Following is yet another variation of the Butterfly Whirl. This ought to be a good dance to keep all those present warm on a January night. There is plenty of action in this one.

## BUTTERFLY WHIRL

Formation: Square
Music: Hoedown
Routine:

1. Introduction: (Honor your partner, etc,)
2. Break
3. First couple lead to the right and circle four, halfway round.
4. Break loose and the ladies whirl. (Ladies spin, twirling in a counterclockwise direction as they progress to the right.)
5. Then the two gents whirl.
6. Then all four whirl like a butterfly whirl.
7. Circle four half around, right and left and lead right on.
8. Repeat with 3rd and 4th couple.
9. Chorus. (Get on home and . . . . .)
10. Repeat with second, third and fourth couples.
11. On final chorus of grand right and left, meet with an elbow swing.


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Let's start off the year with a smoothy. It is called - - -

## HELLO MIXER

Formation: Double circle, partners facing, man's back to center of hall.
Music: MacGregor 923
Routine:
Measures:
1-4 Shaking right hands and acknowledging partners, sing Hello, Hello, Hello (one hand-shake on each "Hello") and then wave hand palm facing partner and sing "Hi" on the fourth count.
5-8 Do-sa-do partner and move one place to right to a new partner.
9-12 Repeat measures 1-4.
13-16 Repeat measures 5-8, except that dancer assumes open promenade position on the 16th measure with second new partner.
17-18 Walk forward in line of direction four steps (men beginning on left foot, lady on right).
19-20 Turn toward each other and continue turning to face reverse line of direction, back up four steps.
21-22 Walk back toward original starting point in RLOD four steps.
23-24 Turn alone again, back up four steps to end facing same partner.
25-28 In butterfly position with arms extended to each side, balance to gents' left, ladies' right (balance to gents right, ladies left) and repeat each balance left and right.
29-32 Still in butterfly position, walk around as a couple (butterfly banjo position) and end facing each other ready to begin again with a right handshake.
This is a double progressive mixer. Dance is repeated 6 times through. On the sixth and last time, the couples turn partners on the last four measures and then turn the lady under and bow.

## Grilled Shrimp Scampi

6 Tbsp. unsalted butter, softened
$1 / 4$ cup olive oil
1 Tbsp. minced garlic
2 Tbsp. minced fresh chives
salt and pepper to taste
$1 / 4$ tsp. paprika
2 pounds large shrimp, peeled and deveined

Combine the butter, olive oil, garlic, chives, salt and pepper, and paprika in a large bowl and blend throughly. Toss the shrimp in the mixture until well coated. Grill for two minutes per side or until shrimp turn pink. Serve immediately.
*I like to thread the shrimp onto skewers before grilling.

Sauce - mix together:
$1 / 4$ cup light mayonnaise
$1 / 4$ cup plain yogurt
1 tsp. grated lemon rind
2 Tbsp. fresh squeezed lemon juice
1 Tbsp. fresh chopped parsley
Cook salmon in a $350^{\circ}$ oven skinless side down for five minutes per inch. Turn over and spread half of the sauce on top of the fish and cook until fish flakes. Serve with the rest of the sauce for dipping.

I think there's hope. I am hearing more and more success stories. Not real huge success but at least a turn-around, a move in the right direction. One of the first of these was the very slight drop in attendance from the first to the second year of the NESRDC in Brattleboro. Another is the almost ten sets average attendance at the few club dances I've called this year. Ten sets isn't a big crowd in terms of a couple of decades ago. But it's a good bit more than many clubs have been seeing in the last decade.

A more subtle change is the number of dancers who do the Mainstream tips when the program offers both. A couple of the dances I've done this (past) year were programmed with two MS tips to every one PLUS tip. Five years ago that would have brought a reduced attendance and the number of people dancing the MS would have been less than the number dancing the PLUS. The most significant change I see is that the MS tips are drawing at least as many people onto the floor and often more than the PLUS tips.

As I've said many times, I don't see any reason for dancers to sit out the MS tips if they are able to dance both. Does anyone really think the dancing is better in the PLUS program? If it's variety that makes dancing interesting, then MS has much more to offer than PLUS. Many years ago there was some snob value to dancing the PLUS tips. It showed that you were an "experienced" dancer and no one would
mistake you for a "beginner." That distinction has pretty well disappeared. If only beginners danced the MS tips, there wouldn't be very many squares on the floor.

Dancers often say to me "Oh, you make Mainstream so interesting." I don't think I'm doing anything very different from what a lot of my caller friends do. At a Mainstream dance I try to use most of the calls on the Mainstream list. There are a limited number of ways that each of these calls can be used if the caller expects most of the people to succeed. I stick to those, mostly, because I really want folks to dance successfully when I call.

Two possibilities occur to me. First, some callers may not care as much as I do when squares break down. But that should make their dance more interesting than mine, at least for the squares that are successful. The other possibility is that some callers don't pay as much attention to using all of the almost 70 calls on the MS list at every dance. If that's what's happening, that's a shame because it's an easy way to make the dancing interesting.

Of course, to use all the calls requires me to keep track of which one's I have called and which I have not. In fact, I have a program plan that divides up the major calls and shows in which tip I expect to use each of them. I keep a record of what I have called and that helps me to assure that I do use most of the list. Even so, it seems an easy way to make sure my MS dance is interesting.

Open natural, open impetus, quarter turns to right and left, double reverse spin, cross swivel, fishtail 5, locking steps, heel pivot running locks, back step skip twice. Ending is back to left whisk.

Phase V+2+1 (Nat twist turn, interrupted cont, cross ending, ext open nat'1 to scar) Foxtrot - Ron \& Mary Noble. Slide to a natural twist turn, feather, written right to the music. Reverse wave, feather, telemark, outside spin, double back lilt, royal spin and twist. Ending is quick leg crawl. Routine and music blend to make it very danceable.

## Adagio Rumba - Rumba

## Dos Plus One

Tracing the roots of our square and contra dance heritage is fascinating and tricky at the same time. We have borrowed from so many cultures and have mixed everything so thoroughly that it seems to be all out of the same cloth.

For example, "allemande" sounds like it comes from the French for "by the hand;" but, if it is French, why is it not spelled "a la main?" Some people suggest that it is a variation of the Swiss phrase "allewander." But Lloyd "Pappy" Shaw, in Cowboy Dances, puts forth the idea that it is spelled correctly and simply means German, as in a German dance that consists of a series of gentle arm turns.

Likewise, there is "DoSaDo" which quite obviously is French for "back to back." What happens when it is pronounced "dosido?" We now are dealing with another cultural heritage - the Spanish. Dosido is a misspelling of "dos i dos," which means two and two. The simple change in pronunciation calls for two very different basics.

And so to the title of this article, which is also the title of a great little dance by Ken Kernen of New Mexico. (Note: New Mexico is one of the 50 United States you do not need a passport to visit this scenic state.) "Dos" means two, so two plus one equals three, and Ken has created an ethnic flavor for the dance. If you can, get a copy of "Real Madrid" on TNT recordings. "Real" is Spanish for royal. This music is lively, has its own unique
sound, yet is so strongly phrased that it is easy to work with.

The formation is lines of three facing lines of three as spokes of a wagon wheel around the hall. Here is the dance:

Dos Plus One by Ken Kernen
Intro: - - - -, Circle six to the left
1-8: --- -, Circle six to the right
9-16: -- - - Inside sashay down \& back
17-24: -- --, Outside sashay down \& back
25-32: -- - -, In your own lines star right
33-40: - - - -, Star left back to lines
41-48: - - - -, - Lines forward and back
49-56: - - - -, - -Pass thru and bow
57-64: -- - -, Circle six to the left
The dance is not hard, but it has enough variety to keep it interesting. Also, groups of three stay together for the whole dance so this is especially good if you have dancing families and the youngsters want to dance but do not want to be separated from their folks.

In the first sixteen counts the facing lines of three form circles of six dancers and circle left and right back to place. In each line, there is a dancer who is closest to the center of the circle: this is the inside dancer. The two inside dancers step toward each other to join two hands and sashay (skip slide) four steps down and back between the two lines. To keep the symmetry, now the outside two dancers sashay down and back between the two lines.

When the outsides get back to place, the ends (the insides and outsides) face the center person of their own line and all three

make right hand stars. Each dancer turns around to make left hand stars back to place in their own line. (Suggestion: when finishing the left hand star, the dancers should reform their lines far enough away from the other line to give room to move forward and back.) The forward and back are four short steps. Dancers may optionally clap hands with the opposite or holler "Ole!" to add a little more energy. Do not short cut the four steps back. The lines then pass thru (each dancer passing right shoulders with the opposite dancer) moving on to meet a new group of three. A bow to the new opposite keeps the dance on phrase, and it is a friendly way to acknowledge the people you are dancing with. The dance starts again.

This is a marvelous dance to start an
evening with because as latecomers arrive, they can form new groups of three and jump into the dance. It does not matter if there is an uneven number of lines. If there is not a new line of three to dance with, wait out one turn and a new line will come to you.

Trios such as "Dos Plus One," and others like "Phrase Craze" and "Wild Turkey" which appeared in this column in the past, are great party dances to get the dance started in the right mood. Check out Dancing for Busy People by Bob Howell, Cal Campbell and Ken Kernen. It originally came out in spiral notebook form, but recently has been republished in a standard paperback format. ## COMIMEP JIM MAYO

I was a bit late getting this article written because the wonderful weather we have been experiencing in Maui distracted me. We don't stay away as long as some of the "snowbirds" but, like them, we do escape the N. E. winter occasionally. As our fellow dancers age the drop in attendance during the winter months becomes more evident.

I have been receiving reports on dance attendance in November for my annual survey. I haven't summarized the data yet but, as I look it over, there are some promising signs. Some clubs report classes with more than one square of people. There are also some reports of 10 12 square dances. I called a couple of those this past fall and a dance that size feels quite successful.

I continue to believe that we have a wonderful recreation to offer to a society that needs what we have to offer. As my regular readers know, I think we'll have to change the way we offer square dancing if we are going to recruit more successfully. But you also know that I believe those changes could easily be made.

Our club-based activity offers a sociability that is not easy to find. Bowling leagues are going away, tennis is usually a four person game, at most, as is golf. We offer the chance to make friends with a group of people who share a common interest. We also offer the opportunity to share our
common interest on a regular basis.
As long-time dancers we often take those qualities for granted but we shouldn't. It is a true privilege to have that wide a circle of friends. When we try to spread our interest to new recruits we should be sure to mention the importance of those friendships. When our recruiting is successful we should also be sure that we make good on the promise of friendship. In our squares let's remember that the friendships are more important than choreographic success.

I have no doubt that families with young children are way to busy to be looking for new recreations. And they probably do make friends fairly easily with the parents of their children's friends. But, as the children leave home there is more time available and less opportunity to make new friends. My own experience suggests (to me) that becoming aware of the importance of friendships is something that happens later in life.

The population of people becoming 60 years old will be huge over the next decade. They will be more physically able than we were at that stage of life. We know that they would enjoy square dancing if only we could get them through the learning process. If we took them to class and continued to dance with them there, we would make that easier. Now, all we have to do is convince some of them.

## TWELFTH STREET RAG

Formation: Double circle, couples facing line of direction, inside hands joined, identical footwork throughout.
Music: Capitol 6001
Routine:
INTRO: Two measures - Wait or acknowledge.

## COUNTS

1-4 Walk forward starting on the left foot: $L, R, L, R$.
5-8 Point left toe forward, point left toe side and then swing left foot behind right, step on the left foot, step to the right on the right foot and close left foot to the right.

9-12 Walk forward starting on the right foot: R, L, R, L.
13-16 Point right toe forward, then right toe to the right side, then step behind the left, place left foot left and close right foot to the left one.

17-20 Take seven quick steps toward the center with your partner. Leading with left foot, step left and place right toe behind left. Put your weight on that right toe and continue the seven steps toward the center in this manner. On the eighth count touch the right toe next to the left foot.

21-24 Now reverse the seven steps starting with the right foot and move toward the wall. End touching left toe next to right foot.

25-28 Step forward on left foot, then point right toe forward. Step back on right foot, point left toe back.

29-32 Repeat measures 25-28.
Repeat entire routine with same partner, then after second time through, at the "bridge" in the music, all men move up one and dance with new partner.

STYLING NOTE: As you move in and out the seven little quick steps, drop partner's hand and holding your arms close to your sides, hands bent at the wrist and protruding to each side, move shoulders up and down alternately. Measures 25 through 32 can be "spiced up" by dancing them as Charleston steps.

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And for this month of lovers, following is Ted Sannella's contra - -
NEWLY WED'S REEL
Formation: Proper duple, 1,3,5 active, but not crossed over.
Music: Any 32 count tune.
Routine:
Right hand to partner, left to opposite
Balance that way four in line

-     -         - Turn the left hand all around

The ladies walk up, the men walk down

-     -         - Same way back to place
-     -         - Allemande left when you meet your own

And swing the opposite lady

-     -         - Now the lady round the lady

Gent around the gent
Then do-sa-do your own
That's it for this month.

Fresh Beginnings

This column is both a tribute to a great square dance/contra dance caller and an introduction to a dance that is ideal for new dancers. The caller is Walt Cole. Walt had a daytime job working on forest projects and almost another full time job calling dances. When he retired, he called full time, splitting his time between Ogden, Utah and Yuma, Arizona. He was one of the early members of CALLERLAB, and as such he was very concerned with timing and smooth dancing.

Walt wrote regular columns for $A$ Caller's Notebook and he wrote a monthly article for American Square Dance. His ASD column had two parts to it: one was a segment "For the Modular Caller," and the other part was "Timing's the Thing." The goal of both parts of the articles was to pass on good choreography that timed out with the phrase of the music.

I remember one conversation with Walt in which he told me that if a caller just called any which way with no attention to the phrase of the music, he (Walt) would dance one or maybe two tips. If the caller took the first beat of the phrase for himself, Walt would stay for the evening, and maybe come back sometime. If the caller gave the first beat to the dancers, Walt would dance to him every night. You will find that callers who use the phrase of the music will give you just as fun an evening, but you will not be tired from stop-and-go timing.

Let me give you examples of the three
types of callers. Almost every caller knows how to start a singing call by calling "Circle Left" before the melody of the song. When the caller times that properly, he gets to sing the lyrics starting at the beginning of the phrase, and the dancers get to start dancing on the first beat of the phrase. [As you all know, square dance music has eight beat phrases of music.]

When the caller starts singing with the melody but the words are "Heads square thru," the caller has taken the first beat for himself. That means that the dancers do not start dancing until the third beat of the phrase. The dancers will always be chasing the phrase, but at least there is phrase awareness. What is difficult for both 'the first beat to the dancers' and 'the first beat for the caller' is to know exactly when the phrase starts and ends - not just in singing calls, but in the patter also. The caller must also be strong enough to hold the dancers back so they do not rush from figure to figure, but instead, the dancers dance.

The third type of caller calls figures whenever he feels like it. He does not hear the phrase of the music, and he does not know how long each figure is supposed to take. This type of caller usually relies on watching one of the front squares of the hall (where the hot shots are) and uses that square for timing. This caller will use Grand Square or Teacup Chain at any time in the music; he doesn't worry about it too much because he knows that his pilot square will rush through the figures anyway.

Walt, and a number of other outstanding callers around the country, believed absolutely in making the dance work with the music. Callers who know how to use their music well often are versatile and can cue rounds and call contra dances as well. Among those superb callers were people like Dick Leger of Rhode Island and Jack Murtha of California. Dick and Jack both used a contra or a quadrille to start each night of square dance lessons because they wanted their dancers to be music literate.

So here is a contra dance that Walt Cole wrote that works for everyone from people who just finished their first night of square dance class to the most experienced contra dancers. He called it "First Night Contra."

With dancers who are new to contra dancing, there are several successful ways to get the dancers into contra lines. The easiest is to have them line up in a column of couples facing the caller with the lady on the man's right. Everyone then faces their partners and steps back. Couple one then trade places with partners, couple three, etc. A second way to set the lines is to have the dancers square up, the side ladies chain, the heads face and back up. In both examples the dancers are in a duple cross formation. A third way to set up the lines is to have one couple stand with its back to the caller, a second couple then faces them. The third couple is back-to-back with the second and so on. But no matter how you get the people into the right formation, the next step is to have all dancers face their corner or neighbor - the caller may have to remind the dancers that the corner is to the man's left and to the lady's right.

Once everyone is facing the corner, point out that everyone has their partner beside them and they are facing another couple. These two couples will dance a
pattern then move onto new couples to dance the pattern again - just two couples at a time.
So, here we go with "First Night Contra." Intro: -- --, With your corner dosado

1-8: -- --, With your partner dosado
9-16: ----, - Swing your corner
17-24: - - face across,

-     - long lines forward and back

25-32: - - - , With the couple across, star right
33-40: -- - -, Same four, come back with a left hand star
41-48: - - - -, Men, promenade your corner across
49-56: -- - -, Same four circle left half way
57-64: -- --, Find new corner to dosado

Notice that the dance uses figures that would have been taught in a first night of class. What will be a little difficult is adjusting to the formation. To start, the dancers are already facing their corners, so they simply dosado. The second figure asks the dancers to identify who their partner is in the other line - and dosado. The dancers then turn back to the corner to swing. Remember that at the end of the swing, the lady always ends up on the man's right [teaching hint: when finishing the swing, dancers point their joined hands in the direction they wish to face, then let go of those joined hands, and the lady will automatically roll out to the correct position with the man's right hand on her back].

