The challenges facing us are exposure and


communication. We need more of both in order to promote our activity and acquaint more people with Square Dancing.

vacation. Of course, we got in some dancing to Frank Lane, the wizard of Estes Park, as well.



FOR SOLARE DANKERS

SQUARE-DANCING BETWEEN THE SEAMSTRESS AND THE SQUARE DANCER Also

A SIMPLICITY PATTERN TO LOOK AT

A square dancer who does not sew, but wants clothes that are individual and made exactly to her taste and figure must find a good seamstress who understands square dancing enough to realize what the clothes are supposed to do for the wearer. The dancer, when ordering her dress should expect to confer with the seamstress as to the style wanted, and hopefully, have pattern in hand. If she wants anything different from the exact pattern it should be discussed thoroughly before the fabric is bought, or the price is settled. I believe it is best for the dancer to expect to buy the fabric, zipper and thread (and pattern) before the price of the labor is established due to the fact that some fabrics are extremely difficult to work with. It is ideal to have the seamstress accompany the dancer on the first shopping tour so that she can advise the dancer as to ideal types of fabric as opposed to those which are impractical. Things to consider are washability, appropriateness, comfort and wrinkle resistance.

A dancer who expects to save lots of money by having her clothes custom-made is not thinking clearly. Naturally they will cost as least as much as those off the rack. Good sewing is time-consuming, and most cheap fabric isn't worth using. A good square dance dress doesn't go out of style and will last for many years if it is made well, has good seams and a deep hem.

The seamstress who is dealing with a customer for the first time has the obligation of making clear to her the expenses involved, the time needed, the pitfalls that may be encountered and the obligations on both sides. There should be lots of questions on each side and an enterprising seamstress might want to make up a printed sheet explaining what is involved. Enough time should be allowed, for hurrying can make extra problems. If there is a deadline that cannot be met, it should be so stated before the project is begun. Either party should not be afraid to say NO to anything they cannot accept. A seamstress should not let her customer expect the impossible. She should attempt only that which she knows she is able to do. If a pattern is not the right one for the job, she must have the strength to say so, for success cannot be attained if the project gets started on the wrong foot. Begin with open honesty on both sides with a clear picture of what is wanted and what can be accomplished. Use pictures, literally. They explain things much more clearly than words. A scrapbook of ideas is always useful, as is the description sheet of Authentic patterns; also Needle Notes Books, Volumes I and II (can be bought from your New England S/D Caller Magazine).

Some seamstresses charge by the hour and some charge by the job: either is acceptable. In either case, when the dancer goes to pick up her new dress, she should take her petticoat with her and try on her dress before taking it home. Unless otherwise arranged, she should expect to finish paying for her dress when she takes it home. In some cases, people like to have any left-over pieces of the material for dress repairs or patchwork or applique jobs, so, if this is the case, the seamstress or dancer should make a point to mention this early on in the project. If left-over material is mentioned at the last minute, it could easily be too late.

Hopefully, these thoughts will help lead to better understanding between the seamstress and her customer, for better communication is what we need more of in almost anything we do.

SIMPLICITY #6027, view 1 is a fine little dress for club workshop for those who don't care for ruffles or calico type square dance dresses. For those of you don't want to bother with buttons (Continued)

and buttonholes, it is possible to stitch up the back on the center line, setting in a placket zipper at the same time; or stitch it up to give the appearance of a button-up back, with buttons sewed on for effect and a side placket with zipper. As with any street dress pattern, beware of the set-in sleeve as it will bind, so be smart and read just the pattern shape as I have recommended many times (see pages 14 or 15 in Needle Notes book, Volume I). Or possibly, you might like to try the pleated sleeve with insert as shown in the Sept. '83 Caller.

View 2 is a nice style for a winter dress. and view 3 is perfect for summer. This is a



nice versatile little pattern and well worth \$3.50. View 1 calls for 4 and 1/8 vds. of 44" material for size 12 and measures 205 inches around the hemline which indicates to me a full circle skirt. It is available in sizes 8 to 14.

Square Beat



t the start of this country the American Folk Dance was a positive force for American democracy. Throughout history men and women have searched for ways to relieve the pressure and tension of everyday life. The barn was the gathering place for men with jeans and women with bonnets and long dresses. Dancing was done to a caller with a nasal twang and a local fiddler. Today square dancing has grown out of the barn and into spacious modern halls. Our styles have nostalgic qualities with western appearance and are not only comfortable but attractive as well. Thanks to modern ingenuity the fiddler of yesterday has been replaced with electronic equipment and dancing is done to all the modern tunes. Square dancing is a perfect recreation for all ages.

One of the prime factors in square dancing's longevity is the fact that it is not competitive. There are no contests in square dancing. Square dancing is a co-operative venture where everyone wins simply by being part of it. Another attraction is that it discourages the use of alcoholic beverages — for you cannot dance and drink.

We will attempt to answer some of the more commonly asked questions.

Who Square Dances?

Friendly people everywhere. The carpenter, the baker, electricians, mechanics, the executive, the professional, the teacher, mill worker, housekeepers and even your next door neighbor.

Who can participate?

Anyone of all ages. There are adult couple clubs, singles clubs, teen clubs and senior citi-

zen groups. You are just the right age, whatever that may be.

What are the lessons like?

Fun and challenging. You start dancing right away. Each week new material is added to the program. You will find yourself looking forward to next week's lesson.

How much time and money is involved?

The initial investment will be a fun-filled evening once a week while you are learning. Lessons start in Sept. and graduation is in May. The charge for each lesson, which will vary by community, runs on an average of about \$4.00 per couple, per week.

What about equipment or clothes?

The only initial recommendation is a pair of comfortable shoes. There is a wide choice of ready-made clothes with many dancers designing and sewing their own dresses, creating an endless variety of styles and colors. You spend what you want. A month or so before graduation is when most dancers begin to buy their outfits.

What happens when I graduate?

You will be automatically enrolled as a member of the club who sponsored the lessons. In addition, you will be presented with a badge which will identify you as a square dancer. This identification allows you to dance at any of the more than 40 clubs in New Hampshire, as well as New England, the country and abroad. The welcome mat will be out — the rest will be up to you.

Editor's Note: This letter to [Im is being printed this month in lieu of his regular article,

for your comment-column in the August CALLER. It is supported by the unidentified writer of the article "BORED? Who's Bored?" that begins on page 66 of the same issue. And it is hinted at in Ray's editorial, in the third item he proposes for consideration.

Because the absence of the kind of calling you advocate caused us to drop out of square dancing many years ago, I have abandoned my efforts to persuade callers that they should try to please the dancers, instead of calling for what one of my friends calls "their own amazement."

Ruth joins me in gratitude for the efforts of a few callers like you to awaken the others to what is vital to the growth - even the continued existence - of the square-dance movement. Keep up the good work!

The truth of what you have termed the key element in the definition of good square dancing was never better demonstrated than in an occurrence many years ago at the 15th Anniversary celebration of the Greater Hartford Square Dance Club. At the time, the Hartford club was widely believed to represent the creme de la creme of New England square dancers. So those of us who were invited to attend their celebration expected that it would be an unforgettable experience.

it proved to be just that - but for a reason we had not anticipated.

The dancing was what, for those days, would have passed for pretty high-level stuff. And all of us were rather proud of our ability to cope with the challenges thrown at us by the likes of Al Brundage and Ed Gilmore. Ed had just completed calling something totally new to us - what he called "exploding squares" - in which each square covered almost the entire floor and danced with many different groups before finding itself, at last, back in it's original position on the floor.

As the appliance died down, and we were wondering what could possibly top that, Ed started the music and we soon recognized the tune. The roar of acclaim from the dancers nearly lifted the roof off the hall as we swung into what was probably the most familiar of all square-dance patterns of the day - "My Little Girl."

Perhaps part of the crowd's response was due to the contrast between the unfamiliar and the familiar. But certainly more of it was due to just what you are emphasizing in your column: Dancers love the familiar. And the caller who can give the dancers real fun, instead of cryptographic exercises, will be drawing crowds long after the creators of choreographic crossword puzzles have been forgotten.



12 out of 61 (20%) of N.E. Teachers use some International Cues. But only at R/D Classes, Clubs and special Round Dance Events.

- 96 clubs out of 112 (86%) use only R/D Cues in R/D Class or Clubs. The largest group 86 clubs only teach thru Hi Intermediate.
- Less than 50% of Square Dance Clubs have Rounds taught at the dances, At 61 S/D clubs (95%) of those reporting) dances used include only up to Intermediate.
- All Cueing at Square Dance Clubs is limited to R/D cues. Most (101 out of 137) use only up to Intermediate with some Hi Inter and a few Advanced.
- 4. At Festivals and Special R/D Events all types of dances are used in various degrees.

October is the month of pumpkins and I have two recipes that I like to use when I think of pumpkins. One is a Pumpkin Bread; the other is Pumpkin Cake.

PUMPKIN BREAD

2/3 cup margarine

2 2/3 cups sugar

4 eggs

1/2 teaspoon baking powder

2 teaspoons baking soda

11/2 teaspoons salt

1 tsp. each - cinnamon & ground cloves

1 can pumpkin (14 oz.)

2/3 cup water

3 1/3 cups flour

2/3 cups nuts

2/3 cups raisins

Cream margarine, sugar and eggs. Add pumpkin. Sift dry ingredients and add to mixture. Add water, nuts and raisins.

Bake about 1 hour at 350 degrees. Makes 2 bread tins.

4 eggs

1 cup oil

2 cups sugar

2 cups flour

Mix well.

2 tsp. baking soda

1 tsp. baking powder

2 tsp. cinnamon

1/2 tsp. salt

Add to other ingredients

1 cup canned pumpkin

Grease and flour Angel food pan. Bake for one hour at 350 degrees.

CREAM CHEESE FROSTING

½ stick butter

4 oz. cream cheese

½ box confectionery sugar

4 tsp. vanilla

Mix well - cover cake with walnuts.

he mainstream quarterly selection for the Oct., Nov., Dec. quarter is ripple. The current MSQS list therefore reads as follows: CHAIN DOWN THE LINE, DIXIE DERBY, DIVIDE TO A COLUMN, GRAND SPIN, LINEAR CYCLE, RED HOT, and RIPPLE. The new Advanced QS is SHADOW TO A DIAMOND. The current AQS list is: SHADOW TO A DIAMOND! The AQS program is not cumulative as the MSQS list is. The Plus QS has not yet been announced.

This month we will discuss RIPPLE. RIPPLE was written earlier this year, by Curley Custer from Maryland. It starts with two dancers facing each other. They join both hands with each other, circle half, then pass thru. The movement ends with the dancers back to back.

As with TAG THE LINE, the caller may also add the term RIGHT, LEFT, IN or OUT after RIPPLE. In this case, the dancers individually face (turn a quarter turn on the spot where they are standing) in the designated direction. From lines of four, where some dancers may have to decide which direction IN or OUT is, you turn with respect to the center of the square.

This call is very versatile, since it can have many different starting formations, and with the facing direction modifiers, even more ending formations.

The first part of this article has been used to report some facts. I am going to use the second part to reflect some personal opinions. I feel Callerlab made a mistake in selecting this call as a Quarterly Selection.

Although this call has been enjoyed by dancers around the country as a disposable experimental for a few months now, and it has been on the American Square Dance Magazine's Pulse Poll, I offer the following reasons why I feel callers who have used it should have shown more discretion and why Callerlab in particular

should not have perpetuated the poor judgement.

RIPPLE is identical to SINGLE CIRCLE TO A WAVE, PASS THRU. RIPPLE RIGHT is identical to SINGLE CIRCLE % TO A WAVE. Do we need a new name for something we can already call?

RIPPLE IN, OUT, LEFT or RIGHT is identical to SINGLE CIRCLE TO A WAVE, then PASS IN, OUT, LEFT or RIGHT. Do we have to create a new name for a plus call used with an A1 call just so that we can call it at mainstream? If the movement belongs at mainstream (at least for workshopping), teach it with the name(s) it already has.

RIPPLE is identical to a TURN THRU except that you use both hands instead of just one. This makes it a more limited call than TURN THRU, since both start from facing dancers, but TURN THRU may also start from a wave, and TURN THRU requires the right hands be available while RIPPLE requires that both be free.

Of course dancers like doing RIPPLE. It is easy and feels familiar because they have already been doing it for years. So much for the action, now let's look at the name.

RIPPLE is a nice name. The dancers at the C2 program have been enjoying it for years. That's right, there is already a call named RIPPLE and it lives on the C2 list. I don't fault Curley Custer (too much) for reusing a name that is already in use. He may not have been familiar with the C2 list, although a quick check of Bill Burleson's Encyclopedia's index would have warned him of a possible conflict.

I do fault Callerlab at allowing this to happen, when they had been advised, before it was too late, of this conflict, I and numerous others from around the country, when we heard that RIPPLE was being considered for MSQS, wrote the Callerlab office, Chairman of the board of governors and Chairman of the MSQS committee. The MSQS committee chairman said that he had heard this but when checking the C2 list only found RIPPLE THE WAVE, not RIPPLE and did not take into advisement that the command is generally given as RIPPLE. Does that mean I can write a call and name it EXTEND, because the call on the plus list is officially named EXTEND THE TAG (or % TAG vs % TAG THE LINE) and besides, mainstream dancers shouldn't know plus so it won't cause a problem anyway!

