing for a while, will often do.




The annual meeting of the NHFF is planned for Oct. 30, in the Boscawen Town Hall, all members should attend to elect officers and to dance.





#### AROUND BOSTON

She hoped that we could profit from the earlier English experience, and it seems, from the way in which many of our leading callers havebeen urging simplification these past few months, that her hopes may be fulfilled.

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

## " CALLER TIPS."

Square dancing has the reputation of being FUN and there is no law which restricts the Caller from having FUN along with the dancers. In fact the dancers will enjoy themselves even more if they know the caller is also having a good time.

There are many ways a caller can make the dancers feel he is one of them. Call with spirit and enthusiasm, not as if it were a chore or you are doing the dancers a favor by being present. A light hearted chuckle thrown in between calls and patter will help. A witticism properly placed here and there is good. Capitalize on a situation such as a person going the wrong way in crossing over to swing the opposite. Don't point or name the person, just remark, "a compass or map would be handy for some folks," or some other apropos remark. Turn a joke or remark on yourself to prove you too can take it.

Don't let your calls give the impression that you are a drill sergeant, Let swing and rhythm predominate.

Relax your face and in case the dancers do look up, which they do plenty of times while dancing, smile, with a twinkle in your eye and you would be surprised what a "wink" will get you.

Whether you use a hand or stand mike, let your whole body be relaxed. Pat your foot, wave your arms, just so long as every move you make is in rhythm with the music.

Be alive, act alive. If the dancers want an inanimated caller they can have it at any time by dancing to records with calls. Have Fun. G. B.

#### THE ATLANTIC SQUARE DANCE CONVENTION

The first Atlantic Square Dance Convention in Boston, Mass., is now a matter of history. Official greetings were extended by Mayor Hynes of Boston, Governor Herter and Senator Saltonstall of Massachusetts. The two day attendance was between 5,000 and 6,000. The dancers enjoyed themselves according to their own choice of square, folk or round dancing at any time of the day or evening. Original dances at the convention were introduced by their originators publicly for the first time, including dances by Rose Zimmerman of New York City, Howie Davison of New Castle, Maine, Dad Brundage of Danbury, Conn., Ed Gilmore of Yucaipa, Calif., Al Brundage of Brookfield, Conn., Pancho Baird of Santa Fe, New Mexico and others. Several new recordings were also introduced at the Convention. Music in the evening in Neptune Hall (the largest hall used) was furnished by the Pioneer Square Dance Recording Orchestra, of Connecticut.

The opening event each evening was a mass exhibition by the Massachusetts clubs jointly with "Hello" as a greeting to the visiting square dancers. The exhibition groups included the Trained Seals of Pittsburgh, Pa., with Rickey Holden calling, Foot 'N Fiddle Square Dance Club of Arlington, Va., with Pat Paterick calling, the Rock Candy Workshop from Long Island, New York with Paul Hunt calling, the Wheel-a-Capers of Boston with Dick Delery calling and the 48 Girl Scouts program sales girls-the Programettes with Rose-Lee Magee calling.

The program ranged all the way from conferences and panel discussions to simple question and answer periods on such subjects as Teaching Techniques, Music, Program Design, Club Activities, etc. The Arnold Bakers, Inc. of Port Chester, N.Y. awarded four \$250 scholarships to four callers for attendance at the 5th National Convention in San Diego next June. These were selected by the dancers at the Convention. The scholarships were won by Al Brundage of Brookfield, Conn., Dick Doyle of Milton, Mass., Earl Johnston of Rockville, Conn., and Warren Popp of North Abington, Mass. A show of hands on the last night indicated an unanimous desire for a repeat performance a year from now.

Next years Convention, same location, October 12& 13, 1956.

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

#### Dear Editor:

I have never written a letter to the editor before in my life, but after attending the Atlantic Convention, I thought perhaps my reflections might be of interest to others. I think that a great deal of credit must be given to the committee headed by John Kobrock, for the smooth running of such a gigantic enterprise.

I suppose this is the time in which criticism is in order as well as praise. One of the objections I voiced at the National Convention in Oklahoma was the wholesale emphasis placed on Western square dancing. Those of you who know me know that I love both kinds, but at the same time it would seem to me a convention that was to represent the Eastern sea-coast could not find at least one hour per day that could be devoted to our fine so-called Eastern squares. The Cotillion was one of the bright spots of the two days that I spent there. But, this more or less brought out what was done in Colonial times and was not a true picture of square dancing that the common, ordinary man does in New York or New England.