Music awareness time for callers and dancers... Lines forward and back is an eight count figure. The caller must make the call at least two beats before the end of the phrase while the dancers are finishing their swing. The dancers then step forward on the first beat of the phrase and go
forward three steps, and touch on beat four. Then they go back, starting on beat five and touching on beat eight. Do not let the dancers rush.

At this point, all dancers should have their corners beside them and be facing their own partners. The same four dancers make a right hand star and turn it about six steps; they then turn around to make a left hand star with the same people. When they get back to where they started the stars, the gentleman should notice that the corner (the person they swung) is right ahead of him in the star. He keeps her left hand in his left hand and steps up beside her to promenade position; they then promenade over to the other line and wheel to face across the set. This half promenade does nothing more than have the two couples change sides. The same four dancers then join hands in a circle of four and circle left half way to get back to their own lines. As the dancers get back to place, they all need to look for a new corner and be ready to dosado with the new corner.

If the dancers are at the end of the line and do not have a corner to dosado, they should
trade places with their partners and face down the line while the others dance the next sequence. Dancers will stand out one sequence at the ends, and then will be picked up into the dance on the next go around.

I have used this dance successfully in many situations; but I must warn you that the music can make or break the dance given who the dancers are. If they are new dancers, the music must be very strongly phrased and have a very strong beat, but not too fast. If the music is too fast, the dancers cannot identify where they are and what way to face. By new dancers, I mean dancers who are new to contra dancing. Many experienced square dancers get disoriented with the contra formation. With an experienced group, the tempo can really be kicked up. I especially like to use the singing call "Shindig in the Barn" on Wagon Wheel, but any good strong singing call, hoedown, Scottish dance tune, etc. works well.

As this dance works so well to reinforce timing in both the early dancing careers of both square and contra dancers, it seems a basic for the caller's bag of tricks.

## THINGSTO CONSIDER



Announcements at dances. Club officers need to speak up when making announcements. Some people think the microphone will automatically make them loud enough, but it won't. When making announcements, the voice must be $50-100 \%$ louder than in a normal conversation. I tell people to imagine calling their kids at the far end of the yard - this is the loudness that is needed.

Also, why do some officers try to make announcements immediately following a tip? This is the worst time to make announcements, because people are talking about the tip or getting into a new conversation with someone. They are not in a mood to listen, even if they are told to be quiet.

Likewise, announcements should never be made between the patter and singing call. This keeps the dancers standing for too long, and also destroys any mood the caller has established.

The best time for announcements is after people have had a few minutes break. Having everyone sit for the announcements will lessen background chatter. If there are not enough chairs, setting up additional ones for the announcements will help keep noise down.

Some clubs have announcements after the caller has squared up the floor and before he has started the tip. This is ok if
the total time for announcements is short - ie. less than 3 minutes. If longer than this, it is too tiring for the dancers to be standing this long.

Beginners class. Ramblin' Rogues of Orange County, California asks people in beginners class who are having major problems to start over in January, if there is another class in the area. Reason: If these people are retained and allowed to graduate, people at the club dances (members and guests) will tend to avoid them, thereby causing bad feelings all around.

Ramblin' Rogues has decided that club unity is more important than trying to squeeze every last dollar out of new dancers. The club is very successful, with attendance well above average for the area.

Also, do you ever see people in class, or even people just out of class, trying to Courtesy Turn in the middle of or end of a Square Thru? This is usually because they were taught Right \& Left Thru first, and then quickly taught Square Thru (Right \& Left Thru is \#21 in the CALLERLAB teaching order and Square Thru is \#28). If Square Thru were taught before Right \& Left Thru, or taught much later after Right \& Left Thru, this problem would lessen.

Many callers feel that Square Thru should be taught first so as to eliminate this problem. Consider trying it with your class one year and see if this works better.

Being a great month for the Irish here is a circle mixer that I have used for many years with great success. It is called -- -

## GREETING THE IRISH

Formation: Single circle of partners facing center, ladies on gents right.
Music: Slaunch to Donegal. Windsor 4183.
Routine:
1-4 All to the center four steps.
5-8 All back out four steps.
9-12 All to the center four steps again
13-16 All back out four steps again.
17-20 Ladies into the center four steps and clap on fourth
21-24 Ladies back out four steps.
25-28 Men into the center four steps.
29-32 Men back out four steps.
33-48 Face partner. Do a grand right and left seven persons (using two counts for each hand clasp), turn to promenade on the last two counts.*
49:64 Promenade new partner.

* Patter to be used during grand right and left: name or call your favorite Irish for each one you meet, i.e. Uncle Mike, Sister Kate, Brannigan, Flannigan, McLafferty, Malone, Mulligan, Gilligan, Duffy, McGuffy, McLarky, McGillis, O’Brien, etc.



And remaining with our Irish theme, following is a square dance named -- -
ORANGE AND THE GREEN
(Easy level variation)
Formation: Square
Music: Orange And Green - Scope 525
Routine:
Intro, Break, Ending
Join hands and circle, to the left around you go
All the way around, take your colleen home
Allemande left your corner, do-sa-do your-own
Men star left, once around you go
Turn your partner by the right and corner allemande.
Do-sa-do your partner, promenade to Ireland.
It was the biggest mix-up that you have ever seen
Me father he was orange, and me mother she was green.
Figure: (Twice for heads, twice for sides)
One and three go forward and back right out you do
Go forward again and face the sides, split them, around one will do
Separate and go back home, sashay your sweet colleen.
Right elbow swing the corner and you come back home again
Turn your partner by the left, your corner lady swing
Swing that lady high and low and promenade the ring
Oh, it was the biggest mix-up that you have every seen
Me father he was orange, and me mother she was green.

The CALLERLAB Convention takes place next month in Charlotte, NC. Many callers from the New England area will be attending. The convention is a place for those who are concerned about the future of square dancing to gather and discuss what we, callers, can do to improve our chances of success in the years ahead.

We have a variety of programs and sessions at the convention. Some are technical, some are educational and some are just social. Committees meet to discuss the dance programs and whether changes or clarification are required in our call definitions. A two-day program is offered before the convention to show callers how to do an effective job of calling for the new-dancer party.

This year Gloria Roth and Martin Mallard who are both from Canada will join me in an historical presentation. As I have mentioned, I have been converting some of the audio tapes in the SDFNE collection to CD's. I have been concentrating on dances held before 1963. I picked that date because that was the year we invented the calls Swing Thru, Trade, and Run. These three calls resulted in a very rapid change in the type of choreographic patterns we used in modern square dancing.

We will be playing some tracks from these tapes at the convention and talking about the callers, the style and the choreography. There are some substantial differences between then and now. One of the most obvious is the speed. Technically
the term is tempo and it refers to the number of beats of music and thus the number of steps we take each minute. Today in our area the usual is about 126 beats per minute. In the early 1960's 132 was common and many callers went higher to as much as 140 beats per minute. That's really hustling.

Another big difference was the number of calls we were using. Before Swing Thru our vocabulary of standard terms numbered about thirty calls. Today the Mainstream Program has 69 and Plus adds another 31. Many callers who weren't around then wonder how we could keep dancers entertained with so few calls. These tapes show how we did it and the dancer noise in the background makes it clear that they we having a great time.

One of the answers to how we did it lies in the much more varied use we made of each of the calls. One of the most obvious examples is the call Square Thru. I remember well when I learned it on an Al Brundage weekend in 1957. I spent the whole weekend being confused by it. When I added it to my own program I spent a whole three hour workshop on just that one call. We did it straight, in fractions, split, with four boys and then with four girls and then with some of each but in half-sashayed couples. We did it from facing lines, from boxes and on the diagonal. Most of today's Advanced Program dancers would be confused by many of the ways we did that one call.

2 cloves garlic, minced
3-4 lbs boneless beef chuck roast
$1 / 4$ cup all-purpose flour
$1 / 4$ cup vegetable oil
1 cup tomato juice or V-8 juice
6 carrots, peeled and sliced into chunks
2 medium onions, chopped
2 bay leaves
1 teaspoon dried sweet basil leaves
1 teaspoon salt
$1 / 4$ teaspoon black pepper
4 medium potatoes, peeled and cut into large chunks

Rub garlic into roast and coat all over with flour. In a large Dutch oven, brown roast over medium high heat in oil. Add tomato juice, carrots, onions, bay leaves, basil, salt and pepper and bring to a boil. Reduce heat, cover tightly and simmer for about 3 hours, turning meat occasionally. Add potatoes and simmer an additional 30 minutes, or until fork tender. Remove bay leaves and serve.

## ON CONTRA

## Saint Paddy's Day...B'Gosh

When my wife and I started dancing, back before Saint Patrick drove the snakes out of Ireland, there was very little contra dancing in the square dance world. Granted, there were the live music folk, but those of us in Modern Western Square Dancing did not know about them. In Southern California there was only one contra club that had square dancers in mind: Courtly Contras, hosted by Bob and Becky Osgood at the old Sets in Order Hall in Los Angeles. To attend one of Bob's dances for the first time, you had to be sponsored by a member; to attend a second time, you had to have Becky's invitation to come back again.

Many callers would claim to do contras, but then they would complain that they couldn't seem to get the dancers really interested. Well...it seems that these callers did one contra a year for Saint Patrick's Day, and that dance was "Slaunch to Donegal" (Windsor 4183). "Slaunch..." was unusual because it was a singing contra.

Really. If you can listen to the called side, you'll hear the great Don and Marie Armstrong. Don prompts the dance as a standard contra. Then Marie sings it. They alternate until the last chorus when they both sing. (Aside: for those who did not know it, Don Armstrong was an electrifying square dance caller before he went exclusively to contras and folk dance. Marie is still great!)

## Slaunch to Donegal

Beckett Windsor 4183
Allemenade left your corner, go home and swing you do
Swing your gal ... slant left and right and left thru
To the left you go then straight across new two right and left thru
Take your time and turn your Jane then the ladies chain
She's not yours, what a shame, chain her back again
Keep in step with the piper's band and star with the old left hand
Around you mill and around you wheel come back with the right hand all
Turn the star go home again get back to Donegal
Square dance callers loved "Slaunch" because they could sing it like any singing call and they did not have to learn to prompt. Also "Slaunch" was one of the very rare contras available on record that had a called version on the flip side. Callers could learn to do the dance simply by imitating Don and Marie. Also, the music is really lively. (Aside: the music was so lively that Don, who played drums in the band, slid his drum set off the stage. If you listen closely at the end you can hear a little crash that they could not edit out - that's Don's drum going over the edge.)

But, quite sadly, there are some built-in problems with "Slaunch." The first is the overflow of the dance. There are four courtesy turns plus a left hand star and an
allemande left. I remember the first time I danced this I got so dizzy by the third time thru that I could not see straight. The second problem is that dancers have some trouble figuring out who to dance with. First, you separate from your partner for the allemande left, though that resolves with a partner swing. Then, instead of dancing with the couple straight across, you slant left to do a right and left thru with a different couple. That is immediately followed with another right and left thru, but with yet another couple straight across. On the first right and left thru, if you do not move far enough to take the place of that other couple, you do not get in position for the second right and left thru. And, most square dancers want to square off with the couple they did a right and left thru with, so many end up facing back to where they came from instead of across the set.

Then there are two ladies chain. That means there have been four courtesy turns in a row for the men. These poor guys feel like they have been going backwards around in circles. Without experience, it is difficult for many dancers to convert from the courtesy turn into stars. (The trick is to keep the left hands from the courtesy turn joined and step forward into the left hand star.) Just as soon as you think you know who you are dancing with ( 5 figures in a row with the same couple: right and left thru, two chains, and two stars), you have to separate from your partner again for the allemande left. At least the corner stays the same throughout the dance, as does your partner.

There is another problem with "Slaunch" which is not inherent. The tempo on the record
is about 132 beats per minute. For most square dancers that is not overly fast (though I think a lot of callers have slowed down to 128bpm or slower), but it is very fast for contra dancing. That tempo forces dancers to rush through figures instead of relaxing into the phrase of the music. Also, the speed heightens the sense of dizziness. Callers could slow the record down, but then it doesn't "sound right" because it is not the same tempo as the patter and singing calls. A change of tempo is part of the idea of using contras in a square dance program. Why do the different thing if it does not really feel different.

If the tempo does not change and the caller sings the song, the only change is that the dancers have to learn a new formation that is uncomfortable. The dancers get lost and dizzy. "Slaunch to Donegal" really is a good dance, in spite of everything I've said about it so far. (Aside: I got to dance "Staunch" with Marie Armstrong and Erich Fritz of Germany singing. Marie sang in English, Erich sang it in his dialect of German. The two alternated choruses, then sang the last together. They had turned the tempo down to be comfortable. The crowd went crazy!) But "Slaunch" is not a good first exposure to contra dancing for square dancers because of all of the factors already mentioned. There is one more factor that makes it a disaster: most callers who use it do not understand it and therefore cannot present it well. The experience is frustrating for everyone.

This month's column was, to some extent, a list of things not to do when presenting contra dancing to square dancers.

The spirit stayed. It looks like the Spirit of the Dance has given us another chance. Maybe we can grab that
joyous energy again that made us the club people loved to come to. We'll see what the Snowflake Ball, our first Saturday dance this year brings. May it bring the hope and spirit we need.

## SAGE SWINGERS BRUNSWICK, ME <br> By Rick Powell

In September we had 11 squares at our Open House and had 50 prospective dancers attend. We have been able to retain 23 of those dancers in our fall class and they are making tremendous progress. This is a very energetic class that not only arrive a half hour before our workshop starts, to get a little extra instruction, but have also been setting up weekend practice sessions with a new prospective caller. ## Camping + Dancing = National Square Dance Campers Association

Are you a camper? Do you also square dance? Well then read on to learn more about the opportunities that abound for you when you combine both in the U.S. and Canada.

In the late 1950's a very active group of Wisconsin callers and dancers gathered fairly often to camp and dance together. Then in the early ' 60 's a couple from New Jersey who attended one of their weekends casually asked if they could start such a group back home. After serious discussions the Wisconsin folks suggested forming a National Square Dance Campers Association, for combining the best of both activities. Membership would be through autonomous chapters who would in turn annually choose national officers to conduct the overall business of this fledgling organization.

Barely had bylaws been adopted when in March of ' 65 the first chapter - \#001 Garden State Campers of New Jersey was well underway. In quick succession various chapters were formed in WI, MI, OH, IA and NY. Ironically the Wisconsin group, who had created the idea in the first place, were so slow in submitting their own application, they became the tenth chapter (\#010) to form! Thus they call their group "Pioneers," since they were first with the idea.

When dancing campers in Ontario, Canada asked to join, the NSDCA decided to identify them by putting a "C" before
their chapter number, thus the "Swing ' N ' Canadians" became \#C-028. By 1970 the NSDCA became a coast to coast organization when a chapter formed in California.

Although the fledgling organization had a quarterly magazine, the NSDCA TIMES, devoted to the happenings and schedules of the camping weekends of its chapters, it also realized the importance of providing an event where the chapters could gather and become better acquainted with others in Canada and the United States who shared their love of combining camping and dancing. This annual International Camporee, which is held in July, has became a popular event. And the six Illinois chapters promise that Crescent City, IL is the place to be to "Get Your Kicks in 2006" this July. Non members are also welcome to come and get a taste of the fun and fellowship of combining both activities.

Currently there are chapters in 28 states and 3 provinces. It makes no difference what style of camping a dancer enjoys, they are welcome to become a member. Whether they are a tenter, have a pop-up camper, or any kind of RV they are welcome. Most chapter campouts, as well as the International Camporee, are family oriented with children and grandchildren always welcome. Some members are fulltime campers while others are only able to spend an occasional weekend camping and dancing. It makes no difference. Besides dancing, campouts usually include a myriad of other activities, including games and sports, tours and sightseeing, potlucks, crafts, shopping, eating out, celebrations, campfires, after parties, visiting with long time friends and meeting new ones.... a time of fun and fellowship.

Guest campers are always welcome to attend our International Camporee. Attendees will gather during mid week, the

* The toll-free telephone number, 1-$866-445-A R T S(2787)$, is now up and running for the public to access current information on Round, Traditional and Square dancing nationwide. It provides contact information useful to potential new dancers and also to current dancers looking for dance locations in areas where they are traveling.
* A demographic survey of dancers was developed and conducted at the National Square Dance in Denver, CO, in 2004, and Portland, OR this past summer, and will be repeated in Charlotte, NC in 2007. These contain vital information needed when we approach companies and organizations for sponsorships and grants.
* In addition, ARTS-DANCE issued its first grant in the amount of $\$ 1,000$ to the California Square Dance Council, Inc., for its "Teach the Teacher" program, an educational package that will serve as a pilot program for use in other states. Future plans for a nationwide marketing effort will be costly, but well worth the money invested.

admittance price has been in effect if you cannot make it for both days. For those who register for the two days, there is dancing available on Thursday night as part of your registration fee. On Sunday there is a dance to benefit the Square Dance Foundation of New England. This event has a separate admittance fee.

Then there are the "After Parties" which are probably some of the most anticipated events at the convention.