The MSQS chairman said, "I don't think this is a problem and besides an overwhelmingly large percentage of my committee voted for it." The Callerlab board of governors currently has no mechanism for overriding committee recommendations, so here we are, stuck with

it until at least next April.

After the initial confusion, the conflict at C2 and above will at least be manageable, since the starting formation for each of the RIPPLEs is different. No ambiguities should exist, but that still doesn't give me license to write a call that starts from lines back to back, and call it FLUTTER WHEEL just because I like the ring of the name, and I know it won't be confused with the FLUTTER WHEEL we already have since you need facing couples to do that one,

I plan to teach RIPPLE (the new one) in my workshops (mainstream through C2), because I owe it to my dancers to prepare them for what they may meet at open dances. I have no obligation to call it at open dances, however.

It is regrettable that this has happened, but I am sure that we, the dance community, and we, Callerlab, will survive this, and in all probability, we will learn from it.

Line/Solo DANCE CORNER

this corner, Line/solo dancing has many problems (what activity doesn't have). This writer does not plan in the months ahead to utilize this corner for just our "problems." Hopefully, we will be able to expound on the brighter aspects of this activity and there are many.

Line/solo dancing has reached the stage where we are able to differentiate at least two or more levels of dancing achievement. Yet, mainly because of lack of communication, no criteria has been established nor agreement thereof. How best could this be accomplished without an organization to wield authority?

Once again the only way that we could effect a dialogue is through the aegis of The New England Square Dance Caller magazine. Thus, if you the dancer or instructor have any ideas not mentioned here in this column, please contact us here at The Caller office in Dracut so that the material may be disseminated. And the same goes for voicing your disagreement of

the material printed; or write this columnist at his home address.

For the sake of brevity, as well as an initial attempt of setting up a method of classification of line/solo dances — let's put all "classic" line dances into the easy/beginner group while any dance of over eight measures or bars will be placed into the intermediate category. Frankly, at this point, I do not have any automatic, clear-cut criteria for an advanced classification. Do you?

The word "classic" has been used here, perhaps, for the very first time in the history of our dance form. It was not intended on my part to be used loosely, but rather in a very specific sense. Hang loose on this issue; next menth we will attempt to explain some new terminology that is creeping into line/solo dancing.

LINE DANCE

KING OF THE ROYAL COACHMEN

ORIGIN: Prof. Longley, Instructor at the Royal Coachmen in Venice, Fla. MUSIC: Mercury, CC35016, King of the Road, Roger Miller POSITION: Solo, all facing Head of Hall

INTRODUCTION: Wait four measures

MEASURE

- 1 Right Two-step: step forward with Right Foot, slide Left Foot to Right Foot, step forward Right Foot, Hold;
- 2 Left two-step: step fwd LF, slide RF to LF, step fwd LF, Hold;
- 3 Place R heel in front, step RF beside LF, place L heel in front, step LF beside RF;
- 4 Repeat Measure 1;
- 5 Repeat Measure 2:
- 6 Repeat Measure 3;
- 7 Start a vine to the Right: step RF to R, step LFXIBRF, start doing a ½ turn Right as you perform a cha/cha/cha (RF/LF/RF),;
- 8 Start a vine to Left turning ¼ Left turn on the cha/cha/cha: Step LF to L, step RFX\BLF, make turn doing LF/RF/LF to end facing Right Wall of the hall...

COMMENT: We found at the Royal Coachmen the dancers preferred doubling up on Measures 1 and 2 so that we really did 1,2,3 three times instead of two as written.

CORRECTION NOTED: The directions in last month's Line Dance choice "Molly and Me" by Dick Delery stated a full right turn in measures three and four. It should be corrected to ½ turn right, making it so the dancer is facing the rear of the hall at the end of the fourth measure; likewise at the end of the eighth measure the dancer would be facing head of hall again.

A TIME FOR SETTING GOALS

Traditionally, in most parts of the country, Fall is the time for recruiting new dancers and starting square dance classes. Great enthusiasm is shown and much time and effort is expended by dancers and callers in trying to attract more people into the wonderful world of square dancing. This is to suggest that, along with this annual burst of enthusiasm, there should be a time of serious reflection on what is to be accomplished the next nine to twelve months. This should be A TIME FOR SETTING GOALS.

Goal-setting should include an evaluation of past experience. What has been tried before? Did it work? If not, what went wrong? What improvements can be made? How many previous class graduates have we lost? Why? For many clubs, it is shocking to see how few graduates of the past several classes are still dancing with the club. Is it because those dancers were poorly taught and not prepared to cope with the real world of modern square dancing? Is it because they received the cold shoulder when they tried to integrate into the club? Questions such as these take courage to answer honestly. But honest answers can lead to positive changes.

Clubs and caller/teachers who rush new dancers through class simply so they can begin contributing to the club treasury and to "build up the clubs" are short-sighted, indeed. Those short-term graduates may pay dues sooner, but the statistics from around the country show that a disturbingly large percentage of them will pay a much shorter time and will soon be gone from square dancing. Some of our best, most respected caller/teachers, whose names are well-known to the dancing public, continue to tell us that they cannot teach the Mainstream program thoroughly in much less than one year. One wonders, therefore, how much less experienced caller/teachers claim to teach that program (and, usually, some Plus movements in addition) in classes of fifteen to thirty weeks duration. Classes are the very foundation of square dancing, where dancers learn, or do not learn, the basics, customs, courtesies, traditions, dress, and all the other things that go to make a complete square dancer. They should not be looked upon routinely but should have definite goals with the good of the club, the new dancers, and square dancing in mind.

Have you set goals for your class and club for the coming year? Do they include the graduation of well-taught, competent dancers who will fit comfortably into the dancing program of your club? Do you have a plan for easing those new dancers into your club? Have you planned definite activities to carry Spring graduates through the summer doldrums? Now is the time to evaluate past experience and plan for the future. Fall really is A TIME FOR SETTING GOALS.

Wear a smile and have friends; wear a scowl and have wrinkles.

- 1. Why not ask a person or a couple in your club who you feel are knowledgeable and well-spoken to make themselves available, as representatives of your club, to area radio and T.V. stations for interviews with "Square Dancing" as the subject. They are always looking for interesting interviews on different subjects.
- Maybe your club could afford to rent billboard space in your town. Silver City Twirlers of Taunton, Ma, are doing it; maybe if you contacted them, they would give you some facts and figures.
- 3. Have you thought about renting space available on the taxicab roofs to promote your classes?
- Maybe someone in your club has become proficient in using his/her video camera and could produce a cassette of your club

members dancing, with some narration includded, explaining how easy it is for anyone to learn to Square Dance, then make it available to your local "Cable" T.V. station.

5. Please read the letter to the editor in Reader's Forum of this issue from Betsy & Chuck Berry on an excellent suggestion pertaining to your local library. If you decide after reading it that you would like your library to receive our magazine monthly as a reference book, we will make a subscription available for that purpose at our normal bulk rate of \$6.00 per year.* We wish we could afford to send complimentary magazines to all public libraries in New England but we can't.

If we can be of any further help, please don't be afraid to ask.

Chip's TIP



Again I'm faced with the deadline dilemma in that this month of October seems so far away at the end of August which is when I'm writing. Our big dance in New York City at Lincoln Center is not yet 24 hours old, a hot and humid weekend is in the offing and I'm trying to gear my mind to October.

The summer flew by leaving a trail of happy memories of friends and family and vacations and dances. I acquired a remote microphone system and am now able to try teaching techniques designed to cut down on the "talking to the dancers" approach. It's much easier to teach from the floor and now I don't have to project with such volume. A bit of thanks to modern technology.

I dido't get a dance in last time around so I'm offering a mixer of mine this month. It's to an old tune which can be found on the album that I referenced in my April '83 column that included my four-couple set dance BROOKS & FIELDS. The music is on the 33-1/3 alhum EFDSSPLA-4. The cut is Dick's Maggot (Magot once meant a fight of fancy, remember?) The music is in 3/2 time and requires three steps to the measure. It is not a waltz.

RICHARD'S ROUNDALOT

Formation: Couples in a large circle, facing in.

Music: Dick's Maggot. (1703)

- A All circle Left. [4 bars-12 steps]
 All Forward & Back. [4 bars 6
 steps in, 6 back out]
- B Face partner & DoSiDo. [2 bars 6 steps]
 Two-hand turn Partner to end facing corner. [2 bars 6 steps]
 DoSiDo Corner. [2 bars 6 Steps]
 Two-hand turn Corner half-way
 (Partner change) opening out into the large circle again. [2 bars 6 steps]

Let's take a minute and analyze this circle mixer. (Since it's mine I won't offend anyone.) I can hear the choreographically oriented leaders and dancers scoffing at such a simple combination of figures. And it is a simple set of figures.

I just happen to be one of many dance leader/choreographers who believe the clever arranging of figures is only a part of the dance scene.

The music for this dance is an extremely well done cut. It's not done in an authentic 18th C. style but it is good dance music. And unusual music for the general dance public. 3/2 time has a feet all its own and combined with the tune, arrangement, smooth flow of figures and changing of partners the dance comes off. Done to a nondescript "nothing" piece of music or recording it would be dull, indeed.

It can also serve as a stepping-stone to more complicated 3/2 rhythm dances. It's easier to first learn how to feel the phrases of 3/2 with simpler figures and then move on to more complicated patterns with a feel for the music under your belt. Of course that's the basic teaching pattern for anything; moving from the known to the unknown in easy-to-digest steps.

If you've never worked with 3/2 and care to do this dance, be sure and practice at home until you can feel the phrases and put the cues in just ahead of those phrases.

Speaking of phrases, the subject came up recently while talking to a dancer friend of mine. He attended a contra daoce in Connecticut where the caller didn't call ahead of the phrases. After the dance he spoke to this young man and mentioned the phrasing. It turned out that the concept was entirely new to this neophyte caller! Which proves something, but I'm not sure what at this point.

We'll have ranged the east coast from Maine to Pennsylvania by the time this article is in the Caller. Much music and friends and food and sights! And gratitude for being able to share and share in the world of dancing.

I hope you are able to enjoy the dancing style that best suits you. It'll keep you young and happy for years.

Dear Bill:

In both the A-1 Workshops I attend there are dancers, some new grads, who don't know the Plus calls. I can't avoid them because of "computer" tips and I can't learn anything when they turn the square into a can of worms. Help!

Your tongue is your most potent weapon. Use it on the caller-teacher. Get others to do likewise — form a delegation or present a petition. He created the problem; it's up to him to solve it. If he won't weed out the incompetents, the qualified dancers should take their business elsewhere.

When a club rejects an application for membership (because of a drinking problem, inability to dance at the club level, etc.), what can the poor membership chairman say?

As little as possible. A polite, brief letter stating only that the application was considered and was not approved is sufficient. When they call you to demand a reason, and they're almost certain to do so, tell them it is the policy of the Board not to divulge the contents of it's deliberations on applications. Be firm; else you'll likely find yourself in the midst of a lengthy and contentious conversation.

Gradually several couples who had been dancing in home basements got together and started taking lessons in the YWCA. The first class graduated on 14 March 1959. The Town Travelers was then officially organized on 21 March with Paul and Dot Pratt as first Presidents.

Over the years we have had numerous Callers and danced at many nursing homes, churches, city functions, etc., which gave us a chance to share the fun of Square Dancing with others.

We have held our dances in many different halls and we now dance at the Robinson School in Lowell.

The popular trademark of the Town Travelers is the Dune Buggy (our trophy) which is given and retrieved at banner raids. An even more recent addition is the car in which our visiting banner raid chairpersons are taken for a ride (using foot power) to receive or retrieve the trophy.

In celebrating, we must give thanks to all officers, committee chairpersons and members who were an important part of our club during these 25 years.

LET'S DO SOMETHING ABOUT IT ...

Subject: A SUCCESSFUL PLAN

n the latest copy of the Caller's
Gazette published by Hilton
Audio Products were several
plans describing successful operation of classes.
I will give a few of the highlights of the one
that struck my fancy.

The club is 15 years old and still healthy. It starts classes every other year and classes learn for 2 years with a definite planned schedule. Four out of five of the dancers in the '80 and '82 classes are still dancing. This definitely spells success. Classes start in January on the same night and half as the club dance. The first hour and a half is the class and the remainder of the evening is devoted to club dancing.

When the class has completed 2/3 of it's lessons, a special dance is held, open to class, club and guests. After this dance, the class dances the first tip with the club at the end of the lesson period. Graduation is in late October or early November. After graduation there is

a workshop of QS and Plus, Club level drops back to MS and adds the workshop figures as they are taught, until all dancers reach the plus level. After this program is complete there is no attempt and no pressure applied to raise the level beyond plus. Experimental figures are added occasionally to add variety. This allows 10 months of plus dancing before the new class starts. The bottom line is success.