How can any caller that is not strictly a Western type caller invite his dancers to go to a convention where nothing that they have danced before is being used? Western square dancing with all its beauty, must have class work before it can be done. Therefore, this is not a representative square dance convention for all the people who live in New England. In my territory, anyone can go to a square dance and dance.

I would not say that these folks can dance as well as folks that have been to a class, but nevertheless, they can enjoy a heritage that has been handed down from generation to generation. Are we going to go all Western and forget our fine dances that are the products of our whole country and go altogether modern, or are we going to hit a middle road where all people can go to a gathering like we had and say, "I had a good time". I am not against the Western movement in any sense of the word, if so, I would not have spent the money to equip a hall to teach this type of dancing, but feel we should not lose that which was born here. Dear Editor:

I think I should state in a little more detail my perhaps rather blunt statement appearing in the November issue of The New England Caller, regarding the article by Mr. Kohler.

In our country each and every one of us has the right to express his views, provided they are not contrary to the law, and by the same token anyone who disagrees also has the right to speak in opposition. Which one is right is a matter of argument for or against.

To refresh your memory I will repeat that part of Mr. Kohker's article with which I disagree, namely: "Many callers have unwittingly furthered this, what I consider unfortunate misconception of square dancing by instituting "classes" or "courses" and thereby creating false barriers and discrimination among dancers, not to mention spreading the idea that this form of activity has to be worked out and learned the hard way."

Also Mr. Kohler says, and again I quote: "I venture a guess that square dancing will prosper only as long as it is left with the people and not to a select handful of so-called "graduates."

Now I have read and reread the above paragraphs, trying to read between the lines to see if perhaps it was a little different from the way it sounded, but as yet I haven't had any luck.

I am one of those callers who instituted "classes" or "courses", and for the last three years have been patting myself on the back, and maybe getting a little bit of a swelled head telling myself what a good job I've done to promote square dancing, when all of a sudden somebody comes along with a pin and "bang" the bubble bursts. However I still think I have done a good job, and so here is my argument for it:

I have made it my business since reading the article to conduct a small poll at random among my "select handful of graduates", (and quite a handful they are-numbering better than 300). I asked them this question, "Do you taink you would be square dancing today if there had never been a school to get you started?" For the most part the answer was "no". Some said "maybe" and others, "I really don't know but I doubt it."

That poll convinced me that if it were not for the classes the number of dancers would still be a small group, and perhaps so few that dancing might even have died out in this area.

Also, speaking of the graduates as a "select Group" gave me the impression he classes them as snobs with a superior feeling towards the beginners. That has been proven time and time again as not being so, for it is the graduates who attend the schools as assistant instructors that smooths the way for the beginners and breaks down the barriers which exist when they attempt to learn the hard way...at a public dance or festival. It is those same graduates who are the "true teachers", for the caller simply tells them what to do, while the

"graduate teachers" by dancing in their set really teach them how to do it.

I do agree with the writer, that fastivals and one night stands should be kept at a level where the majority can enjoy them the best, but a person or persons without any knowledge of the dance cannot followeven the simple figures if he or she doesn't know the difference between a do-ci-do and an alemande, and so all that takes place in that set is utter confusion.

I know, because many times I have seen it happen.

At these affairs the folks on the floor are expected to know what the basic figures mean, and everyone without any know-ledge should stay among the spectators unless the entire set is acquainted with each other.

However, whoever is running these affairs should have printed forms made up and passed among the spectators, telling them where they can attend a school in their area and who the teachers are, if they are interested in square dancing. This is not a new idea, for it was done for two years by the Bay State Square Dance Association and forms were passed out at the Brockton Fair amongst the people watching.

There is a lot more I could say to prove my point..that schools are a must. However I think I will stop, and I hope the opposition will now look upon "schools" and "courses" in a little different light.


So, I say in closing that square dancing will prosper and flourish only as long as callers and graduates continue to teach new-comers at "schools" or "courses". If it is left to the people to learn by the bit or miss method at public dances and festivals then it will wither on the vine and slowly grow less and less, because dancers come and dancers go, and only by continually getting a new crop each year can this form of dance survive.

To quote my good friend Howard Hogue "YOURS FOR MORE AND BETTER SQUARE DANCING."



1-3 & 5 cross over

All gents cross over and balance and swing partners. (This call before music)

Belance now

Circle left around
by fours

Circle right the
other way back

Ladies half
chain across

left back to place

Cross over and balance

Note: At the beginning of the dance all the ladies stay where

skill on the part of the dancers All go down the floor and
turn as individuals on the 7th & 8th steps All come back 8
counts -circle left-8-circle right 8- The ladies half chain
and half right and left is done in a little less than 16 counts
so as to enable the gents to cross and be ready for the balance with their partners.