If you've been to "convention" before, we don't have to tell you about what's there. If you have not been for a long time, make this year the year to return to "convention."

## ED FOOTE

## THINGS TO CONSIDER

Box the Gnat. Why do so many women try to do this call with the left hand? I see this at almost every dance in all parts of the country. Yes, Star Thru uses a left hand and it is called more often, but Box the Gnat does not sound at all like Star Thru.

Some women seem to have the idea that any time they have to raise a hand, it will be the left. Hope they never have to be sworn in for anything.

Men wearing a hat. From time to time I will see men on the dance floor wearing a western hat. Obviously they think they look "cool" and western by doing so. But etiquette says that a man always takes his hat off inside a building, and especially in the tradition of the West, a man always took off his hat when going indoors.

So instead of looking "cool", these men are illustrating that they do not know proper manners.

Money. As a follow-up to my article entitled "Money, the Taboo Subject" (NE Dancer $12 / 04 \& 2 / 05)$, here is a warning: STAY AWAY FROM SOMEONE TRYING TO SELL YOU AN ANNUITY. Annuities are only appropriate for a very small minority of people, and you probably are not one of them.

Annuities are very confusing, filled with hidden costs, and the salesmen often
make statements that contain unsubstantiated assumptions. In the past year I have heard several sad stories about people (some being personal acquaintances) being pressured to buy annuities when it was a totally wrong investment for them. It has become so bad that the states of California, Massachusetts and New Jersey have launched investigations into annuity sales.

Note: Charitable Annuities, in which older people make a charitable contribution in return for a guaranteed rate of return for life, is a different animal. At least here your return is guaranteed and you know up front what you are getting. Unless it is this type, BEWARE OF ANNUITIES!

Singing call material. Why do some experienced callers put awkward material on their singing call records? In the past year several records have come out with blatantly bad material. Do these callers think that their wonderful voices can make up for bad choreography?

Aside from dancers having to dance this stuff, new callers who don't know any better use it (for patter as well) and thus bad choreography is perpetuated. Don't assume that just because a figure is printed on the sheet that comes with the record, that this makes it good. Always check the figure for smooth flow and timing.

Following is a dance that I learned at "Pappy" Shaw's summer dance class in the late 1950s. It has long been a favorite of mine and I still use it quite frequently. It is a smooth waltz mixer called the - - -

## Waltz Ballonet

Formation: Couples in the circle promenade position facing CCW.
Footwork: Same throughout.
Music: Waltz Ballonet, Shaw No. X-76
Routine:
Balance forward, balance back, walk, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6:
Balance forward on the left and balance back on right.
Starting with the left foot walk forward six steps.
Balance forward, balance back, man walks forward:
Balance as above. Drop left hands and man walks forward six steps to face out.
Ladies face in, join hands in circle.
Balance forward, balance back, turn half around:
Balance as above. Drop left hands and turn half around in six steps.
Men face in and ladies face out. Join hands in circle.
Balance forward, balance back, take new partner:
Balance as above. Drop right hands. Man moves to lady at his left in six steps.
Facing CCW take new partner in promenade position.



And here is one of the neatest circle mixers that I ever learned. Talk about a "quick-teach" routine. It is called the --

## Progressive Barn Dance

Formation: Hold inside hands with your partner. Lady is on the right of the man. Face in a counterclockwise direction round the circle, with men on the inside of the circle, ladies on the outside of the circle.
Music: Any comfortable 32 bar tune.
Routine:

1. Starting on the left foot, walk forward 4 steps.
2. Walk backwards 4 steps.
3. Let go of partner's hand, and separate, men walk 2 steps into the circle, ladies walk 2 steps out of the circle.
4. Turn $180^{\circ}$ to your right on the 3 rd and 4 th step, so that you are facing your partner.
5. Move towards the lady or gentleman to the left of your partner. They become your new partner.
6. Take them in a Ballroom hold, and swing them round once in a clockwise direction, so that you end up facing in a counterclockwise direction round the circle.
7. Start the dance again.

## Calling

- Forward and back (8)
- Separate and turn. (4)
- Move left and swing new partner. (4)

That's it for April.

## Comment

Jim Mayo

This is convention month and it's time for me to make my annual pitch for your support. I'm sure I seem like a broken record to some of you, but I'll keep on trying to persuade you that the convention is the best place to get the full benefit out of your investment of time and effort to learn to square dance.

For me, the most important benefit of this activity is the people. We have made hundreds of friends over the five-plus decades we have been involved. The New England Convention brings more of them together in one place than any other event we attend. As we walk around the halls and corridors we see a familiar face with nearly every step.

I wouldn't try to tell you that we remember the names of all these people. I wish I could. But we have a good memory for faces and can often connect them with events. We spend much of our time at conventions sharing memories of the good times with the folks who were there. These days, when communication is so often electronic, we count ourselves fortunate to be able to share those memories face-to-face.

I've written in this column often that the most important benefit of square dancing is the friends we make. Sure, it's fun to dance but, as I wrote a couple of months ago, how many of us would go to a dance where we didn't expect to see anyone we knew. And, if we did, wouldn't it be in the hope that we would meet some
new folks that we would like to know as friends? If you've been a dancer for a few years you can count on seeing folks you know at the New England Square and Round Dance Convention in Springfield this month.

Last year, in Brattleboro, the hard work of the Convention Committee resulted in a most unusual change in the pattern of convention attendance. ## Half Baked Caramel Brownies

1 box German chocolate cake mix
$2 / 3$ cup evaporated milk, divided
16 -ounce package semi-sweet
chocolate chips
$1 / 2$ cup coarsely chopped walnuts
1 bag caramels
$3 / 4$ cup melted butter
Combine dry cake mix with $1 / 3$ cup evaporated milk. Press half of mixture into greased $9 \times 13$-inch pan. Bake at $350^{\circ}$ for 5 minutes. Unwrap caramels and melt with remaining $1 / 3$ evaporated milk.

Sprinkle chocolate chips over par-tially-baked brownie base. (You don't have to let this partially-baked brownie base cool before adding chocolate chips.) Sprinkle on walnuts. Pour caramel mixture over top.

Pat reserved cake mixture into flat pieces with your hands. Lay randomly on top of caramel. Bake at $350^{\circ}$ 20-25 minutes. Let cool, cut and enjoy!

## Deluxe Sugar Cookies

1 cup butter, softened
$11 / 2$ cups confectioner's sugar
1 egg
1 tsp vanilla
$1 / 2 \mathrm{tsp}$ almond extract
$21 / 2$ cups flour
1 tsp baking soda
1 tsp cream of tartar
Granulated sugar
Mix thoroughly butter, confectioner's sugar, egg, vanilla and almond extract. Blend in flour, baking soda and cream of tartar. Cover: chill 2-3 hours.

Heat oven to $375^{\circ}$. Divide dough in half. Roll each half $3 / 16$ inch thick on lightly floured, cloth covered board. Cut into desired shapes; sprinkle with granulated sugar. Please on a cookie sheet sprayed with non stick spray. Bake 7-8 minutes or until light brown on edges.

Makes about 5 dozen 2-2½ inch cookies.

## A GUIDELINE FOR NEW DANCERS

## DON'T BE IN A HURRY TO DANCE OTHER PROGRAMS!

There are many prorams in square dancing. The program you dance has nothing to do with how much time you have to devote to the hobby. You may choose to move to another program and that's fine. Don't make the choise at all until you have danced Mainstream for at least one full year after you start dancing.

Don't let anyone else rush you!

## LETTERS

To the editors,
I really enjoy reading Jim Mayo's reminiscences in NESDM, particularly when he compares the beginnings of Modern Western Square Dancing in our area with the way it is practiced today. In the March issue he mentioned the addition of Square Thru to the call repertoire as an example of a call that changed how square dance choreography was practiced. Jim noted he had been confused when first learning the call, but when he added it to his program he "spent a whole three hour workshop on that one call." In that workshop session they did the call "straight, in fractions, split, with four boys and then with four girls and then with some of each but in half-sashayed couples. We did it from facing lines, from boxes and on the diagonal." Why is Square Thru, and a host of other calls, not taught that way in today's workshops?

The vast majority of dancers, with notable exceptions, have never learned the call definitions and can only do them by rote from the "normal" position. Unfortunately, when an imaginative caller puts them in an off-position the intimidation factor kicks in and it is often crash-andburn. Perhaps it is time to reevaluate the
schedule used by most clubs to push new dancers into the Plus Program and spend more time truly learning the call definitions (at all levels) and putting them into practice so they can be called from a variety of setups at our dances and not have chronic breakdowns.

One thing I would suggest is workshop leaders not be afraid to introduce calls that are not gender specific from a variety of positions. (It may require a little reeducation of some of our clubs as well.) By this approach the learner (no matter how experienced) is forced to focus on the definition of the call and truly learn it. Acquiring skills in square dancing is much like becoming proficient in a language. You acquire the vocabulary and grammar, and use it in the different contexts of conversation and writing. Once a learner begins to think in a language (square dance) the words (calls) and grammar (position) come naturally without hesitation because they no longer have to pause and think about them.

Phase IV $+2+1$ (Unphased Solo Left Trng Basic) - Jive - CD 60129 Trk 6 "No fun Allowed" Glenn Frey - Aubrey \& Joann Smelser. Catchy music, routine makes you smile. It has basic jive steps in it and also sailor shuffles, chicken walks, chasse rolls. Good basic jive.

## Too Good to Be Cha Cha

Phase IV (Unphased Whip \& Wrap \& Stop \& Go Hockeystick) - Rumba \& Cha Philips 40446 or LM0008 "Can't Take My Eyes Off You" Frankie Valli - Russ Booz. Triple cha's, sliding door, and basic steps with a little twist in them in the cha portion. Rumba has serpiente, chair rec slip. Good rumba and cha music.

Phase II - 2 Step - ABC Label 11379 Bill Crash Craddock - Russ Booz. Broken box, lace sequence, hitches, wrap and unwrap sequence in this routine. Good one for your record box.

## Coming Home

Phase V+2 - Bolero - CD Tom Jones Greatest Hits "The Complete TJ" - Bob \& Jackie Scott. This bolero starts in shadow and intro has contra break included in that portion. Other bolero figures are: Double hand hold opening out, syn curl to shadow into sweethearts. Also has a leg crawl, riff turn, half moon. Ending is accompanied with an arm sweep. Very nice bolero.

## All The While

Phase III+2 (Shoulder Shove \& Am Spin) - Jive -STAR 220B - Peg \& John Kincaid. Basic jive with link rocks, chasses left and right, change hands behind the back, shoulder shove, point steps. Good one to introduce jive after you have cliniced the figures.

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## Under The Sea

Phase IV - 2 Step/Samba - STAR 220A Peg \& John Kincaid. This is an intro to samba with a smidgen of 2 step included. Samba steps are traveling volta's, criss cross voltas, spot voltas, samba turns. Another good one to introduce a new rhythm to the dancers.

## Marshmallow World

Phase III+2 (Op Tel \& Dia Trn) - Foxtrot

- Dino CD T10 CD - Milo \& Terry Molitoris. Great phase III foxtrot. Left turns, hover, whisk, back hover, diamond turn, cross hovers, chair rec. point to a chasse. Don't pass this one up.


## Angels Don't Lie

Phase IV+1 (Op Hip Twist) - Rumba STAR 173 or RCA 47-9800 - Nancy \& DeWayne Baldwin. Basic rumba, has time steps, open hip twist, New Yorkers, umbrella turns, open break. Ending is twist and kiss.

## I'm Sorry I Answered The Phone

Phase II +1 (Unphased Front Twisty Vine) - Waltz/2Step - STAR 173 - Shigeyuki \& Miwae Yamashita. Parts A \& B are basic waltz steps. Twinkles, left turning box, twisty vine, prog. twinkles. Parts C \& D are

2 step, vine and clap sequence with side touches, and step brushes. Ending is side lunge and tilt.

## A Little Bit More

Phase III+2 (Hockey Stick \& Um Trns) Rumba - STAR 214 - Nancy \& DeWayne Baldwin. Nice basic rumba to good music. Hockey stick peek-a- boo double, crab walks. Ending is New Yorker in 4 and point.

## Could It Be Magic

Phase IV+1 (DblCubans)-Cha-STAR 214

- Nancy \& DeWayne Baldwin. Open hip twist, fan hockey stick, alemana, parallel chase, lady lariats. Lady has transitions in this routine. Ending is stomp 3 times.

Phase III-2 Step-Desert Gold Recording DGR018 - Ronnie \& Bonnie Bond. Choreographer says slow to dance comfortably. Hip rocks, circle 2 step, fishtail, merengue 4 , open vine, strolling vine, Charleston in closed position. Ending is cute look back \& wink.

## SYMMETRY

During the Romantic period of literature (late 1700 's/early 1800 's), authors such as Wordsworth and Coleridge practically worshiped nature. While they recognized the dangers of nature, they idolized its beauty. The Romantics also had an obsession for emotion and idealism.

The Romantics wrote in response to and against the Age of Reason - also called the Neo-Classical period. The Neo-classicists consciously tried to apply the theories of the classic Greek and Roman authors to their style, form, and content. The Neo-Classicists believed in the power of the human mind to solve the problems of human-kind. The architecture of Washington, D.C. reflects Neo-Classical. And the United States Constitution is a marvelous example of the thinking of the Age of Reason.

In the realm of art, Neo-Classicists loved symmetry and balance. This is easily seen in the old formal gardens of England and parts of the Eastern US. The gardens illustrate the theory that nature is beautiful, but man can improve on it. Therefore the symmetry of the gardens nature grows wild, but man can organize and control nature. Not only plant-life, but the human soul, as well.

This period is noted for elegance in dress and manner. It is the period of powdered wigs and extravagant style. It is fun to revisit the period's dances. The English country dance has moved from the country to the formal ballrooms, and the music moved from fiddles to violins (and
violas and cellos and continuous keyboards, usually harpsichords). The minuet is perhaps the best example of the dance of the period: it has an elegant rhythm and form and style that has not been matched on the popular dance floor before or since.

On the other hand, to be accepted in polite society in the Age of Reason, a person had to be witty, knowledgeable, and graceful. To succeed at dancing, one must take dance lessons to learn the complex steps and patterns.
[I think it is good that we have become more egalitarian in dance. Most anyone can get on the floor to dance to swing or Latin or country music. Modern square dance, unfortunately, has become extremely complicated, and therefore it is unavailable to all but the most dedicated dancers. The victim of MWSD choreography has been smoothness, music awareness, and symmetry.]

A large portion of the contra dance world has kept the dances simple. If you attend a 15 to 30 minute pre-session to a dance, you can learn enough to dance all night. It is also great to see that contra music and choreography has kept some of the elegant symmetry that so attracted people in the early 1800 's. For example, most contra dance music is symmetrical: there are two melodies of eight measures each. The first tune is played twice, then the second tune is played twice. Back to the top. (I fully recognize that there are numerous exceptions to my description which works well
enough for this column.) At the top of the printed music sheet you can see the notation AABB which means A melody twice, B melody twice. Very regular and symmetrical , and very pleasing.

So when a modern choreographer writes a dance that acknowledges the form of the music, our dancing pleasure is more than doubled. As dancers, we feel the "rightness" of the moves with the music. Here is a modern contra written by Jacob Bloom that is just "right."

Double Rainbow by Jacob Bloom Formation: alternate duple Music: something that is in traditional form and the A and B melodies are strong, perhaps a rousing hornpipe.
Intro: - - - -, 2's mirror allemande above
1-8: ----, - 2's swing and face up
9-16: - - - -, 1's mirror allemande below
17-24: ----, 1's swing and face down
25-32: ----, 1's center, go down in four
33-40: - - centers wheel, ends turn,

- -return

41-48: - - - bend, - - circle left full around
49-56: - - - -, - - balance the ring
57-64: - - 1's California twirl,

-     - 2's allemande handy-hand

Just take a look at the first four phrases and notice that the action is completely balanced: the 2 's do something, then the 1's do exactly the same thing. What is unique is that the 2's do it first. Most dances have the 1's start the action. The second half of the dance has a slightly looser symmetry, but it is there: lines of four down the hall, reform lines of four to come back up the hall, then progress.

The mirror allemande for the 2's goes this way. The 1's step apart so that the 2's can split them, and all do an allemande with the "handy-hand." The \#2 man does an allemande left with the \#1 lady, while the \#2 lady does an allemande right with the \#1 man. In other words, the 2's step
between the 1 's and cast-off $3 / 4$ so the 2 's meet each other to swing and end facing the original direction. Then the 1's get to do the same thing: the 1's step between the 2's to allemande with the "handy-hand."

After the 1's swing, they face down and step between the 2's to form lines of four facing the back of the hall. The lines promenade down four steps, then the centers wheel (man backs up and the lady moves forward) and the ends turn alone. The lines coming back up the hall are now (from the caller's left) LL/MM. When they bend the line, all the men are on one side and the ladies on the opposite side. Circle left full around changes the formation slightly: instead of lines facing across, there are groups of two couples facing each other with the 2's facing down with the lady on the man's left. The 1's are facing up with the lady on the man's right. Balance the ring is simply all four dancers balance forward and back in four beats. They use the momentum of the balance to flow into the next movement.