We hear so much about dropouts, but I now get the impression that if club officers want to put on their thinking caps they can come up with a successful plan. You can not say it can't be done because it is being done. There are two things to remember; the class needs more time to learn and club members and officers have got to stop putting on the pressure for higher levels.

If you prefer to stay at a commercial campground or in a state park, check the campground directories at your local library for locations near Baltimore and make your own reservations. Just don't forget that you still need to send in a registration form for the convention.

For boaters, we have a marina right at the Inner Harbor. It's 100 slips are very popular, so if you are interested you should write or call right away for information about when and how to reserve one. I am writing in response to an unsigned letter in the Aug. Caller that claimed to address "some of the problems we now have between round dancing and challenge dances." The letter erred in two ways. First, it inaccurately stated what happened, and second, the letter does not, as it claimed, speak for all challenge dancers.

The events precipitating the letter occurred at the Ross Howell weekend run by Dave Sullivan in May, I was one of the round dancers to whom the author so atrenuously objected. During the afternoon session on Sat., Dave put on a round dance record at the beginning of one of the breaks. Although Dave announced over the mike that the dance was for my partner and me, we had not requested round dancing; Dave knew we would appreciate music during the break. I would like to express my opinions on Callerlab's decision to combine the Plus Movements into one program. My intentions are not to continue drumming this issue into the ground, but rather to offer some fresh food for thought.

As a caller, I repsect the reasoning behind Callerlab's action. As a dancer, I understand the feelings of my fellow dancers. As a middleman, I offer the following compromise:

- 1. Transfer the following movements to the Plus Program: cross fold, cross run, partner hinge, partner tag, peel off.
- Transfer the following movements to the Mainstream Program: load the boat, ping pong circulate, relay the ducey, teacup chain, track II.

Of course, the transfers recommended above reflect my own preferences, and the possible variations are endless. The point I am trying to make here is that it's fine to place emphasis on the Mainstream Program, but while we serve our dencers Mainstream, straight up, let's garnish it with some of the ingredients that make them want to drink from the Plus cup in the first place.

I feel that this proposal has some merit. I encourage responses, both pro, and con, from callers and dancers alike.

ROUND DANGING

GOING OUT ON A LIMB?



There is great concern among round dance leaders in New England about the influence of international ballroom dancing in round dancing. Recently, NECORTA conducted a survey of round dance leaders and came to the conclusion, based on the survey responses, that there is no international cueing in round dances at square dances. Since I answered this questionnaire, since I do use some international cues when cueing round dances at square dances, and since I have heard other cuers use international terms while cueing round dances at square dances, I am baffled. Statistics and questionnaires are only one way of gathering information, and obviously they can be confusing and misleading.

I would like to discuss some facets of social dance history from my point of view as a dance historian in hopes that more information might be helpful to us as we ponder the questions that are before us. With The New England Caller's help and permission, this will appear in future issues.

Most of all, I would like to remind us the WHISK, WING, TELEMARK, IMPETUS, HOVER, AND WEAVE COME FROM INTERNATIONAL BALLROOM DANCING. These figures are well-known and accepted and used in round dancing, including round dances cued at square dances. Several popular dances which have international cues in them and are done at square dances are ANSWER ME, TIL TOMORROW, and POP GOES THE MOVIES. There are others. Whisk is on the Necorta list of basic figures.

Therefore, since these are aiready established and accepted in New England, I must say that the conclusion of the Necorta survey that there is no international cueing in round dances used at square dances should be reconsidered.

Perhaps as dancers and as teachers we are so busy just getting through the dance that we don't pay attention to the origins of what we are doing. Most of us, quite naturally, live in the present and do not usually consider our history. This is normal and natural, but when it becomes the basis of incorrect statements, trouble can result. I worry that that is what is happening now.

I don't think anyone in New England round dancing today would want to give up the figures and dances I have named. I do think we need to be more careful about what we say, I for one do not want New England to go out on a limb using incorrect information as the basis of official statements. Perhaps the background information in social dance history will help us to understand the richness and complexity of our wonderful round dancing more thoroughly. This is turn, I hope, will promote more discussion and less argument.

Please ask questions or give your comments to me either directly or through the Caller Magezine. I will try to incorporate them as we go along. Together we can figure this out.

Traveling to Florida?

A NEW EXPERIENCE

How many remember your first Square Dancing experience? Was it in school, a parks and recreation program, at summer camp, a dude ranch, the local grange hall, a senior center or some other unusual or unexpected circumstances?

Mine, I believe, was rather unique and you might like to share the humorous aspects.

When in high school, I spent a part of summer vacation at a summer home on the Vermont side of Lake Champlain. Not all the time was spent for fishing and water sports.

One evening I went down the lake about three miles in an eight-foot sea sled — square bowed. A popular and sporty boat of the times. My host in the cockpit operated the outboard and I with my skinny six-foot frame rode up front on the deck.

We beached the boat at Benson's Landing and walked a good four miles to Benson, Vt. The dirt road was isolated with winding turns and sharply peaked small hills through the woods. There we found the square dance we were looking for. It was in a clean barn with a fair floor. (The boys had lent a hand and made it spic and span and it was a shindig in the barn.)

The first surprise was that folks were dressed in ordinary country clothes — even some men in clean overalls. We wore white shoes and flannel pants, brown jackets and yellow ties. Real city dudes for their first try at square dancing. We were accepted.

We found partners and joined in the danc-

ing to a live country fiddler and caller. It was the traditional or Eastern visiting couples type of dance and real country hoedown. By dancing as fourth gent I could observe the predecessor couples and then try to follow suit – at times with modest success and no evidence of disgust by other dancers. There was the usual two-steps and waltzes between tips.

When it came time to leave we were tired. Oh those miles to walk home in the dark! We just were not in shape for this kind of endurance.

Our fatigue reduced when two sisters who lived at the Landing offered us a ride. They and their dates rode in the cab of a dump truck — we in the dump portion on an old car seat cushion. At the sharp peaks of the hills we went up but seldom was the cushion there when we came down. Oh! Our aching buns. At the landing we found the lake calm so our return to camp was without bounce.

We continued with another square dance on the Vermont side and two on the New York side. These were at tourist resorts so our white flannels were appropriate and we learned something about square dancing.

Our acceptance at all these dances proves that square dancers be they of the traditional or modern style are friendly fun-loving people.



IMPORTANT ANNOUNCEMENT

We are taking these steps in lieu of an increase in both the advertising and subscription rates at this time.

We feel that our first responsibility is to our advertisers, who in fact, make this magazine possible. Our only other alternative (other than raising rates) would be to eliminate some of the articles on various subjects which so many of you have told us that you enjoy or doing away with the dance listing at the back of the book and we don't feel that either of those changes would be popular with the majority of our readers.

Please try to understand our position as we try to make the right decisions that will assure the future of this magazine and its service to you for a long time to come.


MEDFIELD, MA... By Martanellie... To all the faithful, good health and happy dancing.

We would also like to thank everyone who helped with the float. It sure will be nice to display the three beautiful trophies we won.



As I sat down to put together a new square dance dress (the first in many months) I realized I was approaching the project a little differently than I had in the past. As the skirt was to be a border print, I decided to get that ready first and that I would get it as near to finished as possible before starting the bodice. I had seven yards of border print which were wrinkled from being put away carelessly, so I began pressing it out. As I pressed I began to realize I could do a lot of preliminary work with my iron and make the whole job go more smoothly — and more professionally. So, as I pressed, I planned.



Next I trimmed off the selvage edge so the hem would lie smooth. Then I pressed the whole hem into place and pinned it as I went so that it was all ready to sew.


Knowing the length I wanted, I measured up from the hemline and marked clearly on the WRONG side of the fabric exactly where I thought the waistline should be. I made a clear pencil line all the way across the top (using a white pencil on dark colored fabric). Measuring up another three quarters of an inch, I drew another line across. When you do this, be sure to be accurate. Tear or cut along this top line until you get your six yard piece (some are happy with five yards). I prefer to cut this because I get a better edge to work with.


Now back to the ironing board where I will use my iron to mark the tucks around the waist before gathering, so that I can get this six yard piece down to about three yards at the top. I will place one end of the skirt piece right side up on the ironing board with the waist edge toward the wide end of the board. I will measure nine inches in from this end of the skirt at the waistline and will make a fold at the nine inch mark, right sides together, having it fold neatly all the way to the

hemline, then I will press that fold from the waistline to about halfway to the hemline. This crease marks the center of the first tuck. Now I will fold this over again and press, and over again and press and will keep doing this until I have used up one half the length of the piece. Then I will start at the other end and do the same thing until the folded up pieces meet at the center, then I will mark the center tuck by pressing it, also. See diagram A. This is a very good stopping place If you have had enough for now.

Next, we pin and stitch. I like to pin only four tucks at a time for if I do more, I often loose some of the pins out. I will start at one end and pin once at the top of the tuck, one and a half inches from the fold, then one pin at the point of the tuck, nine and one half inches down from the top, the second tuck will be







three inches of fabric at the waist. See diagram B. If you hope to take in a little more fabric around the waist, measure the tucks at the top at one and three quarters inches. Pin and stitch all the tucks all the way across. Tie off the threads at the point of each tuck, and at the waist, too, if you want to be thorough about it. When you close up the final seam with the zipper you will want to shape that as a tuck also.

Trim the excess material from each tuck, leaving about three eighths of an inch. It is good to use pinking shears if you have them. Press all the tuck seams going in the same direction, keeping in mind the direction you will be stitching for gathering. I like to make two rows of basting stitches one quarter inch apart and pull the gathers by hand, as I seem to have good control this way.

Now that I have the skirt nearly done, I can lay it out on a convenient place where I can picture it with different bodice possibilities most likely a solid dark color in the Dorothy Hartman style with puff sleeves that carry the colors of the skirt, and I shall probably use piping in the back seams that will also carry the skirt color. See sketch C. As I work on the bodice, I shall have my iron ready to smooth my way. I shall press all seams as I go, for I know it will not only improve my workmanship, but will make each step easier for me.



I know that a professional seamstress will keep an iron and board available whenever she is working, for pressing makes fitting the pieces together a lot more accurate, and so prevents lumps, bumps and puckers where they ought not to be.

One point I would like to make clear before leaving the subject: pressing and ironing are two different things. When pressing you should not push the iron across the goods because that stretches the fabric out of shape and gets the weave out of line, so you must move the iron very gently if at all. Ironing is done with the iron moving back and forth stretching out the wrinkles and stretching out the fabric. Keep this in mind when doing a circle skirt, for if you stretch the weave, you will spoil an even hemline. I suspect that this is the reason so many circle skirts become very uneven and hang badly. Always move the iron lengthwise on the weave of the goods, or press gently.

At the final dance of a square dance weekend I attended the members of a certain club (two squares) did the Grand Square, no matter what was called. They not only distracted the rest of us, they made so much noise we couldn't hear the caller. Many dancers left the floor and didn't return. How would you have handled this situation?

Callers, understandably, dan't wish to offend any of the dancers. But in a case like this, harsh measures are in order. If I had been the caller, I would have lifted the needle from the record, then said: "We are here to square dance to my calls; if anyone wishes to do otherwise, they will please leave the hall, NOW!"

LET'S DO SOMETHING ABOUT IT ...

Subject: HOW WOULD YOU FEEL?

re You Confident that you could transfer from a freshman in High School direct to a freshman in High School direct to a struggle; would you feel uncomfortable and how would you feel when other students looked down on you because you failed your assignment? If you get the message then when are we going to realize that this is exactly what we are expecting of our new square dance graduates. The caller never has time to teach all the mainstream figures and then we expect them to enter the club and perform mainstream plus.

Let's look at the complete problem realistically. Some clauses are young and aggressive, some are not and all classes vary in their learning ability. The caller is subject to how fast the class can learn in relation to how many basics he can thoroughly teach in a term. The caller is handicapped by absentees, holidays, weather and what have you. Keep in mind when I refer to teach I am not referring to a walk thru, a few dance thrus, but rather a lot

of repetition if the dancer is going to be able to respond at once. To remember the figure on the way home is too late.

It is easy to criticize but how about a solution? If the class has not progressed as much as anticipated and the club would like to retain these dancers after a season of learning, then the caller has to meet with the executive board and be perfectly frank as to the level of learning. The club must then dance at that level and workshop the figures that the class has not had the benefit of repetitive dancing. Some of the older class members will no doubt welcome this review.

One thing to bear in mind; if the class is behind schedule by x number of basigs three weeks before graduation, no way can the caller walk them thru these basics and have them ready for club dancing. The magic word is repetition in whatever you are learning.

CLOGGING - A SQUARE DANCE RECRUITING TOOL!

t appeared on our local scene just two years ago — this new entity in conservative New England. Embraced by all other sections of our country from coast to coast, true to our tradition of being slow to accept change, we were the last bastion.

Because we are so new, many wonder just how we fit into the square dance movement. Well, how do we?? Here's one way.

Being active in the square dance world and loving it every bit as much as that day I first set foot on the square dance floor, I could not embrace any activity which I felt would be detrimental to an important part of my life. Quite the contrary. My experience so far has proved just the opposite.

All of us are looking for ways to enlarge our beginning square dance classes. It is of great concern to us in this area, Many innovations are suggested or tried to bring in new dancers. Before becoming involved in clogging, I had tried many of the prescribed ways to encourage people to join square dancing classes with very limited success. Now as a clogging instructor I have accomplished this many times over. I have discovered clogging as the best tool I have ever come across for recruitment. Here's why...

At the very first lesson the clogger is introduced to square and round dancing concepts starting with Line of Dance. He must then learn the partner position, how to promenade, Varsouvienne position, a star thru, how to swing, a vine, an Alamo ring, and on and on. Starting in September the clogger learns about the New England Square and Round Dance Convention and is encouraged for those eight months prior to the event to attend. Many non-square dancing cloggers made the trek to Burlington this past spring to exhibit and to learn. They witnessed a convention for the very first time and were thrilled by it.

They learned of the drive to purchase Kramer's Hayloft. With some help, our clogging club has just accomplished a life membership in the Foundation, thus becoming a part of the memorial to all aspects of the folk dancing activity.

Also, my club was invited to perform for the Skirts and Flirts graduation ceremony in Wilmington, Ma. This was a lovely and meaningful service that deeply moved the cloggers who had never seen anything like this before. We also brought a few out individually to help them through some of the square dance movements. They loved it!

Because of this constant exposure, every season a number of cloggers enroll in square dance classes. I have had a report from a colleague, who is also an active square dancer, that she is having the same results. One non-square dancing clogger brought in three new couples to square dance classes. These are great statistics. As the old adage goes, "Don't know it until you've tried it!"

This recruitment method deserves a second look.

CAROLE'S CORNER O E RNER

Everyone likes to be creative. Many years ago, about 32 to be exact, I sent away for a Bakers Coconut Cook Book that I have used so much over the years. In this booklet I have found a cake that I have had a lot of fun with. It is so easy and you look so clever when you take it to a Club Dance or serve it to your family Thanksgiving. It is called a:

GOBBLE-GOBBLE CAKE

1st - Bake your favorite cake or cake mix. Bake 2 round 9-inch layers, then cut the cake in 2 pieces making one 5½ inches wide. The 3½ wide piece is for the turkey's tail.





2nd – Measure in 3 inches on the cut edge of the large cake piece and cut across. Last, cut small piece into 3 strips of equal widths. Now arrange pieces as shown in the diagram,


grd – When Mr. Gobbler is placed on a tray, cover well with a fluffy, pale orange frosting, swirling it to make him look nice and plump. Sprinkle on feathers with toasted flake coconut. Decorate his tail with candy com. Give him a candy eye and split some licorice



for his feet. I bet he won't last long and it is fun to make.

Another hint that might help is for the big bird. Stuffing a turkey is the time you wish you had a bowl twice or three times larger than the one you have. I have found that when the bowls are not large enough why not use a plas-

tic bag. The small kitchen basket ones work well. First toss in the chopped and diced vegetables, then the bread crumbs and anything else you might use. Mix and toss vigorously as you add each item. Then you can pour in the figuid. Mix again. You will be happy to see no vegetables or crumbs to wipe off the counter and nothing on the floor either.



Thanksgiving is when we all spend a lot of time in the kitchen. Things that we can make ahead gives us a little more time on the big day. I have found a recipe in the cookbook I bought at Lake Shore Farm in Northwood, N.H. It is called *The Story and Recipes of Lake Shore Farm*. There are so many good recipes in the book, many of which are used on the weekends held there. The one I want to tell you about is called:

CRANBERRY RELISH

Grind 2 cups cranberries and 2 small oranges (remove seeds, leave rinds) Add and mix together... 1 15-oz can drained, crushed pinasaple 1% cups sugar

Store in a covered jar. Make at least one day before serving, It will keep a week or more.

It does sound easy and anything the Rings would have in their cook book must be delicious.

Also taken from The Lake Shore Farm Cookbook is a poem that sounds so appropriate for the month of Thanksgiving, it is called:

RECIPE FOR FRIENDSHIP

Take two heaping cups of patience One heartful of love Two handsful of generosity A dash of laughter One headfull of understanding Sprinkle generously with kindness Add plenty of faith and mix well. Spread over a period of a lifetime And serve everybody you meet.

26 th New England Square and Round Dance Convention

CRISP COLD AIR ... with the smell of woodstoves, winter in the air, leaves gone from the tree, the evergreens standing straight and tall in the horizon ... on the road, hunters with their rifles and red outfits, bright against the background ... indeed VERMONT, a state of four seasons, is always spectacular, no matter what time of year. And we sure do love every bit of it.

How fortunate we are. Our convention committee is all back and eager to start work on a terrific convention in 1984. Last year I was not able to tell you about some of us. At this time I would like to present two outstanding couples on our committee.



FRED & BETTY SMITH

Vice-Chairman, Fred & Betty Smith, live in Essex Junction, Vermont. They have been married 23 years and have 3 daughters and one son, ranging in age from 14 to 22. They have a small farm which produces maple sugar and beef. Fred works full time for IBM and has been active in Boy Scouts for the past 15 years.

When the time arose that Hazen Squares were interested in Round Dancing, knowing their background as round dancers, Evelyn and Al were urged to give it a try. Hard work and many hours of practice were put in, and since that time they have taught many round dancers and developed into outstanding cuers and leaders. They have two workshops a week and are (Continued)

CHALLENGE RAMBLINGS

Do you think that it is ok to call, from Right-Hand Ocean Waves, Half Crazy Switch To A Diamond? I will get back to this later.

This year's September Stomp was not very well attended. I hope that this was because of it being on the Labor Day weekend (normally it is the weekend after), and not a drop in the number of New England challenge dancers. In the good old days, when there was only a small amount of high level dancing available, a Level 3 (A1), Level 4 (A2), or even a Level 5 (C1) dance would draw dancers from a wide area. The dances only happened every once in a while, and that was all of the live high level dancing there was. Maybe the problem is that now there are too many C1 and C2 dances and that dancers go to the local dances instead of a local weekend like the September Stomp.

Keith Guiley was unable to attend the Stomp because of health problems. Ron, Norm, and Dave did a fine job calling, including filling in for Keith. There were no new calls introduced. They did review a few calls from Cherry Ridge. While talking with Dave, I discovered that we had a basic difference of opinion on a concept that I thought we both understood.

Dave called an Offset Column, Half Crazy, Rox Checkmate. The hard part is to realize that you should evaluate your formation (offset columns) once, and then do the whole call. This means that when the centers are doing their checkmate, it is as if they are doing it in Offset Waves, not Offset Columns. This means that the call Dave used is not the same as an Offset Column, Split Checkmate followed by a Offset Column Centers Checkmate.

After that tip, I talked with Dave about how hard the offset column half crazy was, and how one did not re-evaluate the formation half way through. We both agreed on this point. Then we got talking about when you re-evaluate and when you don't. Note that the term "evaluation" is not mentioned in any square dance books that I have seen. However, it is an important term to understand. I gave him Half Crazy Switch To A Diamond as an example in which you have to do the first Switch To A Diamond before you can evaluate who the centers are for the Centers Switch To A Diamond. This is because Switch To A Diamond is a shape changing call (i.e. the starting and ending formations are different).

Dave said that is is not legal to call Haif Crazy Switch To A Diamond. I was very surprised since I have been using that particular variation of Crazy for a while and never had anyone tell me that it was wrong. Also, I could not imagine what there was about it to which he would object. Well, Dave believes that from waves, the only calls that can be done Crazy are those that start in a box of four (i.e. Split). This whole issue would not have come up if I had used Follow Thru as my example! Dave's method has two advantages. First, when he says Crazy, the dancers immediately know in which group of four they are working. Second, the other way, a cell that can be done from both a wave and a box of four would be ambiguous. Name three calls that can be done from both a box and a wave.

Why in my 9 years of dancing have Dave and I never noticed that we have this basic disagreement? Well, his version of Crazy is a subset of mine, and I dance his material much more often than he dances mine. How many other little areas of choreography problems are there? Probably lots, but in general, they don't matter very much. Who is right with respect to the Crazy problem? I will leave that as an exercise to the reader?

Chip's TIP



A strong memory of the recent past is of a cool, dark and clear late September night in Putnam Park. The park is one of Connecticut's historical places and a two-day 18th century weekend was held there.

There were troops from many states and units, both revolutionary and for the Crown. Many men and women were camping overnight and it was these people that danced with me as a dancing master by the light of two fires and six candle lanterns.

My good friends Betsy Anderson (Fiddle) and Pat Disque (Recorder) supplied the unamplified dance music. All in attendance were dressed in clothes of the period. We danced, warmed ourselves at the fire and danced some more.

The day saw Fran and I performing the minuet time and again on the grass just outside the park museum. In keeping with the past we never danced using exactly the same number of steps. Dukes and Tomlinson (1752 and 1735 respectively.) mention the latitudes allowed while keeping to the form.

Our problem was that we have only danced to a recording and an arrangement of figures and steps to fit that recording. Betsy and Pat were playing King George the Third's Minuel (Which was very popular in the colonies during the war.) and Fran and I couldn't seem to get our steps and figures to come out the same way, ever.

Our performances seemed well appreciated and we had many an interesting talk with the never-ending stream of people coming and going to view the various sights at the weekend. Living History Foundation, of which I'm a director, sponsored the affair and we're already looking forward to next year!

Earlier in the month Fran and I came down from a stay at our lakeside property near Bangor, Maine so that I could staff at Maine Folk Dance Camp in Bridgeton.

The weekend is geared to International Folk Dancing and so I didn't do a lot of calling as there are so many leaders and dances to fit in each day and evening. I did enjoy the people and the lood very much.

There were some very interesting, and sometimes heated, discussions on various topics of interest to folk dancers of all sorts. Onc, 1 recall, had to do with who was

responsible for the way a regular group dances and behaves on the floor of a Saturday night dance.

I've had go-rounds on this topic in the past with leaders in both traditional and club dancing. What follows is my point of view, my opinions, of the situation.

I call for various regularly scheduled traditional dance groups on a schedule that brings me to any given hall of dancers about once a year. Some groups dance well while others,... not so well. (I'm not talking about figuring or "level" but about phrasing, consideration of other dancers and roughness.)

I have refused to go back to one place in my state as the dance is simply a "job" to me. Phrasing is not very important as half the floor is off most of the time. Twirling in inappropriate places is the rule and no consideration seems to be given to whether or not anyone else is near the dervishes.

The questions that come up are: Do I, as a one-shot guest caller, have to spend the night trying to restore law-and-order? With the dance being advertised as a dance and not a workshop should I spend the necessary time to set things right? Do the dancers want it?

Another question that arises is: Who have the preceding four or five guest callers been? Top names like Parkes, Sannella, Whynot, Leger or some of newer or not-so-top leaders. (IT MAKES A DIFFER-ENCE!) And what leaders will be following?

Now where does this leave me? Well, I continually make comments about keeping on the phrase while calling if I see the need. If the swinging or twirling is atrocious I'll take time to do some instructing. But I won't take too much time.

What i call and how I call it can help to some extent, too. Tempos and choice of music and programming all have their part. My small flyer, To Twirt or Not to Twirt, is something that can reach many more dancers than I personally can. That's another approach.

In the end however, I feel it's up to the sponsoring group to set the dancing standards and see that they are maintained. When any of us, our family, friends etc. attend any public function the sponsoring

eople seem to want to classify each other into nice, tidy cubby holes and, having done so, never again to question the original classification. Square dancers are no different and I have often had the occasion to observe this characteristic because I am fairly outspoken about my beliefs. Often people are surprised to find me calling the CALLER-LAB ADVANCED program. I suppose the surprise comes about because I have so loudly advocated more MAINSTREAM dancing and even worked hard to promote a BASIC dance program. I was also Chairman of the CALLERLAB Basic Program Committee.

I don't find it surprising that a caller who is interested in making the entry into square dancing easier for new graduates is also interested in development of a program of dancing that serves the needs of experienced, active dancers. However, there seem to be many who regard these two interests as incompatible. If you are one of those who believes that these two interests (MAINSTREAM and ADVANCED) must somehow be in conflict, I urge you to reconsider your belief. The fact that I teach a beginning square dance class does not mean that I do not call for ADVANCED dancing. People do not have to fit into just one, tidy cubby hole. We are allowed to spill over into others. The next time you see someone who dances the ADVANCED calls attending a MAINSTREAM dance—don't ask them what they are doing there. They're dancing.

Under The Double Eagle

(Veronica Ann McClure is probably known to most Coller readers as a round dence leader. However, she wears two hats, the other that of dance historian. She is writing this series of articles for us from this combined perspective.)

Last month I offered to give some background information about the history of round dancing in hopes of clearing up some misunderstandings which may be contributing to confusion and dissension among some dancers and leaders. I will start by providing a very short history of 18th and 19th century social dancing with the warning that to be short enough to fit into an article like this, it may have to be somewhat superficial. If there is something you would like to know more about as we go along, I invite you to ask me either directly or through The Caller.