To start the next sequence of the dance, the 2 's simply turn around individually to face a new \#1 couple - that u-turn back puts the \#2 lady on her partner's right. The 1's California twirl, ending up with the \#1 lady on her partner's right and facing a new \#2 couple. As the 1's finish the California twirl, they must push away from each other and be prepared to use that same hand to do the mirror allemande.

So, here is a modern contra dance that pays tribute to the tradition of older dances. It is an especially satisfying dance because of its almost Neo-Classical symmetry and its use of music to reinforce the dance movements. At the same time it is romantic. Dance itself should be emotional, and during the allemandes and swings the dancers should make eye contact. What can arouse the emotions higher than to really see the people you are dancing with. Following is about the simplest contra that I have ever danced. A super quickteach routine. I got it on the web from Hugo's International Folk Dance Repertoire.

## Nottingham Swing

## From England

Formation: Longways set, men on the right, ladies on the left.
Number each couple 1 or 2 alternately.
Instructions

1. First man links right arms with $2^{\text {nd }}$ lady further down the set. They step hop round once and go back to place.
2. First lady links right arms with $2^{\text {nd }}$ man further down the set. They step hop round once and go back to place.
3. Number 1 couple join hands with each other (right hand with left) and take 2 side steps down the set, and 2 side steps back.
4. Number 1 couple cast off down the set behind the Number 2 couple they have just danced with and go into the Number 2 couples place. The Number 2 couple move up a place.
5. Everybody swing.
6. Start the dance again.

Note
At the top of the set a Number 2 couple will have no one to dance with. They must wait a round before coming in as a number 1 couple. Similarly, at the bottom of the set a Number 1 couple will have no one to dance with. They must wait a round before coming in as a number 2 couple. This anomally occurs every other round. It is recommend teaching the $2^{\text {nd }}$ part of the dance first, so that they get really familiar with the progression.

Calling
$1^{\text {st }}$ man $^{\text {nd }}$ lady. (8)
$2^{\text {nd }}$ man $1^{\text {st }}$ lady. (8)
$1^{\text {st }}$ couple down and back, cast off behind the number 2 s . (8)
Everybody swing. (8) (End couples have a rest )( couples come back in as opposites.)

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Here is a quick-teach square dance that has always been a favorite of mine.

## ADAM AND EVE

First lady out to the couple on the right
And swing old Adam with all your might (right elbow)
Now swing Miss Eve with the greatest of ease (left elbow)
Then swing old Adam before you leave (right elbow)
And don't forget your own.
Swing once at home before you go,
Then to the opposite gent with the right elbow.
Repeat for each couple and then return home for an allemande left and grand right and left. Then No. 2 lady visits each couple. Then No. 3 lady, followed by No. 4 lady.

That's it for May.

Phase IV - Waltz - STAR 215 - Nancy \& DeWayne Baldwin. Dance flows very nicely and this is a soft Phase IV routine. Figures included are waltz away, cross hovers, diamond turn, in and out runs. Ending is canter and side corte.

Phase IV+1 (Double Cuban Breaks) - Cha Cha - STAR 113 B Swingin' On A Star Alex \& Jennifer Kennedy. Alemana, reverse $\mathrm{u} / \mathrm{a}$ turn, crab walks, fence line, double Cuban breaks, chase double peek a boo. Ending is cross check hold and tilt. Figures flow very well in this cha cha.

## Whisper Your Love IV

Phase IV+1 (Curved Father) - Waltz Roper 403 - Bob Paull. Great waltz music. Cross hovers, drag hesitation, weaves, diamond turn, in and out runs. Ending is canter and side corte.

## For Those Who Are Young

Phase V+1 (Spin \& Twist) - Waltz - STAR 135A - Shirley \& Don Heiny. Beautiful waltz music. Hover telemark, drag hest, locking steps, double reverse, weaves, and other basic waltz steps. A very enjoyable routine.

## What A Lovely Way

Phase IV - Foxtrot - STAR 176A Shirley \& Don Heiny. Chair and slip, reverse turns, outside change, weaves, diamond turn, telemark, locking steps box finish. Ending is thru side lunge and slowly twist. Excellent foxtrot music.

## Much More Than This

Phase III+2 (Alemana/Fan) - Rumba Roper JH 423 My Way - Yasuyo Watanabe. Shoulder to shoulder, kiki walks, alemana, peek a boo chase, crabwalks. Nice easy rumba.

## This Is Love

Phase IV+2 (Op. Hip Twist/Sweethearts) Phase V with option challenge chase - Cha Cha - CD DLD 1073, 1066, Star 132 Eso Es El Amor - Ake \& Birgitta Grahm. Switch rock, hand to hand, triple cha's, open hip twist, aida, switch cross, flirt, sweetheart. Ending is aida in 3 and hold. Music makes you want to dance.


## Begin the Beguine Rumba

Phase V+1 (Rope spin) - Rumba - Roper 270 - Debbie \& Paul Taylor. Cuddles, closed hip twist, hockey stick, flirt, cross basics, parallel breaks, tornillo wheel. Ending is a leg crawl. This dance has every Phase V rumba figure. Very nicely done.

## Gozo III

Phase III - Cha Cha - STAR 211 - Nariaki \& Hideko Aoyama. Very easy cha. Has $1 / 2$ basic, whip, sliding door, cucaracha's, shoulder to shoulder, New Yorker, chase, spot turn. Ending is step side and stamp 3 times. Fun routine.

## Words Of A Fool

Phase II - Waltz - MCA 53248 Famous Last Words of a Fool by George Strait or MCA 53512 - Norman Dobbs \& Shirley Gordon. Left turning box, waltz away, turn in, back waltz, thru twinkles and prog twinkles, spin manu, solo turn in 6 , canter. Excellent to introduce several waltz figures to the new dancer.

## Wheels Cha

Phase III - Cha Cha - STAR 134 Wheels Bob Paull. Basic, twirl to a tamara, wheel, unwrap, fenceline, chase, sandsteps, alemana. Ending is a stomp 3 times. Great cha cha beat.
Beguine des Fleurs (Beguine of the Flowers) Phase IV+1 (Check/Weave) - Foxtrot Star 126A - Alex \& Jennifer Kennedy. Love the intro, together and shape into a
feather finish. Reverse wave, closed impetus, cross hovers, open natural, outside change, diamond turn, check and weave. Ending is through to a quick oversway. This foxtrot flows so nicely.

## Till Then

Phase IV - Rumba-STAR 208 - Irv \& Betty Easterday. $1 / 2$ basic, aida, switch rock, crabwalks. Routine has a tamara sequence, to hold and lady develope, serpiente, cross body, cross swivels for lady. Ending is right lunge. Very nice rumba.

## Big Spender

Phase V+2 (Rudolph/Telespin) - Foxtrot CD Big Spender by Peggy Lee or from buymusic.com - Debby \& Tim Vogt. We love this dance, it is so much fun, and the routine fits the music to a "T." Starts with corte with leg crawl, contra check rudolph ronde, zig zag, hover telemark, cross points, step brushes, solo turns. Ending is oversway and hold.

## My Heart Will Go On

Phase IV+2 (Spiral/Horseshoe Turn) Bolero - CD Let's Talk About Love by Celine Dion, My Heart Will Go On - Trk 12 - Debby \& Tim Vogt. The music in this routine is perfect for bolero. It starts in tandem embrace, and shadow fencelines, basic outside partner, lady spirals, cross body, hip rocks, cross body, ending is cross check and extend. Don't pass this one up.

I have to tell you all about it. The Tri State Callers Association New Dancer Winter Ball was a huge success. We held it on Sunday, February 26 at the Mill-ARound Dance Center in Manchester. NH and had sixteen and a half squares. They were having a ball.

We've had this dance several times before and have been reasonably satisfied with the five or six squares in attendance. After our 2005 Ball one of our members, Al Rouff and his wife France told us that we could do a lot better if we would only put some effort into promotion. Of course we gave them the job. They accepted and then set about showing us what could be accomplished with real promotional effort.

I'm not sure that there are many folk who would be willing to invest the kind of work Al and France put in. They contacted everyone they could find an address for by E-mail, telephone and personal visit. They went, in person, to dances in Brunswick, ME and Northern Vermont - and a whole bunch of other places as well. Every time they danced or called they made a major pitch for the dance.

They did more than just promote the dance. They also got several of the Tri State members and the Association officers involved at a more intense level than they had anticipated. They came up with the idea of giving special banners to the clubs represented among the attendees - and then France made the banners. They dragged out
an old badge idea - the Purple Heart - that you get for dancing in a square with three callers. It didn't catch on right away but when it did get started it spread like wildfire and more callers danced more than they expected to than anyone had imagined they would.

The program, of course, was limited to the first 53 calls on the CALLERLAB Mainstream list. A lot of today's experienced dancers might think that such a restricted program couldn't make much of a dance. As we watched the floor fill for nearly every tip it was clear that the dancers present didn't give that much thought. And, yes, we had a good share of new dancers but we also had quite a bunch of dancers with many years of experience.

All in all it was a great party. Many folks said it reminded them of the "old days" of full halls and lively dancing. Most of the dancers were so busy having fun that they didn't notice how complicated the choreography was. The hall was noisy, the refreshments were abundanct and the people-to people interaction was everywhere.

The Square Dance Foundation Library - Museum which is right next door was open for the afternoon and a lot of folks got a first look at the wonderful collection of square dance memorabilia that is on display there. The proceeds of the dance were donated by Tri State to the Foundation and the total came to more than $\$ 600$. It certainly is a fun way to make a worthwhile contribution.

## Poetry in Motion

Almost all callers use rhyme in their patter, whether they are calling contras, old time squares, or modern squares. Usually the rhymes show up during a promenade: "swing that gal and home you go, like a chicken in the bread pan pickin' out dough," or "meet your honey and swing and whirl, promenade go around the world." These are ways to keep the rhythm of the dance going vocally, and they are to add a little entertainment filler.

Several figures lend themselves to poetry patter, such as Square Thru 4, Swing, and Promenade. We no longer dance one of the greatest figures for verse: DoSiDo. A what!? Yes, Virginia, there is an old figure called DoSiDo, and until it was dropped from the standard list of basics, it was one of the most popular figures in square dancing.

Easterners (and now Modern Western Square Dancers) are used to DoSaDo. This term derives from the French, meaning back-to-back (dos a dos). And back-toback is still the correct way to dance it. (Where the waist around dosado comes from is another story.) But, in the early part of the $20^{\text {th }}$ century, up until about 1960 , dancers from the West knew a figure called DoSiDo, which derives from the Spanish for two and two.

DoSaDo is for two dancers, while DoSiDo is for four dancers. The simple version starts with two couples facing each other. Each couple turns partner by the left, then faces across to the other couple,
and with the men passing back to back with each other, turn the opposite lady by the right; the men again go back to back to the partner to turn by the left (and often right into a promenade or a progression to the next couple).

The story from Dr. Lloyd "Pappy" Shaw is that dancers in London could pronounce DoSaDo correctly, but once you got out of town, pronunciation was anything but standardized. For example, the word "Bethlehem" was pronounced "Bedlam" (and how bedlam got its modern meaning is yet another story). Anyway, the dear Scots and the folks of Appalachia said DoSiDo instead. Pappy tells of someone taking notes at a dance where he was using DoSiDo. At the end of the dance, the man came up to Pappy with a drawing of a cute little deer coming over a hill; the caption was Docey-Doe. That became the spelling Pappy used from then on.

Dr. Shaw describes Docey-doe as two couples circling to the left. Each lady then drops hands with both men, steps in front of the man to her right (the opposite); the two ladies then go back to back with each other to give a left hand to their partners. Everybody pulls the partner by with the left and reaches across the set to turn the opposite by the right. The men can go back to back to reach out to the partner with the left and roll into promenade position.

What a great time for a little filler poetry! And old time callers had some great stuff (and some really corny stuff, too). Here are some samples.


Found a jaybird, shot him down Picked him clean and fried him brown
Took a big bite and wallowed it around
Backed my ears and swallowed him down.

Rabbit in the pea patch, pickin up peas
Along came a wild cat kickin' up his knees
A goose chewin' tobacco, a duck drinkin' wine
A hen plays a fiddle on an old gourd vine.

California boys are fast
Whistlin' when the girls go past
Mountain boys are debonair
They just grab you by the hair.
But, few of us can hear the difference between DoSado and Docey-doe when we are dancing - not to mention how many callers don't hear the difference either. There was mass confusion: did the caller mean back to back, or did he mean partner left...? The solution came out of Lloyd Shaw's caller schools. It was decided that DoSaDo would stay unchanged. Doceydoe would stay with old time squares. But, what to do with Docey-doe in Modern Western Square Dance? The solution was a stroke of genius: 1) slightly change how the figure was danced, and 2) change the name.

The figure changed from a two couple figure to a circle of eight (or an all eight promenade). From the circle, dancers could drop hands, turn to the partner and turn left, go to the corner to turn right, and back to the partner to turn left. You have probably figured out that the name of the figure is DoPaso, named for the Texas border town. Unfortunately too many callers are stuck on only one or two ways to set the call up. Some of the more creative callers use DoPaso in very imaginative ways.

DoPaso also shows up in some contra dances. Here is a dance that uses DoPaso to great effect.

## Where Are We Headed?

Spring is arriving and new graduates are entering our beloved activity. It is hard to say how many of them are graduating in New England, but there are reports of some good size classes, especially in Maine.

This is good news for our activity since we have been in a downward spiral (numbers wise anyways) for the past twenty years or so. Despite the numbers, from what I can see is that the clubs and dancers, who are struggling to hang on, are enjoying themselves at the dances and festivals.

It is still refreshing to see dancers travel to weekends and festivals. No one has the answer to stop the downward slide of overall numbers, but it is refreshing to see some new clubs being formed (two in Western Massachusetts alone) and others having a somewhat good size class.

While the rest of the activity continues to move along, having the usual conventions, anniversary dances, callers meetings as well as the internet callers list nitpicking every little word of a definition etc, there has been some success with a few of the clubs bringing in new dancers.

How these new dancers are to be treated remains to be seen, but it is important they are supported and encouraged to go out and dance. Nothing is ever going to stop dancers from having the choice to move to higher
levels. It's a free world, and as soon as the dancers settle in and see they can learn Plus, Advanced etc, it will be their choice to do so if they desire. That's what makes our activity so great, something for everyone. In a perfect world, some people would say that all dancers would only dance Mainstream and the halls would be full like they were forty years ago. The choreography would be simple etc. Others would say in a perfect world the Plus halls would be packed. Still others would say the Advanced and Challenge halls etc. At one time, all these halls were packed.

The reality of it is that we don't live in a perfect world, dancers don't dance perfectly, callers don't call perfectly and we don't have packed halls at any level now. But what we do offer is the variety of levels so everyone can have their choice and dance where they please. This is what makes our activity survive.

So, the next time you hear someone say that Mainstream is the only way to go, or any level for that matter, or that the callers should only do this or that, etc, smile and walk away. If our activity was that simple, we wouldn't even have these kinds of discussions. If someone chooses to dance a particular level, let them, perhaps they know where they are headed.

## Comment

Jim Mayo

I have a friend who calls in the "snowbird" parks during the winter months. From early spring to late fall he is mostly on the road calling for clubs throughout the central part of the U.S.

For the past several years he has been watching his crowds in both venues shrink. The other day he called to congratulate me on receiving the CALLERLAB "Gold Card" which signifies a life membership. (Isn't that a sneaky way of bragging?) Those that have been so recognized are a very small group and I am indeed honored.

After the congratulations we got to talking about square dancing and his calling in particular. He was pleased to report that this year in his park has been much more successful than any of the past few. Some of the other callers in his area have also done well, although the callers who specialize in challenging the dancers have not shared in the improvement.

He also reported that the crowds are up at the club dances he is calling and that several of those clubs have sponsored classes with several squares of new dancers. He calls mostly in the middle of the country where the CALLERLAB Mainstream program is the usual dance program. As you might expect, I believe that the focus on a less complicated dance program is an important factor in club success.

Here in New England we have very few examples to judge by. Many clubs
here dance a split, or alternating tip, program that is half Plus and half Mainstream. That's a gesture in the right direction and it certainly has improved the ability of dancers to do the Mainstream calls successfully. As a gesture of welcome to less-than-experienced dancers, however, it isn't much. If the program includes rounds, those who haven't learned the Plus calls get to dance maybe $1 / 4$ of the evening program.

It shouldn't surprise us, then, to find very few people sitting out the Plus tips at these dances. I know I've been beating this horse for years but the evidence is everywhere. Clubs that only want to continue doing what they've been doing for the last decade or two have, in my view, a rather short future. They do have company. Callers who want only to call for existing clubs and are not willing to find new ways to offer square dancing will also find the market for their services shrinking.

On the bright side, however, my friend reported a very generous gesture on the part of a club he had called for recently. They recognized that he traveled a considerable distance by car to get to their dance and that the price of gas is climbing. They added a $\$ 1.00$ per dancer surcharge to the admission price and gave him over $\$ 100$ more than his fee to help with the increased travel cost. Square dancers really are very nice people.

## Telling Tales

The late Ralph Page on Keene, New Hampshire, was known as the "dean of American Contra Dance." In his career, which spread over half a century, Ralph wrote several books on contra dance and the history of dance, he traveled widely teaching and calling contras and squares, and he hosted one of the most popular contra dances ever. People traveled from all over the world to Keene for the chance to dance to Ralph.

Two things set Ralph apart from all other callers. One was his demanding style of calling. If you did not dance according to his standards of timing and styling, he was likely to stop the band, point you out in front of everyone, and ask you to stop by the front table to get your admission back and keep going. The other thing about Ralph was his publication "Northern Junket." The mimeographed newsletter was sent out to subscribers, and then passed on from hand to hand. It has become a collector's item. Occasionally you can find an advertisement from someone who wants a particular issue. The magazine was filled with dances from all eras and with the lead sheet music for the dances. And it also had news clippings from the past about dances held throughout New England.

For example: from Claremont South Village, August 25, 1897: "Mr. Barry's dancing floor was well patronized last Saturday evening...We know of nothing connected with these dances that could be
called vulgar or immoral. Everything is conducted in an orderly and quiet manner, and if we believe the Bible, as I hope we all do, dancing is a pastime that has been indulged in almost from the beginning of creation. If we read the good Book at all we often read of dancing parties. There was music and dancing when the prodigal son returned, and on various other occasions; and if there is any enjoyment for the young people in shaking the fantastic toe, let them shake."*

Another tale is of the Fifteenth Regiment Fiddle (February 24, 1898). A member of the regiment bought a fiddle, which he then sold to the company. The fiddle went with the company wherever they marched. "Just before the battle of Gettysburg everybody was throwing away luggage in preparation for the great event, but Guild took his fiddle to the sutler, had it boxed and shipped to his brother of St. Johnsbury, Vt., where it has been ever since."*

One of my favorite entries is from The New Hampshire Sentinal: "The leap year ball was a success, at least as far as enjoyment was concerned. Notwithstanding the inclemency of the weather there was very nearly a hall full of dancers, all of whom evidently had a first rate time with an A1 supper thrown in. Owing to the efficiency of the ladies who managed the affair the bar was closed, and the gentlemen were allowed but one cigar a piece..."

But the tales about Ralph are perhaps

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 www.squaredance.wseven more entertaining than the tales he told. Ralph was known as a night owl: if you were to call him at 3:00am, you would probably catch him wide awake and working. However, no one called him at 10:00am because he was sound asleep. If he were awakened at that hour, he invariably was in a foul mood, and the interloper paid for it.

One year Ralph and two other internationally know contra callers were booked to teach at a university dance camp for teachers in training. The director of the camp assigned each of the three callers in strict rotation, each one expected to take the 8:00am session at least once. The other two callers approached the director and tried to explain that Ralph did not do mornings. They even offered to take the morning sessions for Ralph. No deal. The director would not allow anyone to disrupt her very carefully planned program. Mr. Page will call his 8:00am session, just like everyone else.

With trepidation, Ralph's two colleagues went down to the gymnasium
about 7:45am to witness the potential disaster. The gym was filled with young ladies who were bright eyed and bustling. Some of them had even pressed their gym clothes. Their faces were washed and shining, and their hair was pulled back into pony tails or pig tails in anticipation of the dance session. At about 8:01 the door to the gym opened, and there stood Ralph Page - in rumpled slacks, T-shirt, slippers, a robe sloppily tied at the waist, and a soggy cigar between his teeth. He stood there for a moment taking in the scene. The gym went absolutely silent as everyone stopped in mid-syllable and looked at this...this...in the doorway.

Ralph tried to comprehend these sprightly young ladies who could be so enthusiastic in the morning. Finally he took the cigar from his mouth, and in a gruff and growly voice, he said, "Damn it! Let's dance."

Rock A Bye is a more traditional sound with a fiddle, bass, guitar and drums. Rip Tide is a modern contemporary sound.

Heidi Hoe / Blame It On The Boogie CBC 605 / 606 (45, CD, MP3)
Heidi Hoe is a rhythm number with a modern flavor. Blame It On The Boogie is a modern contemporary sound from a mix of instruments. It has some vocal tracks that do not distract. The CD and MP3 have extended tracks plus a vocal track featuring David Cox.

Durango / Heart Beats Desert D 9014 (45, CD, MP3)

One Way / Happy Piano BS 2485 (45, CD)
One Way is a floor rouser featuring a mix of steel, horns, guitar, piano, bass and percussion. Happy Piano is a bright cherry sound highlighting piano stylings. CD has extended tracks.

Mule Time / Clark STCD 2047 (CD)

# Country Kitchen

Try this classic Italian pastry as a special treat for Father's Day.

## Profiteroles with <br> Ricotta Mascarpone

$1 / 2$ cup water
$1 / 4$ cup unsalted butter, cut into pieces
$11 / 2$ teaspoons plus 3 tablespoons sugar
Pinch of salt
$1 / 2$ cup all purpose flour
3 large eggs
1 (8-ounce) container mascarpone cheese
$3 / 4$ cup ricotta cheese
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
$1 / 2$ cup chocolate-hazelnut spread
(such as Nutella)
$1 / 4$ cup whipping cream
$1 / 4$ cup hazelnuts, toasted, husked, chopped

## Instructions

Preheat the oven to 375 degrees F. Line a heavy large baking sheet with a silpat or parchment paper. Combine the water, butter, $11 / 2$ teaspoons of sugar, and salt in a heavy medium saucepan. Bring to a boil, stirring until the butter melts. Add the flour and stir over medium heat for 1 minute. Cool 5 minutes.

Crack 2 eggs into a measuring cup. Use a wooden spoon to beat the eggs into the dough, 1 at a time. Spoon 10 or $12\left(1 \frac{1}{2}\right.$

inch) mounds of dough onto the prepared baking sheet, spacing 2 inches apart. Beat the remaining egg in a small bowl to blend. Gently brush the egg over the dough mounds (do not drip the egg onto the baking sheet).

Bake the pastries until they are amber brown, about 50 minutes. Allow the pastries to cool completely.

Mix the mascarpone, ricotta, vanilla, and remaining 3 tablespoons of sugar in a medium bowl. Refrigerate until cold. Using a serrated knife, cut the tops off the pastry and set aside. Spoon the mascarpone mixture into the pastries and top with its lid.

Combine the chocolate-hazelnut spread and cream in a small bowl. Heat in the microwave for about 30 seconds until warm. Stir the mixture. Spoon the chocolate-hazelnut sauce atop the pastries. Sprinkle with the hazelnuts and serve.

## HOW TO SQUARE UP WHEN THE CALLER MAKES A MISTAKE

If the caller gets you to the wrong partner at the end of a sequence, what do you do? Most people promenade home, keep the "wrong" partner, and wait for the caller to proceed with the next sequence. But is this the best way to go?

Technically, it is ok to keep the "wrong" partner. The caller did this to you, so you go with it. But is this best for you?

Let's look at how most callers call a dance today. They use "sight calling" to resolve the square to a Left Allemande with your original corner and back to your original partner for a Right \& Left Grand. To do this, callers memorize two adjacent couples in a square prior to the start of the tip. Ideally they do this for 3 squares, but some callers can not remember this many people.

If the caller gets everyone to the "wrong" partner by mistake and the dancers keep this partner, the caller is in big trouble. All the memorization of who goes with whom is out the window, and there is no time to do new memorization. So the caller is petrified about how to call the rest of the tip and get everyone to their "new" partner.

The result is the caller will generally call
unbelievably easy, using simple memorized sequences, anything to get people back to their "new" partner. In other words, the caller is likely to call nothing for the rest of the tip in an effort to survive.

However, if everyone adjusts at home to get their original partner back, now the caller has no problem. Not only have you done the caller a favor, but you have benefitted the entire floor, because now the caller can continue with his/her normal dance.

So remember: It benefits the entire floor if you get your original partner back when you are home and before the caller begins the next sequence. The caller will wait upon seeing you do this.

Note: Occasionally a caller may say: "Don't fix it - I intentionally got you to a different partner." If this happens more than once, don't believe it. The square dance game is played by having the caller get everyone back to their "original" partner at the end of each sequence. Callers who say it doesn't matter if you get your original partner back are really saying they are not able to do it, but they don't want you to realize this.

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# MEOORE ON CONTRA

## Plagiarism / Improvements / Variations

Plagiarism has been a hot topic lately. Dan Brown, the author of The DaVinci Code was exonerated in a much publicized case in London. In that case, the jury found that there were some minor similarities to a previous work about the Knights Templar, but not similar enough to amount to plagiarism. By the way, the book is quite a page turner which jumps off from an ancient line of questioning. What if Jesus had led a normal life for a young Jewish man and had a family? What would be the repercussions on the modern world? A more recent case of plagiarism has to do with teenage Kaavya Viswanathan, an undergraduate at Harvard. Recently the sources for many of her ideas and much of her text have been discovered. At least three authors have pointed out how much Viswanathan copied from their books. Publisher Little, Brown \& Company have had to withdraw the contract for future works.

But, did you know that plagiarism is rampant in contra dancing. However, contra choreographers call it 'research' or 'variations on a theme.' Many times the copying parts (or all) of a dance is inadvertent. The choreographer perhaps danced a figure years ago but it was
hidden deep in his subconscious. Finally it bubbles out in the original form or with variations. Also, it is impossible to know the entire literature of contra dance choreography. I have been guilty of both commissions - I have gotten home after a dance and tried to recreate the choreography of a dance from the evening. But I do not know if I remembered it exactly, or know the title or author. (I have learned to ask the evening's caller for notes on the dance so I can give credit to the originator.) And even with help from friends who have vast research materials at hand, I have inadvertently published a dance under my name and found out later it was not original.

Perhaps more common than inadvertent copying of figures is the practice of taking parts of a dance and re-arranging them to something new. Sometimes the new dance is worse than the original, and sometimes it is better. And in some strange instances, both dances become standards; callers all over the world use both dances successfully.

Here is one happy example of the latter. Don Armstrong wrote Broken Six Pence many years ago, and it quickly became a dance that almost every caller uses.

## Alternate Duple

Intro: - - --, below dosado
1-8: ----, just the men dosado
9-16: ----, just the ladies dosado
17-24: ----, active couples swing in the middle
25-32: -- - -, down the hall in lines of four
33-40: - - - turn alone, - - - come back
41-48: - - - bend the line, - - circle left
49-56: ----, - star left
57-64: -- --, new below dosado
This is a really fun dance that is a quick teach. The hardest part is dealing with the idea of actives. But with one or two walk-thrus, even relatively new dancers can dance this successfully. There is a symmetry to the dance that gives pleasure, but there is not a lot of repetition of figures by the same dancers (e.g. ladies chain over and back - repetitive motion for both the men and women).

Sometime later Jerry Helt took Broken Six Pence and turned it into Three Broken Six Pence. The title pays respect to the original, but it also says that the dance is new in its own way. Jerry also made the second half of the dance so different from Don's original that the two dances are distinct.

## Three Broken Six Pence by Jerry Helt

## Alternate Duple

Intro: - - - -, below dosado
1-8:----, just the ladies dosado
9-16: ----, just the men dosado
17-24: -- --, active couples swing in the middle
25-32: -- - -, go down in lines of three
33-40:----, right hand high, left hand low, - - back

41-48: - - - -, two ladies chain
49-56: ----, same four left hand star (full)
57-64: ----, new below dosado
As you can see, the first half is almost identical to Don's dance, except Jerry swaps the timing for the men and women on the dosados. That change is a subtle clue to the caller and the dancers that this is not identical to Broken Six Pence.

The beginning of the second half is where the major change starts and where the dance gets its title: instead of making lines of four, with the actives in the center of the line, the dancers make lines of three. The active man finishes the swing with his partner on his right, then he takes his corner with his left hand to make lines of three. The inactive man gets left behind. The lines of three, man in the center with a lady on either side, promenade down the hall.


Here comes a great old time call which takes just a moment to teach. The man raises his right hand to make an arch and leads that right hand lady around in front of him. At the same time the left hand lady, staying low, goes under the arch. The two ladies change places with each other and end facing the front of the hall. The man must turn under his own right hand arch with a 'dish rag' turn. The lines of three are now facing the front of the hall, and the man's partner is still on his right.

The lines then come back up the hall. As they do, the inactive men move up the hall also to keep in place with the lines. When the two ladies chain, they simply reach right hands in front of the active man and pull by. The active man must step out to his line to make the courtesy turn comfortable. The inactive man just sweeps his lady into the courtesy turn.

All dancers keep their left hands joined and reach them out to the opposite couple to make the left hand star. Make sure there is no delay in the transition from the courtesy turn to the star because the star must turn all the way around in only eight beats of music. As they finish the star,
all dancers are back in the lines they started in and can look slightly to their right to find the new below (or corner).

As you can see, Jerry borrowed (plagiarized) a big chunk of Don's dance, but he also created something new and very exciting. The original Broken Six Pence is a pleasure to dance because it flows so naturally from figure to figure. Three Broken Six Pence is a pleasure for those same reasons...and because of the old traditional figure of 'right hand high, left hand low.' Most dancers feel that they have done something really special.

Author's note: I have had the great pleasure and honor of working with and being friends with both Don and Jerry. Both of them have been honored by the American Square Dance Society: Sets in Order by being inducted into the caller's hall of fame. If you are ever in Albuquerque, New Mexico (no passport necessary, it is in the USA), stop at the Lloyd Shaw Foundation dance hall and see the portraits of all the hall of fame callers.

## ALASKA

At the end of last summer my wife and I flew to Anchorage, rented a car, and drove 4000 miles in 4 weeks throughout Alaska and the Yukon Territory, Canada. I had several dances in various areas along with a caller seminar, and it was my 50th state for calling. We stayed with dancers for half of the trip.

Clubs in Alaska are small, but enthusiastic. Most dances are Mainstream, but there are also Plus clubs and workshops. There is one A-1 club in the state. The two major cities, Anchorge and Fairbanks, each have their own square dance hall - beautiful buildings that are owned by the city but run by the dancers.

My dance in the Yukon Territory was cancelled, because most of the club was away for moose hunting season. That's a first.

One of the major things we learned is how much you don't see on a cruise to Alaska. If one takes the cruise only, with no land package (ie. doing only the Inside Passage), the experience is scenic but very limited. Many cruises offer the option of a land package through the Yukon, visiting Whitehorse and Dawson, as well as Fairbanks, Denali Park and Anchorage in Alaska, and this should definitely be taken.

But even then, according to several dancers we talked to, you don't see key sites, because the cruise lines will not tell you something exists if they can not make money from it. There is one major highlight in Fairbanks that only selected cruise lines show you, and another that you are never told about even though it is easily accessible in your free time. In Anchorage most cruise lines give you no sightseeing time at all, and one is rarely told about all the sites on the Kenai Peninsula south of the city - an area we found to be one of the most enjoyable parts of the state.

If you are going to Alaska on a cruise and will be taking the land package, feel free to email me your itinerary. I will be glad to let you know which cruise line is best for land packages, along with what important sites are omitted by all cruise lines, and how you can easily work these sites in. Even if you are not taking a land package, I can give you information about how you can easily see many more sites by arriving a few days before the cruise or delaying your flight home for a few days after the cruise concludes.

## NDA SICILIAN CIRCLE \#1

Formation: Pairs facing pairs around a large circle like spokes on a large wheel.
Music: Any 32 bar tune
Routine:
Intro --- - Circle to the Left
1-8----, Circle to the Right
9-16 ----, - - Star Right
17-24----, - Star Left
25-32----, Turn the opposite Right Hand Around
33-40 ----, Turn the opposite Left Hand Around
41-48 ----, Everybody Forward \& Back
49-56----, Pass Through on to the next
57-64 ----, - Circle Left

## Description

1-8 The facing couples join hands in a Circle of Four and Circle Left eight steps
9-16 Circle Right eight steps to end facing the same original direction around the big circle.
17-24 Same four Star Right
24-32 Same four Star Left to end facing the same original direction around the big circle.
33-40 Turn the facing dancer Right Hand Around
41-48 Turn the facing dancer Left Hand Around
49-56 Facing pairs walk Forward \& Back
57-64 Facing pairs Pass Thru with right shoulders and move on around the big circle to the next couple.

## VIRGINIA NOREEL

Formation: Proper. All the men on the prompter's right. All the women on his left. All facing partners.
Music: Any well phrased tune. "Virginia Reel" - MacGregor \#7345
Routine:
Counts
Intro -- --, Everybody Go Forward and Back
1-8 ----, Turn your partner Right Hand Around
9-16 ----, Turn your partner Left Hand Around
17-24----, Turn your partner both hands around
25-32----, Right shoulder Do Sa Do
33-40 ----, (Left shoulder Do Sa Do)
41-48 ----, Top couple (\#1 Couple/1st couple) Sashay (Slide) to the foot
49-56 ----, Sashay (Slide) back
57-64----, Lead your lines single file to the outside
65-72---, \#1 couple meet make one arch, the rest dive thru to the top of the set
NOTE: Timing is not crucial, but try to give the dancers the first beat of the phrase on which to start dancing.

VARIATIONS: Occasionally vary the order of the calls, change the number of couples that sashay down and back, work (in short sets) the diagonals, try different music.

Phase 2+1 - 2 Step - STAR 151B - Bob \& Jackie Scott. Suggest you slow down for comfort. Traveling box, lace sequence. Rock the boat with trombone action. Fun routine.