Through the 18th century, dancing in polite circumstances was done in groups of couples or individual couples and always with recognition of the other people present, whether sitting or dancing. The group dances most popular at the end of the 18th century were the "longways for as many as will" which today are known as contradances. In these dances, each dancer is aware of many other dancers in addition to his or her partner. The couple dances such as the minuet involved very little physical contact except for an occasional handhold. They were performed as much for those watching as for those dancing and so once again the attention of the dancers was not concentrated on partners only.

In folk or peasant groups, the dancing was not so formal and although the classes borrowed from one another, there really was a difference in the way they danced. In the Germanic areas the folk dances included various kinds of couple turning dances, with definite partner contact, and sometimes very obvious courting.

When elements of formal dancing and folk dancing fused in the early waltz (1790-1830), they created two very new features in the ball-room. One of these was the way couples focused on one another, instead of on the larger group, and the other was the physical contact and turning around together. Thus the first "round dance" as we use the term today was the early waltz. Because of the tremendous impact the waltz had, all couple dances after that were called "waltzes" or "round dances", even if they were not in triple time or did not go around! As late as the 1890's dancing masters still refer to the "galop-waltz" which, described

in today's round dancing terminology, is a fastpaced progression of side, closes in semiclosed position, to 2/4 or 4/4 music.

In the meantime, the group dances continued too, although changing along the way. The long lines of the contra lost popularity in the most fashionable circles to give way to the quadrille. The quadrille was definitely a square dance with the basic formation of four couples, one to each side of a square. The quadrilles were carefully timed to fit the music exactly, and there were a large number of figures which could be described in today's square dance terminology.

The style of dancing both the waltz and the quadrilles in the first third of the 19th century was by today's standards very balletic. The legs and feet were turned out, one moved very high on the ball of the foot, and many light, springy jumps and hops were used with very clear gestures of the leg. Dancing this way can be very demanding and serobic.

As the 19th century progressed, clothing became heavier and heavier for both men and women, particularly as an increasing number of petticoats, hoops and bustles came in and out of fashion. It is not surprising that the dancing was not so ambitious as earlier. Also, the populations of the cities were changing as upward mobility and new money brought persons into the ballroom who had not had the benefit of training since childhood in either dancing or manners. Games set to music began to take their place in the ballroom along with the group and couple dances. Dancing masters had to take more and more time away from dancing to teach certain of their pupils not to spit, swear and chew tobacco in the ballroom and to wash before putting on their newly purchased clothes. As the teachers spent more time on behavior rather than dancing, their reputability began to decline.

By the end of the 19th century, the dancing was regularized into a program of lancers, a kind of quadrille often set to military music, and to round dances especially waltzes with a few two-steps, and certainly a galop before the night's program ended. Thus, no matter what other changes occurred, all through the 19th century a fashionable ball consisted of squares

re you in search of a leisure activity that is enjoyable, self rewarding and promotes good health? In this modern day 20th century, we spend a considerable amount of time working so hard when we aren't working. It all becomes a matter of surviving leisure time.

Our pioneering forebearers had to contend with pestilence and disease, primitive transportation and poor medical care, brutal winters with minimal food and heating and a host of other hardships. But all that is nothing compared to the dilemma facing us - that tormenting treacherous modern minefield - surviving spare time. Do you think Kit Carson could have spent 40 hours a week in front of a TV set, the intellectual equivalent of being scalped? Would Buffelo Bill have had the fortitude to roller skate across city streets while simultaneously having his ear blown off by the Rolling Stones through stereo earphones? Would Benjamin Franklin have spent his Sunday afternoon and three weeknights wrestling with a crossword puzzle? Of course not, These people were too busy discovering and developing this country to worry about killing time. None of them had to worry about such afflictions as tennis elbow, joggers itch, frisbee finger or surfers knot.

And it's gerting more dangerous all the time. What about the man who got so frustrated with a crossword puzzle he drove the tip of a pencil into his leg and got blood poisoning, the woman who ended up with a painful bone protuberance in her elbow that resulted from her labredor retriever dragging her from fire hydrant to fire hydrant. Each new fad

brings with it a new hazardous condition. Remember all the back pains people experienced in the late 50's dance craze called the twist. Today's disco dancing, with its finger snapping requirements, has resulted in infected callouses and thumb sprains. The thumb has become the most abused part of our human anatomy. Try turning your TV dial without it, There are those who have experienced everything from blisters to broken bones in their thumbs as they bucked the macho status on mechanical bulls and those who have painful thumb abrasions trying to master Rubiks cube. Running for instance, can bring about bone spurs, achilles tendon tears and tendonitis of the knees and sets the stage for other injuries such as dog bites, getting struck by a milk truck or attacked by muggers. In this modern day of video games one can develop Space Invaders wrist or bugged red eyes. Recently categorized by the medical profession is slot machine tendonitis, an upper arm malady that results from cranking the one armed bandits. In the adventurous and daring, there are such activities as parachute jumping, gliding, swift water canoeing, etc. to make our leisure activities even more exciting.

If you have tried one, any, or all of these, a great way to survive your leisure time is to take up square dancing. Why not try the leisure time activity of our forebearers and one that has stood the test of time — square dancing — and eliminate the hazard and frustrations of other activities.

 (Under The Double Eagle Cont...) and rounds with a few novelty items. Dancers were their most elegant gowns or tails and best starched shirts.

I will save the 20th century for later. I would like to emphasize here that for a whole century squares and rounds constituted the most elegant balls. These are some of our immediate ancestors. We will discuss the rural side too, but here please note that the rural side is not the only side. Our heritage is perhaps broader and more diversified than we

thought. Secondly, I would like to point out the balletic aspects of the admired movement style. This too lasted all through the century, even as its practice declined.

Line/Solo DANCE CORNER

ine Dancing took a giant step forward on Sunday of the Labor Day weekend. Three hundred and thirty-five line dance enthusiasts danced for 9 straight hours in Pawtucket, R.I. at the St. Maria Goretti Parish Hall. Seventeen line dance Instructors/Leaders/Cuers, each with an allotted one-half hour, kept the amplifiers hot with literally hundreds of records spinning all the classic as well as the latest line dance "hits."

Proceeds of this giant line dance festival, the first of its kind, went to the WPRO (R.I. radio station) Muscular Dystrophy Drive. \$1039.35 was turned over by the dance cochairmen, Rosemary & Ed Coyle and Judy Clays. The Master of Ceremonies, Ed Coyle, kept the dance schedule running smoothly while many friendly helpers from the numerous line dance clubs represented kept the refreshment tables stocked with food and beverages.

Already plans are being formulated to make this an annual affair on the Labor Day Weekend,

We recommend that you preserve your Line Dance Manuals #1 and #2 as they may well become soon a collector's item. The supply may become exhausted in the next few months and a decision has been made which negates any new printing of these manuals, Instead, we think a third book will be printed during the winter months which will include many of the dances, especially the "classics" from the first two books, along with 75 newer dances, all in one manual. It will sell for a nominal price but considerably higher than the present books.

To the new readers of The New England Square Dance Caller Magazine, particularly the line dance people, I wish to call your attention to one columnist in our magazine from whom you will get many tips and suggestions on music, phrasing, choreography, in short, invaluable information which could help you improve the quality of your dances. The author is Chip Hendrickson and he writes the column entitled, "Chips's Tip." Don't miss it.

When I teach a line dance class I utilize what is called "The Longley Modular Method of Teaching a Skill." This necessitates numing various segments of the dance. When using -- "Step with the right foot to the right side, close the left foot to the right foot, step with the right foot again to the right, touch left foot beside the right foot;" I like to call it, "Basic One to the Right." Obviously, when using the opposite footwork, I call it "Basic One to the Left," and to carry this a bit further, "Basic One -- Both Ways," you guessed it, is the combination of the two. Try it, I think you will like it.

POSITION: Solo, all facing Head of Hall

- Basic rhumba left ½ box: Step LF to L side, close RF to LF, step LF fwd, hold;

- 7 Turn ¼ left at same time step bwd on LF, rock fwd onto RF in place, close LF to RF at same time turn and face HOH, hold;
- 8 Reverse from Measure seven facing right wall;
- 9 Repeat measure seven facing left wall again;
- 10 Roll full circle right in 3 steps: —— RF, LF, RF, hold; (now facing HOH)
- 11 Scissor left: Step LF to L side, close RF to LF, step LF XIF RF, hold;
- 12 Reverse from Measure eleven – opposite footwork;
- 13 Repeat Measure eleven:
- 14 Repeat Measure twelve;
- 15 Side in place together – Step LF to L side, rock back onto RF in place, close LF to RF, hold:
- 16 Reverse from Measure fifteen with opposite footwork and direction;
- 17 Step LF fwd, rock back onto RF in place, close LF to RF, hold;
- 18 Step RF bwd, rock fwd onto LF in place, close RF to LF, hold;
- 19 Roll full circle right using 4 paddle steps step LF XIF RF, step RF in place as turn ¼ (one paddle step), then step LF XIF RF, step RF in place as turn ¼;
- 20 Repeat Measure nineteen (completing the four "paddles");
- 21 Repeat 1/2 Box Rhumba - Measure 5;
- 22 Repeat Measure 6
- 23 Step LF XIF RF at same time turn to face right wall, rock back onto RF in place, close LF to RF at same time turn to face HOH, hold;
- 24 Reverse from Measure 23 Opposite footwork and direction;
- 25 Repeat Measure 23
- 26 Roll left full turn in three steps Step RF, LF, RF, hold.

APPLAUSE! APPLAUSE!

Applause is a wonderful way of saying, "Thanks!" Like a smile, it costs nothing and yet provides great dividends. It is a sort of lubricant that keeps both dencers and callers operating smoothly. Applause tells the caller that his efforts are appreciated and his response probably will be to work even harder. It tells the other dancers in the square that you enjoyed dencing with them, and they will feel wanted and appreciated. It is a way of saying to one-self, "That square was fun, and I did my part in making it so."

Applause is just another way of sharing the joy of square dancing. Everybody gains something from the simple act of hitting the palms of the hands together. Some feel that the custom of all joining hands in the middle of the square for a big "thank you" in unison is a bit impersonal and lacks the succeity, eye-to-eye contact, and enthusiasm that individual "thank you's" and a round of applause carry. However, this is a matter of personal taste, However you decide to do it, do not forget this essential courtesy of saying "thank you". It is an integral part of square dancing. We suggest a round of applause for APPLAUSE.

THANKS-GIVING — As time approaches when there is a chill in the air, the TV screen is largely occupied by football on the weekends and the turkeys are getting nervous, it is customary to recount the many things for which we should be grateful. To that long list, which should be familiar to citizens of this great country, we can add Square Dancing with some pride and say "THANKS" for the fun and friendship it brings.

Square & Round Dance Clubs

25th Anniversary

One evening in December, 1957, an invited group of fourteen people met at the home of Stu and Jan Hall for the purpose of organizing Rhode Island Square Dance Clubs to "preserve and encourage square and round dancing." Right from the start, round dancers were included in the Federation and callers and cuers were invited to participate. This meeting was the birthday of the Rhode Island Federation of Square and Round Dance Clubs.

Included in that group were representatives from six clubs. Of that group of six clubs, three are still dancing: Friendly Mixers, Merrymates and Western Whirlers.

Reading the minutes, one discovers that the committees were known as "small groups" and general meetings with delegates were known as "large groups".

The first president was Stu Hall followed in 1960 by Russ Bullock and George Dady in 1961.

In June, 1958, the first newsletter was published which was the forerunner of the *Square Dancers*, the present publication. That year the Federation sponsored its first dance, the forerunner of the present Festival.

At first, meetings were held in members' homes, but, as the group grew, a larger hall was needed and in June, 1961, the meetings were moved to the YWCA in Providence. By January, 1962, there were 26 clubs in the Federation.

In June of that year, the Banner Program was inaugurated which is still in operation and the meeting place was changed to the YMCA where meetings are still held. In June, 1964, there were 45 member clubs in the Federation.

In June, 1962, Herb Preston became President, followed in 1964 by Lenny LePore. In November, 1964, the Rhody Rover Badge was started to encourage dancing between members of the clubs in the Federation. Dancers received a small book which they had signed by an officer of each new club they danced with. They must dance with a specific number of clubs based on the number of clubs in the Federation at the time. A Rhody Rover Badge is presented with appropriate ceremonies when the book is completed.

Bob DelRosso became president in 1965 and the Federation nowhad a membership of 56 clubs. The records for June, 1967, show that members of the Federation attended a meeting at which Charlie Baldwin proposed establishing a square dance museum to collect and store memorabilia concerned with square dancing. This, apparently, was the start of the present Square Dance Foundation of New England.

Dick Miller became president in 1969 followed by Joe White in 1971 and John Page in 1975.

Francis Paquin was president in 1973. In 1973 and 1974, the Federation co-hosted the 14th an 15th New England Square & Round Dance Conventions and members served as chairmen of committees,

Round table discussions and a leadership seminar were introduced.

Leo Wilde became President in 1977. Now the Federation started the project of preparing maps of the location of each square dance hall in the area for the convenience of the dancers. This directory was completed and distributed to the dancers and was so well received that a second printing and distribution will be made in late 1983.

Ernie Worsley became President in 1979 followed by Walt Neiderlitz in June, 1981.

The Federation arranged for and made available liability insurance for all its clubs at a rate which any club could afford.

Bill Pommenville became President in 1983 and the Federation is off on another exciting period of growth and activity. It will be actively involved in the work of preparing for the New England Square & Round Dance Conventions which will be held in Providence in 1985-1986. Many of the members are on the convention committees with Bill & Maggie Pommenville as General Chairman and Walt & Priscilla Neiderlitz as Vice Chairman, Delegates to the Federation are already enthusiastic in their desire to be of help.

As the Federation starts its second 25 years of Dancing, interest and morale are high, To celebrate, the Federation will be sponsoring a Silver Anniversary Dance on November 11 at Ponagansett High School.





~ Editor's Notebook -

Those who bring sunshine into the lives of others cannot keep it from themselves.


The laws of love, of service, of giving, cannot be evaded or repealed.

FALSE PIPING

False Piping - What is it? What do I mean? False Piping is my own term for indicating a little edging of contrasting color without the bulk of true piping. It is very successfully used on a curving neckline, or as a finish to a ruffled cuff, which would also serve as a lining to the cuff ruffle (very effective). I like to use it also to set off rick rack which is set behind the edge. (See sketch A.)

Making false piping is very simple. It involves the use of the facing, so I simply use the contrast color that I would want for piping as my facing color. I cut the neck facing making it at least one half inch wider than usual. Then I cut an interfacing of lightweight pellon that would be about half as wide as the facing and proceed as follows.



- Machine baste the pellon onto the back (or inside) of the neckline about one quarter inch down from the edge (this is stitched FLAT against the wrong side of the fabric).
- 2. Lay the facing right side against the right side of the bodice, and pin in place, except at the two shoulder seams. (See sketch 2).



RIGHT OUT



- 3. Turn the whole thing inside out. With a small stitch, follow the machine basting, stitching through all layers up to the shoulder seams, but being careful not to catch the ends of the facings in the stitching. (See sketch 3).
- 4. Turn the bodice right side out. Crease along each shoulder seam. Pin firmly through facing and bodice to hold in place and stitch shoulder seam of each facing being careful not to catch bodice fabric. (I like to use zipper foot for this.) See shetch 4. Trim ends of facing, if needed, and press shoulder seam flat. Complete stitching of facing across each shoulder.
- 5. With straight scissors, trim the seam edge to one eighth of an inch or a tiny bit more, being sure to trim evenly. Turn the facing to the inside and hand baste neatly and evenly, leaving the seam edge standing up and the facing laid gently over it to give the impression of piping. Top stitch on the bodice neatly, close in to the piping with thread that matches the bodice fabric, but leaving thread that matches the facing on the bobin. I use the zipper foot for this job.
- 6. Catch the facing at both shoulder seams, and if you have lined the bodics you can go ahead and loosely hem the facing to the lining.

If you have ruffled cuffs on the sleeves you can do the same thing but you will not need interfacing. Make the facing wide enough to carry up far enough into the sleeve to let it make the casing for the elastic, also.

What could be simpler? Thanks, Dottie.

They are a great help to all of us who sew for square dancing, especially those of us who are not professionals, but find our way by trial and error. It is fun to share ideas with each other, and I hope we can continue to do so for a long time.

Line/Solo DANCE CORNER

By Dr. Grant Longley

esterday, I went to a large wedding for a pair of 23-year olds. Much to my amazement, the orchestra played at the reception no line dance, no square or round dance, no cha, cha, no rhumba, and no folk dance. One polka was danced by the parents of the wedding party, while the only music the young crowd (which predominated) would attempt was a very slow foxtrot where they swayed back and forth in a sort of rock, recover manner along with various speed disco-style music (no contact with partner as each person does his/her own "thing").

What a pityl All of us who read this magazine can have empathy for the younger generation but there is no point in expressing sympathy because they do not know what they are missing.

How are we going to help them LEARN or UNDERSTAND the enjoys of social ball-room, square and round dancing, modern dancing, folk and line dancing? This constitutes a large spectrum with which they are not familiar. As leaders/teachers/callers/cuers/instructors we have a large assignment. Who wants to pick up the cudgel?

It is high time that I publicly explain two procedures used by me in writing: LINE DANCE MANUAL and SOLO DANCE MANUAL (although no one directly has questioned me on either procedure).

First, almost every dance written in the two books has been danced by me at one time or another. Likewise, I have taught at least fifty percent of the dances, yet I have labelled almost all of the dances with the statement, "as taught by Dr. Grant Longley". In no way is the reader expected to believe that the auth-

or had anything to do with the choreography of the dance. Neither has the author altered the dance in any way (other than where noted). This quote is only to signify to the reading public, for the sake of unification, the dance in the MANUAL is considered by the author to be the original or only dance by that name danced with that music. As an example, I know well six New York, New Yorks. Which one should be designated N.Y., N.Y. #1, which one #2, etc.? A real perplexing situation! It is the author's hope and goal that the dances published in the two MANUALS will set the in the field of LINE/SOLO "standard" DANCING.

One further thought – when a person choreographs a new dance, wouldn't it make good sense to use a recording which, as far as you know, has never been used for a line dance? Let's not have any more dances written for: N.Y., N.Y., Cabdriver, Elvira, Cecelia, Little Black Book, Hot Lips, Gypsy Rose, Bossa Nova, Sweet Georgia Brown, You're Sixteen and Montego Bay.

The other procedure has to do with the writing method or manner that the dances were written. My friends in the round dance arena suggested and expected that I would use their methodology but I had other friends in the recreation and physical education professions who admittedly had difficulty deciphering round dance terminology. So I devised my own method of using simple, easy language to transcribe the many dances I learned, read about, transposed or just visually saw and had explained to me. It is my sincere wish that my method serves the greatest number of Line/Solo Dance people desiring to use the dance as written.

- 2 CHA/CHA/CHA, CHA/CHA/CHA -- Stepping forward do LF/RF/LF again a bit fwd RF/LF/RF;
- 3 VINE LEFT Reverse Measure one Step LF to L side, Step RF XIB LF, step LF to L side, touch right toe beside LF;
- 4 CHA/CHA/CHA, CHA/CHA/CHA Repeat Measure two in reverse order;
- 5 BACK AND POINT BACK -- Step RF bwd, point L toe diagonally back and turn body ¼ left, step LF bwd, point R toe diag, bwd and turn body ¼R; (On each point clap hands over shoulder)
- 6 BACK AND POINT BACK Repeat Measure five;
- 7 POINT SIDE AND CROSS -- Point R toe to R side, cross RF in front of LF, point L toe to side left, cross LF in front RF; (Optional: swing both hands and arms together as a unit first to the right, then left)
- 8 POINT SIDE AND CROSS -- Repeat Measure seven.

"KRIS KRINGLES"

1-12 oz. pkg, chocolate bits 1¼ stick margarine or butter

1/2 cup sugar

1 cup flour

2 eggs (beaten)

1/2 cup chopped nuts

Melt 2/3 pkg, of choc, bits with butter, remove from heat, add sugar, flour and eggs. Mix well and spread in a 9 x 13 greased pan. Sprinkle with remaining bits and nuts. Bake at 400 degrees 12 to 15 min. Do not overbake. Thanks for such a nice easy recipe, Pat.



A cute table decoration for the Holiday Parties is a fun project for everyone in the family to help with. It involves ice cream cones that will in turn become:

"THREE WISE MEN"

Materials needed:

3 ice cream cones — for bodies

3 white foam balls, 1" diam, for heads

3 cans spray paint - pink, lavendar, green

1 pkg. angel hair, curly - for beards White glue

1 pkg.of cup sequins - for eyes & mouth Braid or decoupage for trim







Spray paint the ice cream cones in different colors. Let dry. Take a pencil and poke a hole in each white foam ball, big enough so that the ball will fit down onto the top of the cone, (Figure 1). Glue to hold. Make hats of different materials, such as tops from detergent bottles, cloth, foil, felt, etc. Paint and decorate and glue to top of head. Make beards of angel hair and glue to face. Glue sequins to face for eyes and mouth. Decorate bodies with braid and sequins. Glue to secure.

e've all heard of or attended a square dance wedding – but a clogging wedding?

Let's go back in time a bit. A year ago, several of my students made a trek down south for a clogging weekend. Barbara, who is also a pilot, invited her friend David to accompany her in the plane she was flying down – not a bad choice since he's an airline mechanic. David, who had never heard of clogging, after a weekend of witnessing this frenetic activity, fell for it "hook, line and tap shoe" and promptly enrolled in my next session of classes. Subject: PROGRESS IS AN IMPORTANT PRODUCT.

wenty Five years ago contemporary square dancing did not include teen-agers. Sometime later when teen-age groups organized, some adult clubs did not welcome them and other clubs allowed them to dance only if they had their own set. It was not a question of ability which was far greater than adults, it was more a problem of tall and short stature dancing together as partners. Teenagers grow up, get married, raise a family and usually have to curtail their square dance activity but usually resume in later life. Twenty Five years ago there was no singleton clubs per se, however some conventions did have a hitching post.


Round dancing was not as popular as today. Not many round dance classes were to be found and the square dance program allowed one or less rounds between tips sometimes mixed with folk dancing and these were done without cues. The caller furnished the round dance music.

Twenty Five years ago we never heard of the expressions, "Senior Citizen", and now for the first time (starting about five years ago) classes for Senior Citizens is becoming popular. When our group started in N.H. I offered to teach but no takers until two demonstrations and two years later. After 8 lessons they are the most enthusiastic group that I have ever worked with. As one woman said, "This is the first time in my life that I have ever had any real fun." Of course these people do not swell the membership of regular clubs but a few of the sharpest and most active have participated in easy club dancing. They are now starting to entertain at hospitals, clubs, etc. and they impress the onlookers that it is easy to learn, They just want any excuse to dance with no thought of levels. We dance in the afternoon and the church donates the hall and I donate my time but they are always looking for a chance to do me a favor as an equalizer. Let's face it we are all aging every day and if we take care of ourselves we will finally become a Senior Citizen even if we don't care for that title.

If you know of any retired folks that can walk and hear you should encourage them to try square dancing. There are many groups in progress and probably there is one near their home. I believe the caller will give more information soon.

Chip's TIP



The season of anticipation, surprises, dreams and giving is upon us. In keeping with this I thought I'd give you a surprise for December. Fiddler's Surprise to be specific. It's an excellent contra written by fiddler Donna Hinds.

FIDDLER'S SURPRISE

Formation: Longways, duple proper. Music: A 32-bar tune of your choice.

- Is down the outside 2 places, into the center, come up to place and cast off.
- A2 Right and Left
- Is take R hands and turn a little more than half to join L hands with 1st Contra Corner. [2 bars] (The dancer in the opposite line diagonally R from you as you face your partner.) Balance four-in-line, [2 bars]

1s turn R 3/4s and join hands with 2d Contra Corner, [2 bars] (The dancer in the opposite line diagonally L from you as you face your partner.)

Balance four-in-line. [2 bars]

B2 All Allemande Left [4 bars] and Is Swing in the center. [4 bars]

I first became aware of this contra while dancing in one of the NEFFA Festival halls last April and took some quick notes. Authorship was made known to me months later.

Someone told me that Tony Parkes, Donna's husband, gave the dance its name but when I asked Donna for permission to print the dance she couldn't confirm that story. We spoke about it in a brief conversation at the Concord Scout House last October after the dance I'd called there as part of the series run by Tony and Donna.

In the realm of dreams, Ralph Page has had one for some time now about running an all-American dance weekend with a particular staff of leaders. His dream will become reality next June when he, Dick Leger, Marianne Taylor and 1 come together to do Lancers, squares, old-time rounds and contras. Saturday night will

find New England Tradition, supplying the music for the dance. In case you're not familiar with the group, that's April Limber - fiddle, Bob McQuillan - piano, and Pete Colby - banjo. I've worked with all of these fine folk and it is quite a staff.

There was a dream-like atmosphere at the annual Brigade of the American Revolution dinner that Fran and I attendend last October. It's held in the "temple" at the New Windsor, New York Cantonment state park. We were served a three-course 18th century style dinner in a room lit mainly by candles on the walls. (There was some dim indirect electric light.)

There were over 150 in attendance and all were in well-researched period cloth-There were many more civilian outfits this year than last. After the banquet Fran and I walked a minuet and as a dancing master I led the country dances using records.

In order to be heard and save my voice I put my remote microphone system to work and hid the mic in the ruffles of my shirt. When I called the dancers up I was standing in the middle of the room and a lady turned to Fran and asked her how I managed to project my voice so well! (Ah, modern 18th C. technology.)