## Eskimo Tango

Phase 3+2 (Rt Lunge/Spanish Drag) - Tango Never Tango With an Eskimo, The Best of Alma Cogan CD Trk 9 by Alma Cogan - Milo \& Terry Molitoris. Corte, tango draw, side tap side flare, turning tango draw, criss cross, gaucho turn 4, Spanish drag. Ending is what else? Leg crawl.

# Comment 

## Jim Mayo

As I write this, the convention is over and Southern New Hampshire and the Merrimac Valley are looking for something dry after the worst flood in seventy years. I remember that flood in 1936. My dad took me to look at the Nashua River just brushing the underside of the Main Street bridge. It was about then that talk began about possibly building another bridge across the Merrimac somewhere between Tyngsboro and Manchester. It took nearly sixty years before that happened.

The obvious need for something does not always lead to its realization. It has been obvious to many people that there is a clear need for some easier way for people to get started in modern western square dancing. There have been some serious attempts to make that happen but such an easy entry is not yet widely available. In fact, I know of only a couple of places in New England where it is possible for a new dancer to feel comfortable at an open dance after a full year of weekly attendance.

We continue to recruit nearly a thousand new people into square dance classes each year. We keep them happy with a dance program that assures that they succeed in most tips. We do this by walking them through what we are about to call to them. We call that teaching. We then call what we walked them through pretty much as we walked it. If we made any non-trivial change they wouldn't succeed. Because we don't make much change most are likely to get to the Allemande Left more or less successfully.

Then graduation arrives. Many of these folks have been exposed to at least the sixtynine Mainstream calls and some will have been shown a few of the Plus calls as well. We give them a diploma or a pat on the back and send them off to an "open" dance where probably eighty percent of the dancers on the floor have been dancing at least five years. The dance is probably advertised as MS \& Plus which means that our graduates should expect to sit out at least a few of the tips.

But what about the ones they don't sit out, the ones listed as Mainstream. The caller isn't going to walk them through his routine. In fact, trying to keep all those experienced dancers happy he or she is likely to use those Mainstream calls in some "unusual" ways. For our new dancer "unusual" means some way they've never seen the call used. Even if they have seen this way of using the call, they're not used to just dancing. In class the teacher showed them what he was about to call. Now that party's over.

I have spoken recently with several new graduates attending one of their first dances after graduation. They usually report that this new caller (me) certainly sounds different from their teacher. They also report that I am using the calls in ways they've never seen before. I work very hard to be sure they succeed but it's not easy. Sometimes the dance gets a bit boring for the experienced dancers. It's a price I'm willing to pay.

In last month's column I mentioned a dance I had called recently for new graduates. I said that while I was trying to keep the dance comfortable for the new dancers I was running the risk of boring the experienced dancers. As I thought more about that I began to wonder if the boredom was "real" or was it just me worrying about it.

As I thought more I realized that I had the chance to find out more about the dance. With the help of the sponsors I got a questionnaire to most of the dancers who had attended. I received completed responses from $65 \%$ of them. The dance was a little unusual because, although it was advertised as a Mainstream dance, I used only the first fifty-three calls, those that make up the recently restored Basic Program. I did that so the new graduates would be using the calls that they were really familiar with, calls they had presumably been dancing for several weeks.

In the survey I asked whether the dancers found the dance Fun, Boring or OK But not great. Only three dancers found the dance boring and two of them usually danced the Advanced Program. A third of those attending found the dance to be OK But not great. Several of these said that they danced the Mainstream Program regularly. Clearly, a dance designed to allow new dancers to succeed is likely to be less than exciting for experienced dancers. On the other hand, nearly $60 \%$ of those attending found
the dance to be Fun and there were only five dancers present (of those responding) who had danced less than three years.

I also asked how frequently these people would be willing to attend a dance like this. Four said weekly and five said monthly. They all had danced less than three years. $70 \%$ said they would go to this kind of dance occasionally or never. That kind of response suggests one of the problems that our activity is facing. Dancers with experience are unlikely to enjoy dancing at a dance that is comfortable for dancers who have only one or two years of dancing experience.

This result is not a surprise. The strongest reason given for attending the dance was to support the association that sponsored it. The least important was to dance to this caller. My ego is slightly dented but, again, it is no surprise that experienced dancers don't think a new grads dance is the place to hear a caller at his or her best.

I have great praise for those experienced dancers who came to a new grads dance. If there is any hope for survival of the square dance club as we know it, we will have to make new dancers welcome. We cannot expect to increase participation if the folks who have already learned are unwilling to dance with those who have just started. One ray of hope can be seen, perhaps, in the observation of $87 \%$ that they enjoyed the dance.

## The Goldangest Square Dance Ever

I have a weak spot for history - especially square dance history. I have been lucky enough to meet many of the Sets in OrderAmerican Square Dance Society Hall of Fame callers. One of my favorite people of all time was the late Bob Osgood who published "Square Dancing" magazine. Most old timers remember it as Sets in Order. In some of his meanderings through the past of square dancing, Bob told of the largest single-venue square dance ever. A special guest at the dance was Lloyd "Pappy" Shaw, the school principal who revitalized square dancing in America. The word spread that "Pappy" was going to be in Southern Cal...read the story for yourself.

ON THE LATE afternoon of Thursday, July 13, Southern California citizens who have poo-poohed the popularity of square dancing began to sit up and take notice--something was definitely going on!

Busses by the dozen rolled out of San Diego, jammed with men and women dressed in western clothes; thirty chartered busses roared out of the San Bernardino area filled with a similar throng; trains from as far as Bakersfield and Fresno were loaded with dancers and every highway leading to the Pacific was crowded with carloads of laughing folks in fancy boots, loud shirts and blue jeans.

Ten thousand of these citizens were members of the seven Southern California square dance associations--the Associated Square Dancers, Cow Counties Hoedown Association, Tri-Counties Square Dance Association, San Diego County Square Dance Association, South Coast Association of Square Dance Clubs, Western Square Dance

Association of the San Gabriel Valley, and the Northern San Diego County Square Dance Association. Five thousand were not members of any organization-but were determined to join the fun as spectators. All had one goal in common--the jamboree at Santa Monica which was to climax that city's Diamond Jubilee celebration.

Santa Monica was ready for them-and then some. For weeks the city fathers, the police and fire departments and the public works department had been as busy as a hoe-down fiddler's fingers. Special stickers had been printed for the 37 callers and their families who had been invited; extra parking areas had been roped off, refreshment stands and bleachers erected and a four block area along Ocean Avenue and a two-block area down Wilshire Blvd. had been re-paved and treated to several tons of a combination of soapstone, corn meal and borax to make the dancing pleasant and easy.

Under the watchful eyes of John Danley, chairman for the City of Santa Monica, and Bob Osgood, master of ceremonies and cochairman, special spot lights had been erected on both sides of the giant T and carefully checked loud speakers bristled from dozens of lamp posts. At the point where the T joined there was a huge platform to accommodate the callers and their wives, the two orchestras and the visiting VIPs.

AT SIX-THIRTY the streets in the special area were empty. One hour later there were over 1,000 sets in order and every inch of standing room along the streets and in surrounding buildings and houses was taken
up by spectators. Every now and then a red cardboard square would bob up above a set as one of the 40 uniformed Boy Scouts on duty signalled that another couple was needed.

After greetings from city officials, John Danley and Bob Osgood, "Pappy" Shaw of Colorado Springs, who had flown out for the event, took over. On the spot to say something nice about each caller he introduced, "Рарру" solved the problem by a running gag. Beginning with Ray Shaw, his brother, he told the crowd that he had been talking to the caller's wife or girl friend and understood, from this source, that he was the best caller in the U. S.

In spite of the crowd there was no confusion as to patterns. This was due to the sound system which brought the calls clearly to each set, to the high caliber of the callers and to the careful planning on the part of Bob Osgood and John Danley, who selected only well-known or relatively simple patterns for the program--yet did not sacrifice quality and variety. No walk-through was given as has been the general practice in the past.

In the middle of the program dancing halted as Governor Earl Warren's car was escorted into the area by four police cars. Smiling, the Governor pushed his way to the callers' stand and made a tremendous hit with one of the shortest speeches on record.
"I don't want to spoil a good party by a lot of talk," he said, waving and grinning, "and I'm not going to try and call either. But I'm proud to be known as the governor of the best square dancing state in the Union."

SCREEN STAR Leo Carillo was then introduced and, taking his cue from Warren, said he had no intention of saying more than "thanks" for being invited to the party.

The callers then took over again and, with two orchestras--Jack Barbour and the California Clippers, and Grace and the Cow Counties Boys--rotating; and each section of three tips
broken by a folk or round dance, the jamboree rolled on.

A cool breeze began to roll in from the Pacific, keeping the dancers fresh and putting new vigor into their steps; the huge palms along Ocean Ave. and the Palisades ducked in and out of the glow from the giant spot and flood lights; music, calls and the laughter and shouts of the dancers blended with the gentle roar of the ocean in a setting that only Southern California could produce.

Sharply at 11:30 the program ended with the Black Hawk Waltz and, within a half-hour, the streets were empty as the 10,000 dancers went out for something to eat, caught busses for the long trip home or gathered in homes and private halls to continue dancing into the small hours of the morning.

The next day there was none of the usual litter of civic celebrations -- no broken pop bottles, bags and paper napkins. The square dancers had proved that, perhaps more than any other organized recreational group, they could gather without bringing down the town. All that remained to be done was to clean the streets to make them safe for traffic again.

No one who attended the Jamboree failed to be impressed by its color, friendly atmosphere and basic American feel. And everyone from Governor Warren to the newest dancer agreed that Santa Monica's Jumbo Jamboree was the biggest, most exciting, dancingest and gol-dangest square dance ever held --a credit to a beautiful city and a tribute to one of the finest recreational movements in the U. S. today.

## Conventions Review

I had the pleasure to travel to two National Conventions over the course of the summer. One was the National Convention in San Antonio in late June and the other the Canadian National in Montréal in mid July.

Both conventions were well run with little or no problems that I saw. The United States National attendance has slipped to 7,200 dancers. The facilities were large enough to hold a great deal more. Everything was in the San Antonio Convention Center. I did notice that during the day the halls were practically empty; this is due mainly to the fact that the convention runs many day trips and tours, and they are very popular. Unfortunately, it doesn't hold well for the callers who get these spots and then call to two or three (in some cases, one) square in a hall big enough to play a football game in.

I found it interesting that for the most part, you could have put all of the dancers in the halls together into one hall during the day, and that hall would not be full! I also found it interesting that despite what calling slots a caller received, if he/she knew of any friends that were calling in other halls, particularly in the evening, all they had to do was show up and call with them. That happened quite often. Duets, or three or four callers calling at the same time, sometimes just joining their friends for the singing call, was happening all the time. Most of the calling combos sounded very good, as most of these callers were from the same record label and were used to singing together. It was a treat for the dancers who enjoy such harmony from the stage.

The halls at night were crowded for the most part. It didn't take a rocket scientist to figure out which halls were going to be packed when you looked at the line up of "big guns" calling one
right after another. If you were unfortunate to get a spot opposite these halls, you could pretty well guess what kind of a crowd you would have. Another curious thing, some of the name callers only called at night, so they did not have to endure the minuscule crowds during the day. The challenge hall could hold about 4 squares if everyone crammed in, it was quite obvious at this particular convention, that challenge was not given much priority. It was OK, because there wasn't a crowd for it anyway. The real challenge dancers don't attend the national for the most part. The Advanced hall started out in a hall the size of a postage stamp. After one day, when the brain trust suddenly learned that there were more than 12 squares of advanced dancers out of the 7200 who attended, they moved the hall to one of the football size halls. I noticed that many really good callers were walking around the convention, given no advanced spots, and some callers, who really didn't belong in the hall, were there 3-4 times over the course of the convention. That made it quite obvious that programming did not have a good idea of who can call advanced and who couldn't.

Overall, the convention went well. There was a few blown turntables in one hall, I guess there were sound issues (aren't there at every national?" but it wasn't as bad as some might lead you to believe. One other thing, they had a hall called "high energy" or something to that affect. It was what we call "Fast Track." Sometimes it was fast, and other times it wasn't, depending on who the caller was. Next year the convention is in Charlotte, North Carolina, closer to New England. See you there!

The Canadian National, held in Montreal at the McDonald College, was very well run and

## Harvest Vegetable Cake

3 eggs, beaten until fluffy
1 cup oil
2 cups sugar
$3 / 4$ cup zucchini, shredded and tightly packed
$3 / 4$ cup summer squash, shredded
and tightly packed
$1 / 2$ cup carrots, shredded
and tightly packed
2 cups flour, sifted
1 tsp. salt
2 tsp. baking soda
$1 / 2$ tsp. baking powder
1 tsp. vanilla
$1 / 2$ tsp. cinnamon

Beat eggs and oil until well blended. Stir in squashes and carrots. Add remaining ingredients and blend well. Pour batter into a greased 9 inch by 13 inch pan. Bake in a 350 degree oven for 40 minutes or until done. When cake has cooled, top with cream cheese frosting.

## Cream Cheese Frosting

1 (3 oz.) package cream cheese, softened $1 / 2$ cup butter, softened
1 tsp. vanilla
2 cups confectioners sugar
Cream cheese and butter together, add vanilla and confectioners sugar. Beat well. Frost cake and store in the refrigerator.
more on the scale of what our New England Conventions were like about 10-12 years ago, attendance wise. They had 1,800 dancers there. The dancing was done in two major buildings, the MS and Plus hall were in one building, NOT air conditioned, so the heat for the weekend was unbearable. closes all of its halls at 4 PM until 7-8 PM. So, there was plenty of time for dinner etc. The programming for this convention was well done with the appropriate callers calling at the appropriate levels. The crowds were very large, day and night and despite having to battle with a few halls due to partitions, the sound was very good. The Canadians run a great convention; they hold their national every two years. In 2008 it will be held in London, Ontario, mid July timeframe.

If you haven't been to a national convention, try to make an effort to go. The city in which it is held usually has some fabulous sites and it is a great dancing experience!

# FROM THYP EDITORS 

Ed \& Pat Juaire

As this is written, we see boxes and boxes of unopened items. We've made the move to Georgia but it will be a while before we get everything sorted out and into a place. It is somewhat unnerving to not be able to reach back and grab that thing that's been in a particular spot for many years or go to a shelf and find just the right item you need to do something. And, with so many things still not opened, it's even harder to get going sometimes.

As a whole the move went smoothly. The movers arrived on Tuesday, September 12 to begin loading a 51 -foot van. They finished about 4:45 that afternoon. Even after weeks of preparation, there were still items we did not or could not pack until the last minute. Our son-in-law, Mike Mer-
chant and a good friend, Matthew Floor, were driving Pat's van the following Sunday to our new home. We took the rear seat out, giving it to the mover because there where things we could not ship with the mover.

Pat and I left Rhode Island about 4:30 the following Wednesday morning, driving straight through until 10:30 that night. With two dogs in our van, we did not want to have to put up in a motel. The movers arrived on Monday, unloading and distributing the items as indicated on the boxes.

So here we are, unfortunately late in getting this issue out but it is out. We expect to be on track and back to "normal" very soon.


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I take part in an internet discussion group among traditional square and contra dance callers. There are some in the group who are active in both forms and some, like me, who started square dancing even before modern square dancing became something different. I find it interesting to follow the changes that are taking place in traditional square and contra dancing.

As many of you who have read my columns over nearly three decades know, I think of square dancing as an inclusive recreation that is available in many different forms. For me modern and traditional are just different ways of enjoying our activity.. Some folks like their dancing pretty complicated and very organized while others prefer a free-form style of dancing that is repetitive and much less organized. Both are fun and both, at least for me , are square dancing.

I have been pleased recently to find that many of the contributors to the discussions agree with me. I have hoped for many years that we could build a bridge between modern and traditional square dancing that would help us to work together to encourage participation. This internet discussion seems to be a big step toward building that bridge. The discussions show a respect for opinions that are different and a real curiosity about how other people experience square dancing. Over the several years that I have been following these discussions there has been an increased understanding about how other forms of square dancing are experienced.

One of the discussion strings recently has been about the fact that traditional square (and contra) dancing is based on dance patterns that repeat throughout the dance. Modern square
dancing is based on dance patterns that change constantly throughout the dance. My personal experience makes me understand that both can be fun. As a teenager I danced traditional squares and contras three or more times a week for several years. I was never bored. As a modern caller I know that my customers would not hire me back if the dances I called didn't change from one evening to the next.

Also, from my personal experience, I know that the biggest difference in these experiences is the music and the way the dancers respond to the music. Traditional dancers expect to fit their dancing action to the music far more closely than do modern dancers. In contras it is common for the caller to call the routine only a couple of times and then the dancers continue repeating it without calls. The musical phrase tells them when to start each of the actions and keeps them all dancing together.

There are, or at least have been, times in modern dancing when we have come close to that experience. Most modern callers have known in years past that it was a mistake to change the figure on a few very well known and well-liked - singing calls. Summer Sounds was one of these. Itried it once. I thought I could make a small change and "fix" what I thought was a problem in the way the dance was written. I quickly learned that I could call it any way I wanted but the dancers were going to do it the way they had learned it and loved it. My way was smoother and more comfortable but the dancers had made their way comfortable for them. Traditional dancers do that all the time and they enjoy the fact that there are no surprises in their dancing.