I have worked with these people offand-on for over a year and this particular night I was able to get them all through the Hey on Your Own Side using that teaching dance of mine that I published some time ago in this column. There seems to be more interest in the dancing aspect of the 18th C. hobby now. Maybe the folks have done some research and are finding out how much dancing our forefathers did.

Which reminds me of the approach that I often see and hear concerning being a square dancer today. The "Out of the barn and into the modern era" angle.

I'll grant you that at one point, and even now, there are dances held in barns. But, and it's a big but, when a farm is a working farm, how much time in the whole year is the barn empty enough to hold a dance inside? And why would anyone in their right mind want to dance in a working barn? Ever smell one?

How does one explain all those town halls with a second floor that was sprung for dancing? Why would anyone want to wear working clothes (Overalls, etc.) to a social event? Ever smell them?

In the early years of our country people danced as part of their lives and not as a hobby as we do today. In the 18th century one could find a social life in New England that mirrored that of London Up-to-date with the fashions and dances along the coast and months behind in the smaller inland villages.


If you want to use the past as a selling point mention the fact that almost all the leaders and founders of the country danced. With class and style and wearing their best. Right on up to this century this was the rule and not the exception.

Hollywood and Madison Avenue have their own ideas and these are accepted by many which is too bad because the aforementioned rarely have their ideas rooted in any reality but that of getting the cash to flow in a desired direction. For instance; if a fiddle squeaked it was because the fiddler wasn't a good one. (Fiddles don't squeak automatically.)

So maybe it would be better to accent the wonderful and larger reality of our dancing past and just ignore some of the not-so-favorable recent past. If you've got a good product it'll sell. If not, you're in trouble.

MIX TO A DIAMOND starts from any generalized line of four dancers. Although the definition is the same from any starting formation, we will first look at it from a two faced line (figure 1), since this is the most common and most useful version at the plus program. Centers Cross Run (figure 2) and new centers Hinge (figure 3) to end in a diamond.

Generalized lines also include lines of four facing in or back to back, 3 and 1 lines, inverted lines, and ocean waves. The next most likely place that we would see it at a plus dance would be from an ocean wave (figure 4) to a facing diamond (figure 5). Let's also look at a normal line of four (figure 6) to show some variety. Centers Cross Run (figure 7), and don't forget the left shoulder pass rule on any cross move. New centers now Hinge (figure 8). In this case it is a partner Hinge instead of the Single Hinge it was in the previous examples.

The diamond in figure 8 is known, at C2, as a funny diamond. I'm sure many plus dancers would consider it a funny diamond also!

As with Ripple that I discussed in the October issue, the author of Mix To A Diamond did not successfully do all his research before publishing the call, and as with Ripple, the Callerlab plus QS committee chairman was aware of the conflict, but in this case I feel the selection was not a mistake (but of course I'm prejudiced.) Unlike Ripple, the name has not been used before to describe a different action (and one being commonly used in one of the Callerlab programs at that.) The action, however, had previously and independently been thought of by two other prominent choreographers. Norm Poisson (Mass.) called it Cross Roll To A Diamond when he thought of it and Bill Davis (Calif.) called it Shift To A Diamond. John Sybalski (Calif.) was nice enough to make me aware of the previous two incarnations of the movement.

It is only speculation as to why, after the third try, the call is now seeing common usage (Cross Roll To A Diamond had limited C4 use), but my guess is that the new name is more descriptive than the previous ones. Dancers at A2 who dance Mix and who dance Switch To A Diamond just about don't need a teach to dance it, whereas, C1 dancers who also know Cross Roll To A Wave require some additional explanation to dance Cross Roll To A Diamond. This is not a new phenomenon. A few years ago Track And Trade made it as a Quarterly Selection, only after it had been created by four different authors and given four different names.

I'm afraid we will have to save description and comment on Spin Chain And Exchange The Gears for another time, but I'll quickly say that it starts like a Spin Chain The Gears (+), then follows an Exchange The Diamond (C2) pattern, and finishes like a Walk Out To A Wave (C2). I know that won't help, but I will say its lengthy pattern has been enjoyed by many dancers at workshops around the country for many months now.

Dear Bill:

How long should I dance Plus-2 before I go for A-1?

"Three years," say some callers. I disagree. The determining factor is your competency at dancing all (repeat, all) the calls through Plus-2. A new dancer who attends workshops and dances several times a week can be qualified to undertake A-1 in a year or even less. It's like learning the Multiplication Tobles. A child is ready for "nine times" as soon as (but not a minute earlier) he has mastered "eight times". But he should be able to do the "eights" not only from the top down, but from the bottom up and from either direction from the middle.

Dear Rill:

Time after time I attend a dance advertised as being Plus level, only to discover the club's/ caller's idea of Plus is an occasional Relay the Deucy. Why don't clubs deliver what they promise?

Some do, and it's a joy when you find one. But many could make use of a Truth-in-Advertising Code. What's needed is a clearly-stated agreement between the club and the caller as to what the level of the given dance shall be. If it's plus-2, then he calls Plus-2, for the entire dance. Period. He does not subsequently lower the level because a portion of the floor broke down on the first tip. To lower the level in such a case is a gross injustice to those who came in anticipation of dancing at the advertised level. (If the club wants the dence to be "at the level of the floor", let it so be stated in advance.)

One Plus-2 club I know of, hoping to keep satisfied both its members and those of its guests who were less-experienced/competent, asked a certain scheduled guest caller to make every third tip a high level Plus-2, while keeping the other tips "relaxed". The caller's wife was, to put it mildly, perturbed. "You never," she said in italics, "tell a caller what to do!"



CHALLENGE RAMBLINGS

The many friends of David and Barbara Sullivan will be saddened to hear of Dave's death September 17, 1983 after a long illness. Dave was a founding member of the Seven Hills Square Dance Club (Skip Smith) in 1967. In addition to serving as president of that club, he was also a member of Baypath Squares, Sacro-earl-icas (Earl Johnston), and Jay King's Scrambled Eights. Dave attended all of the National Conventions from 1973 to 1983. In addition, he has been active in Round Dancing. When he developed an interest in advanced and challenge dancing, he was told to get a square together and learn by dancing to tapes. In the fall of 1988 he formed the Cellar Hoppers, a series of groups that both dance to tapes and imports live callers. The Cellar Hoppers are still going strong with an ever increasing set of callers coming through the area each year.

However, numbers and years dancing don't tell the whole story. At one challenge dance Dave looked at his corner and asked her (maybe somewhat gruffly since that is how Dave often struck people when they first met him) how long she had been dancing this level. She replied that this was her first dance at this level and that she was somewhat nervous. Dave told her that she should be his partner, not his corner and proceeded to dance with and help her for the rest of the dance.

The Sullivans denced all of the levels all of the time. One caller with whom I spoke recalled a four hour fun night at which the Sullivans danced every tip and stayed till the end, having a good time dancing with kids. Daye was good at supporting callers and groups. He was a caller himself.

Dave knew that one can't recruit C2 dancers out of thin air forever, one has to keep a C1 program feeding the C2 group. This "feeding" starts by teaching beginners Mainstream. Dave did his part by teaching beginners in the Concord schools. At first he used a series of teaching tapes. Later he became interested in calling and supplemented the tapes with his own calling. I have also heard him call at friends weddings and in the challenge hall at New England Convention.

Dave was always happy to have a discussion with you which sounded like a heated argument, but in fact he never put you on the defensive and the arguments were never emotional ones. He was interested in choreography and always had new ideas to suggest. The call Snake, which has made it into chellenge dancing, was invented by Dave.

As Dave was getting sicker, he insisted on continuing having callers in and running dances and weekends. Usually the caller was scheduled in for the same time next year. Dave must have known that he might not make it for another year, but he kept on doing what he enjoyed, dancing, calling, teaching, and running square dances. During his last week, knowing that a caller was supposed to call a dance that weekend, his last words were, "don't cancel the dances."

And Dave, we didn't.

ROUND DANCING

OLD AND NEW AT THE SAME TIME

(Veronica Ann McClure is probably known to most Caller readers as a round dance leader. However, she wears two hats, the other that of dance historian. She is writing this series of articles for us from this combined perspective.)

As described in the November Caller, squares and rounds (in today's language) made up most of a typical dance program as fashionable 19th century balls. Because anyone who wanted to be someone wanted to attend these dances and fit right in, there was a definite market for the dance and etiquette books produced in great numbers.

The most popular dances were widely discussed and debated in these books while less familiar dances were described in almost identical terms from one writer to another. We may have a parallel situation in round dancing today as how to dance the waltzes and two-steps typically learned in the first year or two of round dancing is widely discussed and argued while other dances used less frequently do not receive so much attention.

These 19th century ballroom manuals were used extensively by Lloyd "Pappy" Shaw in his research. He gives a detailed account of the library he accumulated and used in his book Round Dancing. When Henry Ford sponsored his revival of 19th century dancing at Deerfield, MI, he brought in a dance teacher who had been a young man in the 19th century and who had not given up the waltzes and lancers as ragtime and roaring 20's dances moved into the spotlight. Clearly, there is a definite link to the 19th Century which if understood sheds light on things we take for granted today, or which seem to be pivotal in the current discussions about what is round dancing and where is it going. Terms such as "shoulder lead" and "toe or ball of the foot lead" used by Roundalab make more sense. I will try to give more detail on this in future articles. If you attend one of Vagabonds dance history demonstrations, you may see some of these things we are discussing.

The 19th century dance manuals treat a short sequence or even just one or two step patterns as if they were whole dances. Today's (1980's) round dances, even those taught in the first year of dancing, seem to have a wider variety of steps and figures than many of the

19th century dances. However, it is important to realize that in the 1940's and 50's, when our modern round dancing was just beginning, this was not true. Round dances were simpler, both in the number of step patterns and in the complexity of the routines — another link to our 19th century origins.

Also, it is important to remember that early modern round dances were memorized by the dancers. Cueing and the standardization of cues is only a very, very recent innovation when seen in this larger context, and definitely in an early stage of development.

A phenomena of group dynamics is that when increasing numbers of people join in an activity, the activity may change. This usually makes some people quite happy and annoys others greatly. Often the scope of the activity widens as a result of the increasing activity. This sequence of events happens over and over and is happening in round dancing now.

So here we have cueing as a relatively new development coinciding with a time of many changes and a broadening of the activity. No wonder cueing and the standardization of cue words is imperfect! Perhaps this long-range perspective will help us to direct our energies towards positive developments rather than fretting over things we cannot change (do we want to reduce the amount of activity in round dancing?).

Thanks to Paul Schatz who wrote me a concerned letter about differences he sees in round dancing today, including cueing, and thus inspired this article. It is my fervent belief and hope that understanding how we got here (our history) will help us to make good decisions about where to go from here, and promote discussions rather than arguments along the way.

Comments, anyone? As always, happy dancing.



Round dance teachers from 27 states, including Gladys loanin of Alaska, and one Canadian province attended the seventh annual ROUNDALAB (The International Association of Round Dance Teachers, Inc.) convention in Indianapolis, Indiana October 23-25. Attending as official representatives of CALLERLAB were Chairman Bob and Roberta Van Antwerp and Assistant Executive Secretary Herb & Erna Egender. Also recognized were ROUNDALAB members George & Joyce Kammerer First Vice Presidents of the Universal Round Dance Council and Doc & Peg Tirrell Chairmen of LEGACY.

Early ROUNDALAB registrants were welcomed at a pre-convention round dance party Saturday evening at which the Indiana Round Dance Council read a proclamation from Governor Robert Orr declaring October 23-29, 1983 as ROUND DANCE WEEK in the State of Indiana.

All who attended the convention had an opportunity to share their expertise and talents as the attendees made further progress in defining the phases and terminology used in round dancing.

The Educational Committee provided two very informative sessions. Pete Hickman discussed a philosophy on the way we learn and its application to the round dance activity. Betty & Clancy Mueller and Irv Easterday and Madeline Lovelace demonstrated and answered questions the definitions in phases two and four of round dancing.

The 1983-84 Classic List was adopted, additions were made to the ROUNDALAB

Code of Ethics, more round dance terminology, cue words and abbreviations were approved. Committees to develop a dancer survey, accreditation, re-examine the dance level rating system and explore video taping as a teaching tool were formed.

At the Sunday evening banquet, Indianapolis Mayor William Hudnut welcomed all on
behalf of his city and declared the week of
October 23-29 as Round Dance Week in
Indianapolis. At the Monday evening banquet,
certificates were presented to those attendees
who had reached their 10th and 15th year of
teaching. "Maestro" trophies were awarded to
twenty-six attendees who have been teaching
25 or more years, including Bob & Ted Meyers
(NM) who have been teaching 45 years.

Don Hickman of Texas was elected Chairman for 1983-84. Serving on the Board of Directors are Lionel & Catherine Bourdier (LA), Ray & Anne Brown (CO), Herb & Erna Egender (CO), Lyle & Agnes Esch (MI), Pete Hickman (TX), Harmon & Betty Jorritsma (CA), Ted & Barbara May (LA), Horace & Brenda Mills (AZ), Clancy & Betty Mueller (IN), Charlie & Bettye Procter (TX), Ty & Ann Rotruck (CO), Doc Tirrell (NJ), and Bob & Barbara Wilder (TX). Peg Tirrell of New Jersey was elected Executive Secretary.