Footwork: Opposite throughout.
Music: TELEMARK \#1842- A, "A New-Fangled Tango" KDFCDM
INTRO: WAIT 16 counts
1-8 WALK FOUR STEPS, SIDE, CLOSE, SIDE, CLOSE
Gent starts with the left, lady right, walk four steps forward, (L, R, L, R,) face partner, and do two steps to the gents $L$, ladies R, end with weight on the gents $R$, ladies $L$, face forward.

9-16 REPEAT 1-8, end facing partner.
17-24 BACK AWAY FOUR STEPS, COME BACK TO PARTNER FOUR STEPS
Gent backs to center, L, R, L, R; Ladies toward wall, R, L, R, L: Both walk toward partner four steps, join both hands.

Phase 2+2 - Waltz - Grenn 14186 flip Dancing On A Cloud. Waltz away, wrap, drift, twinkles, left turning box, step swing spin manu, hover, ending is twist and hold.

## ENGLAND TRIP

Last October I made my 11th calling trip to England. In previous articles I have discussed that English dancers, and really all of Northern Europe, can dance material much better than U.S. dancers, so we won't go into that again. What struck me on this trip was how well the dancers danced to the music.

While European dancers have always "danced," as compared to many U.S. dancers who "walk," it was particularly evident on this trip. A floor of 12 squares danced in rhythm to the beat, and did this for 3 days, all while dancing difficult material. They had perfect timing for all calls, so I did not have to "drop beats" in order for them to keep up. Seeing this from the stage was a visual experience I will long remember; it felt like riding a great stallion and being in perfect tune with every motion of the animal's body. If you've seen the movie "Seabiscuit," the last 20 seconds of the movie that show horse and rider moving to the finish line in slow motion is a good example of the feeling.

The experience reminded me that this is the way people should look while dancing, at any program. By the way, the programs were $\mathrm{C}-1 \& \mathrm{C}-2$, and the age mixture was about the same as in the U.S. (I mention this for those who say that Challenge dancers are awkward and not smooth, and that age causes people to walk instead of dance.)

One other item I found interesting. At weekends in the U.S., whether they be Mainstream, Plus, Advanced or Challenge, the standard procedure is for callers to
workshop material. This is usually done heavily on Saturday morning and afternoon, as well as on Sunday if there is dancing then. Not in England. They told me "don't workshop - just call." They want to "dance" on their weekends, not walk and practice material. Their feeling is that there is plenty of time to walk material and practice in the weeks and months before a weekend, and that a weekend represents the opportunity to dance what they have learned, not to walk more material.

English mindset. I happened to have a discussion with an English caller about the difference in mindset of U.S. and English dancers. In the U.S. if a caller at Mainstream, Plus, Advanced and sometimes Challenge does a piece of creative choreography and most the floor has difficulty with it and breaks down, the dancers will consider the material a gimmick and look down on the caller for having presented it. If the caller asks: "Do you want to try that again?," the answer from the floor is usually a loud "NO!"

In England the reaction is "YES!" I asked the caller why. He said the dancers want to learn from the material, because this will improve their dancing. So they always want to try it again.

Grand Square. According to a dancer in England who is knowledgeable in the history of folk dancing, Grand Square first appeared in print in 1651, and it had been existence some time before that. The name of the dance was not Grand Square, but the footprint action was exactly the same.

Dinty Moore Stew

The other day as I was browsing through a collection of dances, just sort of looking for something new and different to use at a contra dance, I came across a dance called "Dinty Moore Stew." I don't know if all of you are familiar with that delightful canned concoction of beef, carrots, new potatoes, and thick gravy, but for me it brings back fond memories of trips into the New England woods in the crisp fall air when hot and filling were the two main requirements for dinner. Dinty Moore Beef Stew was the perfect thing. Heat and serve and you have a hearty, healthy meal.

So, why would someone name a dance "Dinty Moore Stew?" Well, I think the Dinty Moore part of the title was to evoke the exact feeling I had when I saw the title. It is the stew part of the title that is important. The idea is to take familiar ingredients and mix them together any-old-way you please, and it still comes out great.

Here are the bare bones of the dance.
Intro: ----,-- Corner dosado
1-8: ----, -- Same one swing
9-16: ----, - Across, right and left thru
17-24: ----, -- Right and left back
25-32: - - - , - - Circle left
33-40: ----,-- Circle right
41-48: -- --, -- Ladies chain
59-56: ----,-- Chain back
57-64: -- --, - New corner dosado.
That's the whole dance. Nothing new. Nothing special. It is what we call a "glossary dance," that is, one that just uses standard calls from the glossary of calls that are arranged only
because the call can be done from that position.
Here is the fine print. Substitute "Star left" and "Star right" for "Circle left and right." In other words, the first time or two through the dance, call it as it is printed. Then on the $3^{\text {rd }}$ time through, make the substitution. The timing is the same and it flows. Also, if at the end of the star right the men flair out of the star, the ladies flow beautifully into the ladies chain. You can take the same elements of the dance and place them almost anywhere you wish. Do keep the opening the same both for the comfort of the dancers and to keep your place in the dance.

So we have created one kind of stew. But we can cook up some others, too. Instead of substituting just elements of the dance, substitute the whole dance. Some contra dance purists will frown on this, but dancers (on occasion) like the variety. Keep the same opening - I like to use "Corner dosado, corner swing" as the opening kernel. Then substitute other dances that have the same opening, the heart of the dance is another sequence of figures entirely - but be careful: make sure the changes are not too radical and make sure that the dancers can do the calls without a prior walk-thru. When I do a "hash" contra, I tend to use a good square dance tune, partly for the familiarity of the tune and the length. Square dance tunes play the melody only seven times so I only have to come up with six dances. Why only six? I bookend the whole sequence with the same dance. (This gimmick lends itself beautifully to a medley of tunes such as "Patriotic Medley" on Blue Staror, "Sinatra Medley" or "Hazel Eyes" medley on Chaparral.)

Here is a sequence of dances I like to mix:

This is not a gimmick to pull on new contra dancers because new dancers are unsure of timing and position. But this is lots of fun with experienced dancers who recognize what is happening. As with any gimmick, use it rarely, but have fun with it.

## Chinese Noodle and Chicken Salad

Leftover roasted chicken makes this popular salad easy to prepare. It's made spicy by combining chilies with linguine, green onions, snow peas, cilantro and a peanut dressing. This recipe makes a large amount and will easily serve 20 . Great for your club pot luck.

## Salad

2 pounds linguine
$1 / 4$ cup oriental sesame oil
$2\left(2^{1 ⁄ 2}\right)$ pound roasted chickens, skinned, boned, shredded
4 bunches green onions, sliced
2 bunches fresh cilantro, chopped
4 jalapeño chilies, seeded, deveined and minced
$1 \frac{1}{4}$ pounds snow peas, remove strings and slice lengthwise

## Dressing

## 1 cup soy sauce

$1 / 2$ cup creamy peanut butter (do not use old-fashioned style or freshly ground)
$1 / 2$ cup rice vinegar
$1 / 2$ cup oriental sesame oil
2 tablespoons sugar
Napa cabbage leaves
For salad: Cook linguine in large pot of boiling salted water until just tender but still firm to bite. Drain. Rinse with cold water to cool; drain well. Transfer to large bowl. Add sesame oil; toss to blend. Mix in chicken, onions, cilantro and chilies.

Cook snow peas in medium saucepan of boiling salted water until just crisp-tender, about 1 minute. Drain. Rinse with cold water to cool; drain well. Mix into salad.

For dressing: Combine soy sauce, peanut butter, vinegar, sesame oil and sugar in processor; blend until smooth.

Pour dressing over salad and mix with hands to blend well. (Can be prepared 1 day ahead. Cover and refrigerate.) Line large platter with Napa cabbage leaves. Mound salad over and serve.

NSDCA Pull Tabs Tops Goal Again
Members of the National Square Dance Campers Association have been collecting soda can or pop tabs for many years. Chapters are free to choose whatever project they wish to support through the recycling of those tabs. At the International Camporee last July, the president of Chapter \#118, Ozark Camper Dancers in Missouri, informed all that their chapter had donated 26 pounds of pull tabs to the local Ronald McDonald House in Springfield, Missouri. Two Wisconsin chapters, \#010 Pioneers, turned in their 54 pounds to their local Ronald McDonald House as did Chapter \#002, Pine Tree, whose members donated 19 pounds to their local Ronald McDonald House.

This year the International Camporee Committee in Crescent City, Illinois designated one table in their display area for the collection of pull tabs. Soon the table was overflowing with all sorts of bags, boxes and plastic containers from the campers! By the time the 2006 International Camporee Chairman Bob \& Sally Wilcox and committee finished weighing all the tabs, the total was 259 pounds! The benefactor from this collection
was the local Ronald McDonald House. Question? If we counted 1,536 small tabs in a pound, how many tabs were turned in at the recycle center?

If you know how many tabs have to be turned in to receive $\$ 119.50$, then you'll know how many pounds were turned in by the four Nebraska chapters, \#073 Camp ' N ' Dancers, \#148 Rolling Stones, \#170 Star City Squares and \#185 Central RV Dancers, at their Nebraska State Camporee. The money received was sent to the Girls and Boys Town of Omaha, Nebraska.

Have you or your club started saving tabs yet? If not, why not? It's an easy, worthwhile project any club or person can adopt. Any festival or convention should also be able to generate a goodly number of tabs. Make some signs to ask attendees to save the tabs, then put out containers for collecting and see how many pounds you can get before the end of the summer of 2007. If you have no place to recycle them, contact the NSDCA website for assistance. www.NSDCA.org Our goal for our camper/dancers is at least 207 pounds by mid July 2007. Maybe you can top the NSDCA members! Keep us posted.

## The Search for Students

So, how are your beginner lessons going so far this year? Good I hope. I have heard some good stories so far. My two classes have been doing pretty well as I write. We have all read and discussed for years where we are going to find new dancers for our activity. Discussion has ranged from kids, to teenagers, to the colleges and then right up through the "empty nesters" and baby boomers.

I would bet it is safe to say some clubs in New England have witnessed an influx of these types of dancers. Unfortunately, I don't believe we are getting enough of them to off set the number of dancers who quit or have passed away. Clubs continue to fold. But, new blood is emerging in some of these clubs and it is refreshing to see.

One area of the dancing population that remains a potentially good source of recruits is the Contra Dancers. Contra Dancing in New England is thriving with crowds of up to 300 at a single dance. All over New England, contra dances are held including weekends and special events. Each April, their equivalent to our New England Convention is held and I would bet money they get many more dancers than we do.

Let us keep in mind that although similar in some form to Modern Western Square Dancing, Contra dancing has a life of its own, a very healthy life. Having attended some contra dances the past year and a half in Greenfield, I not only thoroughly enjoyed myself, but I also
started to think that perhaps there might be some dancers who would want to try Modern Western.

I started a class in January of this year and the first night I had four squares, I would say about $2-1 / 2$ of them were new people and all but four were contra dancers. My class eventually settled down and I ended up graduating ten students, about half were contra dancers. They have continued to support both avenues of dancing and say they enjoy the mental challenge of the Modern Western but still love the fast pace of the contras.

Having spoken to many contra dancers, it appears that while some may like to dance both, many still wish to remain with the contras. They don't like the commitment of an every week class. (Sound familiar?) They prefer to show up when they want and learn the steps to the next dance.

This past August, our club held a contra dance and we had a pretty good crowd. I did a demo of MWSD in the middle of the evening with some of my recent contra dancer/new graduates dancing. I felt the exposure was good and not only was the contra dance successful, but I did pick up one couple who are staunch contra dancers.

Should any caller get contra dancers into their classes, please note that they pick up the steps very easily, they have good timing and rhythm and they generally appreciate the music and the dance atmosphere. Who knows, this could be a rich resource for MWSD.

Bill Litchman of Albuquerque, NM wrote this "quick-teach" mixer several years ago and it is still an ideal starter for an "ice-breaker." He named it the - -

WIMMEL MIXER
Formation: Double circle, open position in couples, facing LOD. Lady on gents right.
Footwork: Opposite throughout, begin on mans left.
Music: GKW Mixer, SIO X31088 or any sprightly marching type music of similar tempo
with a 32-beat phrase.
Routine:
COUNT:
1-8 Eight walking steps in LOD (end facing partner with both hands joined.)
9-12 Two balance steps (step, touch to man's left; then right)
13-16 Two hand turn in four steps (one complete turn)
17-20 Back away from partner, four steps (man to COH , woman toward wall)
21-24 Walk four steps diagonally right to next partner
25-28 Balance left and right (as on counts 9-12)
$29-32$ Two hand turn in four steps (as on counts 13-16)
TAG: There is a short tag during which one can turn the partner and bow.
Carol Howard of Mt Pleasant, Michigan, shared this dance with me and I have about worn it out over the years. It is a great dance as it requires no partners and can be used with groups of people that are any age. It is a true "foot stomper."

It is a Rumanian folk dance, a simple and delightful one night stand number, Some dancers call this the "count-down" dance, because in each succeeding part the step-count lessens: step five and stamp two, step three and stamp one, step one and stamp one. It is called --

## ALUNELU

Formation: Circle dance without partners; arms on neighbors' shoulders.
Music: Worldtone WI 10005
Part 1
1-2 Traveling CCW, step Rt, cross L behind Rt, step Rt, cross L behind Rt, step R, and stamp Lt twice and Pause.
3-4 Do same action moving CW, starting with L , and stamping with Rt at end.
5-8 Repeat action of 1-4
Part 2
1-2 Traveling CCW, step Rt, cross Lt behind, step Rt, stamp Lt once.
Do this moving clockwise, starting Lt, stamping with Rt.
3-4 Repeat action of 1-2.
Part 3
1-2 Step Rt, stamp Lt, stamp Rt, stamp Lt twice.
Step Lt, Step Rt, stamp Lt, Step Lt, stamp Rt twice.
3-4 Repeat action of 1-2
That's it for November.

Sometime in the last decade a new trend came into the New England modern square dance world. Clubs that had been running only Plus dances - except for a few in the early season - started to change the program to alternating tips. They recognized that graduates from last year's class were not able to dance with the club if the program was all Plus.

At first I thought this wasn't a very good idea. We know that new dancers still can't dance the Plus calls. Some of them, however, seem to be willing to pay full price even though they only dance half the tips. In fact most clubs and callers with an alternating tip program see to it that the first and last tips are Mainstream so the new dancers often get a bit more than half the program.

Lately I have seen a new trend that I hope will grow. Clubs and organizations are being willing to offer a full Mainstream program. The recent NECCA Clinic dance was not only Mainstream but was all singing calls, too. We certainly appreciate the dancers who helped us make that a fun dance. The program was set at Mainstream because most NECCA members believe that modern square dancing should be available to all the dancers we teach. The only way to be sure of this is to run dances using the calls we teach in class.

For years - even for decades - I have had dancers tell me that Mainstream dancing is boring. They usually add very quickly that it's only boring when other callers are calling. My

Mainstream dance is interesting, they say. My feeling is that this is hogwash. There are a lot of callers in New England whose Mainstream dances are interesting. I am very suspicious that there's a bunch of snobbishness working here. Dancers who've learned the Plus calls don't want to admit that they have fun dancing Mainstream.

I've said many times in this column that I believe that Mainstream is, in fact, more challenging and more interesting than Plus. Nearly all New England Plus dancers (and most everywhere else) can dance the Plus calls in only one setup. Even the slightest variation will cause massive breakdown. (Consider Follow Your Neighbor with girls doing the arm turn, for instance.)

There are two ways to provide choreographic variety in a square dance program. One is by using all the calls on the advertised program. The other is to use the calls from different setups - what we have called in the past All Position Dancing (APD). A caller who wants the floor to keep dancing is going to provide most of the variety at a Plus dance with variations in the way they use the Mainstream calls. Any variation in the use of the Plus calls will cause major breakdown on the floor.

I am pleased to see what I think is an increase in clubs being wise enough to recognize that more people can dance at a Mainstream dance. I hope the "Plus only" dancers will give them their support. A lot of callers can make Mainstream dancing fun.

# USING CONTRAS AND ROUNDS <br> IN THE TEACHING PROGRAM

Callers who teach classes are faced with a formidable task in trying to cover everything that needs to be covered in the time available. There are planting seasons harvest season, vacation times and all kinds of reasons which make it difficult to hold class members long enough to do a really thorough job of preparing them for the real world of square dancing. In addition, there is pressure from the club, which is eager to get the new dancers to swell the membership (and the coffers). Under these kinds of frustrating pressures, there is a tendency to dismiss contras and rounds as unnecessary frills in our classes, yet they can be valuable additional tools to help accomplish our teaching goals.

Not only will contras and rounds add variety to your class program, but they can furnish excellent vehicles for practice in position use of the basics, rhythm, phrasing, timing and styling.

We know that variety, should be an essential part of our calling program, but sometimes our classes may tend to become repetitive drudgery. Why not give classes variety also? Contras and rounds can do this. They provide a different kind of music, much of it excellent and conducive to good dancing. They also provide the opportunity to move rhythmically to the music, i.e. dance-an opportunity sometimes lacking in some of our drill-oriented square dancing.