Beginning in 1985 the ROUNDALAB annual convention will be held the Sunday, Monday and Tuesday just prior to, and in the same city as, the National Square Dance Convention. The 1984 annual ROUNDALAB convention will be October 28 thru 30 in Birmingham, Alabama.



ou can feel it in the air. A new Fall season brings with it New England's own spectacular display of color with a brisk refreshing change of air. For square dancers throughout New England history is about to be made. Before this month is over the Square Dance Foundation of New England will have purchased the property of Kramer's Hayloft located in So. Weymouth, Mass. A tribute to the New England square dancers is the fact that half of the required funds has been raised within the square dance community and by a completely voluntary non-professional staff. The fund raising drive will continue to pay off the mortgage balance. The property consists of a 2 dance hall barn, a 2 apartment house, and other buildings that will eventually house an archives library and museum, an educational center and operate as a service center for all New England and taken over as an ongoing business.



AN OPEN LETTER TO ALL ROUND DANCE LEADERS AND DANCERS IN NEW ENGLAND.



Dear Round Dance Leader:

NECORTA SCREENING COMMITTEE has been aware for some time of the concern about the use of so-called International Terms in some Round Dances. After a great deal of discussion of the pros and cons, recommendations were made to the NECORTA Executive Board. These recommendations were wholeheartedly approved at a meeting prior to the NECORTA Clinic on September 11th and then presented to those attending the Clinic.

THE RECOMMENDATIONS ARE BASED ON THE FOLLOWING:

- NECORTA is not a legislative body, we only recommend or make suggestions and the individual teacher makes his or her own decisions on the use of any of them.
- 2. NECORTA as its name implies is a COUNCIL of the Round Dance Teacher Associations in New England. Each of the seven local associations elects or appoints delegates to attend NECORTA meetings to share their experiences and problems with other delegates. It is also an opportunity for the various associations to cooperate and develop Round Dancing for the enjoyment of all Round Dancers in New England. We also cooperate in promoting Round Dance Activities in harmony with the Square Dance Movement in New England.
- 3. Round Dancing is continually changing by the addition of new figures, which are used to give dances new flavor. When they become part of our general usage we then consider them as R/D Terminology. The term Round Dance Cues, applies to all generally accepted cues as currently being used in Round Dances. The source of the cue wording is not a consideration. ROUNDALAB has put forth a great deal of effort in approving Round Dance Standards and we feel these standards, up to and including PHASE IV fall within the scope of EASY, EASY/INTERMEDIATE and INTERMEDIATE dances as done in New England. We also recommend that all Round Dance Leaders become familiar with and use these standards.

NECORTA SCREENING GUIDELINES (September 1983)

"All dances selected in the following categories: - EASY, EASY/INTERMEDIATE, and INTERMEDIATE, will use only accepted ROUND DANCE CUES as defined by ROUNDALAB in the 'INTERNATIONAL ROUND DANCE STANDARDS' Phase 1; 11; 111; IV, (the current standards being dated December 1982).

Dances in the HI-INTERMEDIATE, ADVANCED and CHALLENGE categories may contain other than generally accepted Round Dance Terminology. It is felt that Leaders who teach at these levels, know the dancers in their groups and are capable of making their own decisions as to whether a dance is suitable for their use.

[The following recommendation was approved for a trial period of one year.]

Each quarter the screening committee MAY select one figure to workshop, from the dances selected. This figure will be given with the cue words and a description of the steps (as outlined by Roundalab). This will mean we are all approaching the figure with the same terminology. The figure selected may be a new figure, one that is giving people problems or one that is being done a number of different ways."

If you have any questions, discuss them with your association's NECORTA delegates who will bring them to the next NECORTA meeting for clarification.

Beginning on Sept. 7, 1983 and continuing for 26 sessions, the Square Dance Community has an unusual opportunity. Specifically, WESTERN SQUARES, a teaching series especially prepared and edited for television, will be aired at no charge to any station desiring to avail themselves of this service. The broadcast will be via Satellite Uplink by Southeastern Communications Association (SECA).

This series follows the wording, recommended styling and teaching sequence as published by CALLERLAB, the Internation Associon Square Dance Callers. This series of one-half hour shows will be broadcast in color with each of the dancer couples in appropriate matching outfits. The TV series uses a variety of camera angles including overhead. Demonstrations as well as "walk throughs" are used for teaching purposes. The 26-week series also includes some festival calling as well as interviews with some prominent people in the square dance community.

Those callers and dancers who own their own Video Cassette Recorders could tape the sessions and use them as reinforcement sessions for the dancers who missed one or more class sessions. It might also be used in remote areas where live callers and instruction are not readily available. Perhaps more important, however, is the opportunity we have to expose hundreds and thousands of non-dancers to this wonderful recreation.

Please notify your local public television station(s) and advise them of the availability of the program WESTERN SQUARES through SECA and request your local station(s) to air the programs. By getting everyone behind this project, we could easily double the size of classes and dances each year for the next few years. Don't let this opportunity slip by.

Perhaps if one or more people in any given area tape these programs, an area effort could be made to provide remedial dance sessions with these tapes as the no-cost means of getting better dancers for all clubs. Try it! You can't lose!

DEFINITIONS

SPIN CHAIN & EXCHANGE THE GEARS

Note: Don't be put off by the long definition. It takes longer to put on paper than it does to dance; but it is a very smooth-flowing, pretty, dancing figure.

From parallel ocean waves (right-hand, for ease of description) — Start like a normal Spin Chain the Gears — Ends and adjacent dancers turn ½, new centers turn ½, while the ends U-Turn Back, and the very two centers of the wave Trade. All form two left-hand stars (but before turning them, the out-facing point should raise a hand, indicating "follow me" — they will be the "leaders of the exchange" and turn the stars ½. The "leaders of the exchange" will now lead the star out to the right, around the outside of the other star, like an S pattern, then into a momentary single file column of four. (Note: If started from Heads Zero Box [i.e. Heads Square Thru, Step to a Wave], the column will be formed along the Sides of the square.) Lead dancer in the column does a right face U Turn Back and Touch ½ with the second dancer in the column, as the third dancer in the column quarters right face individually and the 4th dancer in the column quarters left face individually. (Note: as the dancers become more familiar with the call, the 4th dancer will tend to walk 'straight out' of the S pattern on to the end of the wave, rather than finish in the momentary column and then quarter left face individually.) The movement ends in two parallel right hand ocean waves (at the Sides of the square if started from a Heads Box 1-4)

Teaching notes: In addition to the "Follow Me" technique incorporated in the body of the definition, the following teaching hints may prove valuable:

- The use of a demonstration square is highly recommended. This square should already know the movement, having learned it beforehand, not as part of the demonstration.
- 2. Just before starting the call, while the dancers are standing in the ocean waves, tell them that everyone except the in-facing ends, (Side men if started from a box 1-4) will finish up standing in the spot diagonally across the square; that is, the centers of the wave will finish up having diagonally exchanged places, the out-facing ends of the wave will finish up having exchanged places, but the in-facing ends of the wave will finish up in the same place as they started.
- 3. As the stars start to turn %, have each dancer in the star place a hand on the shoulder of the dancer in front of him/her "Indian Style", until the momentary column has been formed then drop hands and complete the call. This will keep the foursomes together, and serves as an especially helpful aid in getting the #3 and #4 dancers, who may tend to wander, lined up properly in the momentary column.

Timing - 24 beats. Some Dancing Examples Follow:

From Static Squares

Heads Square Thru, SPIN CHAIN & EXCHANGE THE GEARS, ' Boys Circulate, Recycle, Allemande Left.

From Zero Lines

Pass the Ocean,
SPIN CHAIN & EXCHANGE THE GEARS,
Boys Circulate, Girls Trade, Recycle,
Swing Thru, Turn Thru, Allemande Left.

MIX TO A DIAMOND

From a two-faced line (or any wave or line of four) Centers Cross Run, the new centers Single or Partner Hinge (as appropriate), to end in a Diamond. From right handed two-faced lines, it ends in right hand diamonds; from left handed two-faced lines it ends in left hand diamonds; from ocean waves, it ends in facing diamonds; from lines, various "funny" diamonds result.

Timing - 6 beats. Some Dancing Examples Follow:

FOUNDATION PURCHASE OF KRAMER'S HAYLOFT

The Square Dance Foundation of New England is in the process of purchasing Kramer's Hayloft in South Weymouth, Mass. as a permanent central headquarters that will house 2 dance halls, administrative offices, museum, library and educational center. It will be the first permanent folk dance archives in N.E.

The Kramer family with 2 sons settled in Weymouth, Mass. in 1920 with the intention of going into the poultry business. A cow was obtained for their own use and within 24 hours they were supplying milk to their neighbors which led to the eventual herd of 65 purebred Gurnseys and Holsteins. A barn was built by Jacob Kramer with the help of one carpenter and sons Sam & Max. It was started in April of 1936 and occupied that November. The dairy barn was the most modern and up to date in New England. About 25 years later due to costs and labor required to run a dairy farm the Kramers gave up the dairy business.

In the early 1950's, Sam saw some square dancing on television and it intrigued him. A local church burned down and Sam offered to have a fund raising dance at his farm. At that time the barn was filled with cows and hay, however a new milk processing plant and dairy bar with a large garage was made available along with some black top driveway area. Charlie Baldwin and other callers donated their time along with music provided by Gordon Barnes and his talented family. It was a night such as So. Weymouth had never seen and a financial success for the church. Sam was hooked on square dancing and in 1959 converted the hayloft into an authentic square dance hall. They started their square dance business on Nov. 5, 1959. The cows were moved out of the lower level a couple of years later and the first floor was converted to a second square dance hall. It was also used for banquets. In the 34 years of operation Kramer's Hayloft has graduated many thousands of dancers, both square and round, including teens and children. Many callers got their start here. Other activities included weddings, meetings, clambakes, birthdays, anniversaries and shows. Sam dearly loves the activity and the people it has brought to him.

The Square Dance Foundation searched long and hard for a location on which to build a permanent home. When Kramers Hayloft was introduced to us, its buildings were ideally suited to our near and long range plans. It is a going business whose operations will be continued with the eventual development of an archives center. We are indebted to Sam Kramer for his patience during our fund raising and his strong desire to see the property house New England's dance heritage. Because of Sam's interest in the Foundation we will now have a permanent home and a fulfillment of Charlie Baldwin's dream.

Within the square dance movement we have raised more than one half of the total purchase price. We are intensifiying our capital campaign in an effort to pay off the mortgage balance. It is our desire to make our new home totally self-supporting. To date, we have not used any professional fund raisers; what's more, our officers, directors and volunteers all serve with love of our dance heritage, without compensation, so that you can be sure any gift you give will go towards our building fund drive.

The Foundation's Trustees who will oversee the operation of Kramer's Hayloft consist of Art Dugas, Chm., Marge Dugas, Sec. and Ernie & Ellie Chase, Ray & Carole Aubut, Tom & Joyce Lyons and Dave & Marian Norris. We have hired Bruce & May Nye who hail from Vermont as custodian of the property.

WHAT'S ON THE PROGRAM?

With twelve dance halls in the Convention Center and Civic Center, and four outdoor areas nearby, there'll be plenty of dancing in Baltimore in '84!

We've tried to make things easy for y'all by scheduling the same type of dancing in the same place each day. Our computer will be working to be sure that the space allotted allows for comfortable dancing. And, in addition to the traditional program listings, we'll have pocket-sized programs to help you keep track of who's calling what, where and when. We're hoping that these aids, plus color-coded signs, will keep our visitors from wandering off to the outer reaches of town and ending up in some disco by mistake!

There will be dancing in both the Convention and Civic Centers. You can choose from all levels of square and round dancing, as well as contra. We will also have several hours of clogging each day, and have set aside some time in a hall daily for singles.

Dedicated dancers (and who among us is not?) can hit the floor daily at 9 AM and dance to their heart's content (although their feet might protest) 'til 11 PM nightly. Continue on up to the third floor, where there is over 25,000 feet of space for dancing and meetings. The designers of this level must have known we were coming, because they provided lots of plush sofas and chairs in a lounge area and furnished an outdoor terrace. If you take the overhead walkway to the Civic Center, you'll find over 100,000 more square feet of space, including a 10,000-plus seat arena for the Fashion Show, exhibitions, evening programs, mainstream dancing and afterparties. The exhibitors will set up shop downstairs, while rooms upstairs will be used for dancing. This facility is air-conditioned, too, of course.

Speaking of air, those of us here on the water like to get outside. So, we'll be dancing at several outdoor locations, within a few blocks of the dance facilities. We have lots of fairs and festivals in Charm City, perhaps because of our rich ethnic heritage, and street dancing is already a part of the downtown scene. Convention dancers who take advantage of the outdoor locations will enjoy balmy breezes off the water and can count on an interested audience.