One of our major objectives in teaching is to get people to move people in rhythm to the music. We know that some people have a natural
feel for the beat of the music, while to others, the music is just background noise without definite characteristics. In either case, we can improve reaction to the music by practice. Contra and round dance music usually has very clear and definite phrasing and a good beat which most dancers can feel. In addition, contra and round dance routines are so constructed that it becomes fairly clear when one is off the beat. Practice with contras and rounds will help dancers to hear, feel and move to the beat of the music. It will make them better dancers.

What we have said about rhythm also applies to phrasing and timing. The musical and choreographic divisions often are much clearer in contras and rounds than in square dance music. Practice with these additional tools will help to instill in the dancer a sense of good musical phrasing and timing.

Styling should be an integral part of our dance instruction and contras and rounds are excellent tools for teaching styling. Even experienced dancers will accept and practice proper styling in contras and rounds when they may feel their individuality challenged if reminded to do so in squares. The teacher can insist upon proper styling and there is adequate time for clear understanding and, proper execution.

We have talked about contras and rounds as tools for teaching dancers. However, we must not overlook the fact that they are also excellent tools for improving calling techniques. The complete caller will find it beneficial to have a working knowledge of these different facets of the total square dance picture.

It is not necessary, to instruct one on the number of teeth in a saw, the kind of metal it is made of' or the kind of wood in the handle in order for the tool to be used successfully. Neither is it necessary to confuse and burden

your dancers with long dissertations and many technical terms in order to use contras and rounds as effective teaching tools. First of all pick sane relatively simple, easily understood contras which have "make you want to dance" music and use familiar dance terms and movements-mixers which are fun and provide good practice. For example, do not try to get inexperienced dancers to "form on" in contra lines, cross over 1,3,5, explain that they are going to do an alternate duple. You will simply bore and confuse most of them. Use a technique such as having them square up with the squares in line. Dance them into a IP2P (zero) line, chain the ladies, box the gnat, drop hands and step back into lines. Point out that corners are in
the same relative position as in squares, briefly mention progression and get them dancing as soon as possible. There are many good round dance mixers available, and you should be able to find several that fit your taste and your program. You may not want to progress beyond these mixers in using rounds in your program, but do use some of them. When you do use them, I suggest you show them, have dancers walk through them and then dance. As with contras, don't over-instruct.

Instead of looking upon contras and rounds as unnecessary frills or additional burdens in your teaching program, look upon them as additional tools which can help you do a better job of teaching Try 'em! You'll like 'em!

## Beef Stew

2 Tbsp. olive oil
2 pounds stew beef
1 large onion, sliced
$3 / 4$ Cup dry white wine
1 can ( 16 oz. ) tomatoes, drained
1 can (133/4 oz.) beef broth
2 Tbsp. tomato paste
2 cloves garlic
1 tsp. thyme
carrots and potatoes, peeled
Heat oil in a 5 or 6 quart pan. Brown the meat and add onions to the pan and cook 5 minutes or until transparent. Add wine, tomatoes, beef broth, tomato paste, garlic and thyme; stirring to break up the tomatoes and dissolve the tomato paste. Bring to a boil, reduce heat, cover and simmer $11 / 2$ hours. Add cut up carrots and potatoes, cover and continue simmering 45 minutes or until the meat and vegetables are tender.

## Cream Cheese Biscuits

6 oz. cream cheese
8 oz. butter
2 Cups flour
Soften cream cheese and butter to room temperature; cream together. Blend in flour. Shape into long rolls with a 3-inch diameter and wrap in waxed paper. Chill several hours or overnight. When ready to bake, slice into $3 / 4$ inch sections and place on ungreased cookie sheets. Bake at 400 degrees for 20 minutes or until lightly browned. Watch carefully so that

## Comment

## Jim Mayo

I spend a lot of the space in these columns complaining. I'm not optimistic that we will be willing to modify our recreation so that it can serve future generations as well as it has served us. I see a decline in dancing skills and little enthusiasm for improvement. I know that we could adapt square dancing to serve any set of customers well but our present leaders have little-to-no interest in making any change. But this month I would like to do an about face and tell you about a great night of calling I had recently.

I knew this group was different but the situation was one I hadn't encountered recently. Over the past decade most of the dances I've called for them have been nights when a new class had just graduated or they had a few squares from other clubs there to retrieve a banner. In those circumstances the visitors or new dancers determined what kind of dance I called. This night was different. There was only one visitor and he was from San Diego.

I started, out of habit, calling the Plus program dance with few variations of the Plus calls. A couple of the club members then mentioned to me that the group could handle a much greater variety. I took the hint and tried some left-handed things. They had no trouble so I extended to some unusual set-ups. I did a Load the Boat with the couples half-sashayed. I did a Follow Your Neighbor with one boy and one girl doing the center turn. Again, no trouble. These folks really know the calls.

In the (distant) past I might have started to worry that I couldn't call "tough" enough to satisfy them. Perhaps I didn't but I don't worry much about that now. I did work hard that night, however. It's been a long time since I have had the chance to call that kind of material and making it fit my personal standards for flow and timing was a real challenge.

I worked hard but enjoyed every minute of it. The name of the group won't surprise many of you. It was Tech Squares. Some may think this group is different because it is all Tech students. They would be wrong. Certainly the fact that they dance on the campus of M. I .T. does give them a different attitude but the group includes a broad mix of people. There are students, of course, but there are many who are well beyond student age too.

The most distinctive thing about the group, beyond their dancing skill, is their attitude. They come to dance. I don't know how many come as couples but they mix enthusiastically. And they dance. Few sit out. If there is a potential four squares in the hall, there will surely be at least three dancing every tip and often there will be four. The caller doesn't have to beg people to get up and dance. They're squared up almost as soon as the record is on the turntable.

Yes, I'm old fashioned and still use those 45 RPM vinyl things. Their club caller, Ted Lizotte, has all his music on his laptop computer. Would you expect anything else?

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## THOUGHTS AT THE END OF THE YEAR

Here is a year-end clean out of my file of material for this column, all of which is too short for a full article.

Happy 20th anniversary to Sting Records. When I called in Sweden in 1985-87, a young caller named Stephen Sidholm told me he was starting a new record company named Sting, and that he was committed to hiring top musicians to provide the best possible music. He did this, and the result was a new standard in quality square dance music that persisted year after year. He sold Sting about 3 years ago to caller Paul Bristow in England, who continues to maintain the high quality of music established long ago by Stephen.

Happy 40th anniversary to Footlighters. This was my first square dance club, which I started after 17 months of calling. Since the only square dancers I knew were Challenge dancers, I had to establish a club at that level in order to attract people. When Callerlab established various levels of Challenge, Footlighters became a C-2 club, which it remains today. If any readers know of a Challenge club older than 40 years, I would enjoy hearing from them.

The following reflect the difference in dancing between the U.S. and Europe. Quote from a German dancer to a U.S. caller: A wellknown caller told me that a German dancer said to him: "I'm impressed. You adjusted real well. Most callers come over here and call "American Advanced." You called "real Advanced.""

Quote from the same U.S. caller to dancers at
a festival in Sweden: " This is the first time in my career that I've been able to call Mainstream and Plus the way it was meant to be danced."

Alaska. In my August article I described the trip to Alaska my wife and I took last year, wherein we flew to Anchorage, rented a car, and drove over 4000 miles in 4 weeks throughout Alaska and the Yukon Territory. I offered to advise people making a trip to Alaska how to extend their stay by 3-5 days and thereby see numerous sites about which the cruise lines never tell their customers, because the cruise lines can make no profit from these sites.

Some people contacted me, but they had already made their air reservations, so they were locked in and could not take advantage of the additional sightseeing opportunities.

If you are going to Alaska, whether via cruise only, or on a cruise/land package, contact me BEFORE you make your air reservations, so that I can give you all the options to consider. It is much cheaper to arrive a few days early or depart a few days later than to make a second trip to Alaska to see everything you missed the first time. Of course, since most people will not make a second trip to Alaska, all of these additional sightseeing opportunities will be lost forever.

## Tradition

"You may ask, how do we keep our balance? That I can answer in one word: Tradition!"

It seemed at the beginning of Fiddler on the Roof that the answer for a balanced life was so simple. Tradition. We have our traditions for this, and that, and... But Tevye soon found that the traditions were changing at an accelerated pace. In fact, the changes came so fast and in such a vast horde, that Tevye lost many of his traditions, and when he could not rely on his traditions, he lost his home.

We are going through a change in traditions, and many of us are doing all we can to retain or rediscover our traditions. For some people, tradition is doing things exactly as our parents and their parents did things. For other people, tradition is the spirit in which our forebears had, and we carry out what we perceive to be the important parts of a tradition.

Recently I received an e-mail (the new traditional way to communicate?) from a caller friend who asked, "What is a traditional caller?" Being brave, and forward thinking, and immensely talented, I resolved to answer the question. My first step: write to friends to get their definitions and then do research on the topic.

I was surprised to find that 40 years ago this was an important question in square and contra dancing. We must remember, that 40-50 years ago square dancing was going through a tremendous change. Previously, square dancing and been mostly visiting couple dances, but the idea of keeping all dancers moving all the time was becoming prevalent. Callers used written or memorized modules (combinations of figures to
move dancers from one known position to another known position). But hash-calling (including sight calling) was coming into vogue.

Could the new styles of calling and presenting figures be considered traditional. For many, the answer was no. Those callers wanted a break from the visiting couple/barn dance image. I think the image they wanted to avoid was that of the men slipping outside between tips to get a nip of something and/or fist fights. Advertising pushed a new image saying it was not the same old song and dance. They even changed the name from "square dancing" to "Modern Western Square Dancing."

However, many of those same callers built on the traditions espoused by Dr. Lloyd 'Pappy' Shaw of Colorado Springs at his caller schools and in his book Cowboy Dances. The new style threw away the visiting couple dances, but callers studied those dances to understand the elements. The tradition of square dancing was based on the emphasis on styling, music, good manners, and the elemental calls. Those calls became standardized by Bob Osgood in his magazine American Square Dance/Sets in Order. The list of calls became known as the Sets in Order Basic 50, and almost all of them are labeled 'traditional,' meaning the call has been in use for so long that no one knows when or where it was first used.

Some of the calls could be traced to English country dance, but for others, the derivation is lost in the mix of dances from throughout Europe and how the dances changed in the new culture of America. A couple of short examples: we know that DoSaDo comes from the French for 'back-to-back.' On the other

hand, sometimes there is a call pronounced 'DoCiDo' (a cartoon in American Square Dance once showed people square dancing with a deer peeking over the hill - the caption was Docey Doe, and that spelling stuck for a while). In our time, it doesn't matter if the caller says DoSaDo or Docey Doe, dancers are going to go back-to-back. Oops, that is not quite true. Many dancers will do a waist swing, or a highland fling (hollering "Hoot, mon!" the whole time). Where did that come from? My research says that at the National Square Dance Convention in 1976 a popular demonstration group did the waist swing when the caller said DoSaDo. People who saw the demonstration really liked it and took it out on the dance floor. Is it in tradition? But DoSiDo has other traditions attached to it. One of those traditions is from the Spanish, where the call means 'two and two.' That call also used dancers going back to back (two couples facing; all turn partner left, the men go back to back to turn the opposite by the right, then return to the partner to turn left). That call, which used to known as a Texas DoSiDo was renamed DoPaso. Another tradition gets mixed in.

Dorothy Stott Shaw, the wife of Lloyd Shaw spoke about tradition. She believed that tradition was a spirit and manner of doing things. But if a tradition did not change with the
people and times, it died. It simply became historical. Traditions must evolve or die. Square dancing changed to fit the needs of the people, the setting in which they danced, and the music available.

I think that as long as we can find the traces back to the original dances and see how and why the dances changed, we are still following the tradition. In contra dancing we can see many varieties of dancing. Perhaps the most popular now is the style danced in urban and suburban settings; always to live music and always with an emphasis on the swing. This type have dancing has become so pervasive that a couple of names have been invented for it (not all of them polite or complimentary), the most common name being Modern Urban Contra (MUC).

There is also the style of contra dancing that is associated with square dancers. Live music is optional, but most of the time recordings are used. Dances focus more on figures and choreography than does MUC. There are also re-enactment groups that seriously research the steps, styling, and dress of a particular era.

All of these are traditional, even though they meet the needs of modern people. In all cases, the dances bring groups of people together in fellowship and to enjoy dancing. Selected by

## Taffy Apples

8 small or 6 large apples
2 Cups sugar
$1 / 2$ Cup water
$1 / 8$ tsp. cream of tarter
$1 / 2$ cup butter, cut into small pieces
1 tsp. white vinegar
$1 / 2$ Cup heavy cream
Push a lollypop stick into the stem end of each apple. Liberally grease a cookie sheet with butter. In a large, heavy saucepan, combine the sugar and the water. Cook over low heat stirring constantly, until the sugar is dissolved. Stir in the cream of tarter, butter, vinegar and cream. Cook, stirring constantly until the mixture reaches the soft crack stage (290 degrees). Remove the pan from the heat. Dip each apple into the syrup, then carefully place it on the prepared cookie sheet. When the taffy has cooled completely, wrap each apple in plastic wrap.


## Caramels

1 Cup heavy cream
$1 / 2$ Cup milk
$1 ⁄ 2$ Cup sugar
$1 / 2$ Cup light brown sugar, packed
$3 / 4$ Cup light corn syrup
Dash of salt
1 tsp. vanilla
2 Tbsp. butter
Combine heavy cream and milk in a measuring cup and mix until blended. In a large heavy saucepan, mix $3 / 4$ cup cream mixture, sugars, corn syrup and salt. Bring to a boil over medium heat, stirring to dissolve the sugars. Place a candy thermometer in the pan and continue to cook, stirring occasionally until temperature reaches the soft ball stage (234 degrees). Very slowly, stir in the remaining $3 / 4$ cup cream mixture so that the syrup mixture continues to boil. Continue cooking and stirring until the mixture reaches the firm ball stage (244 degrees). Remove from the heat and stir in vanilla and butter. Pour into a greased 9 -inch by 5 -inch pan. Cool completely at room temperature. Remove from pan and cut into 1-inch squares. Wrap in plastic or store in an airtight container. Makes $11 / 4$ pounds.
*If desired you can add 1 cup of your favorite chopped nuts or the caramels can be dipped in melted semi-sweet chocolate and placed on a rack until the chocolate hardens.

## TRI CLUB - METROWEST BOSTON

Cooperation is as American as apple pie and motherhood; however, square dance clubs have not always been known for working together.

An exception to this rule may now be occurring. A few years ago, representatives of the Great Plain Squares of Needham, the Square Riggers of Natick /Wellesley, and the Fairs 'N Squares of Framingham met to discus whether the three clubs working together could do things more advantageously than each of the clubs doing things separately.

Nothing concrete came out of this meeting but all agreed that we should get together at some future time. That time came a couple of years ago. Several meetings have taken place since during which it has been agreed that it is ridiculous for the three clubs to be holding dances in competition with each other. The Great Plain Squares and the Fairs 'N Squares both regularly dance on Saturday nights, sometimes on the same Saturday night. The Square Riggers dance on Friday nights - not exactly conducive to raiding each other.

The solution was obvious, although because of prior commitments, it was not feasible to change schedules overnight.

Now, however, this has been done.
The second phase of the discussions centered on the possibility of hosting joint dances. Although the Square Riggers traditionally hold their first dance in September, neither the Great Plain Squares nor the Fairs ' N Squares do. Hence, it was a no brainer to say that this is the perfect time to do it. The first joint dance was held at the Square Riggers' venue on September $29^{\text {th. }}$

The host club rented the hall, and booked the caller and cuer. Each club brought refreshments and a door prize, greeted dancers at the door, and participated in making
announcements. The revenue, including the gate, the split-the-pot and the refreshment monies was divided equally among the three clubs after deducting the amounts paid for the hall, caller, cuer and advertising.

Twelve and one half squares were in attendance and, perhaps surprisingly, most stayed until the end of the dance. Many remarked how much this dance reminded them of "the 'olden' days."

In October a second joint dance, this time involving only the Great Plain Squares and the Square Riggers was held.

This is not "rocket science," but it shows how cooperation can take place among neighboring clubs when they set their minds to do so.

If you attended the EDSARDA meeting in Holyoke, Massachusetts on October $1^{\text {st }}$, you heard Terry \& Joann Tuytschaevers made a presentation on this subject that was very well received.

This past year there were also State Camporees in Florida, Iowa, Illinois, Michigan, Nebraska, Pennsylvania and Wisconsin and a tri-state of Colorado, Wyoming and Nebraska campers...all of which are usually open to any NSDCA member.

Yes, the National Square Dance Campers Association is organized and does have its own dues. But these dues include your liability insurance and the official quarterly publication, NSDCA TIME, which contains Chapter news, craft ideas, a central listing of all chapter campouts and Camporees in the U. S. and Canada and other articles of interest to camper/
dancers. New members are expected to purchase the official NSDCA badge with its logo of crossed logs and flame.

The NSDCA also conducts an annual International Camporee in mid July at a different site each year in either the U. S. or Canada. In 2007 it will be in Middle Amana, Iowa July 17-19. Many campers come in Sunday or Monday giving them more time for fun and fellowship before everything starts on Tuesday. All International Camporees are programmed with the family in mind. Besides dancing there are scheduled informational seminars, sports, games, crafts, a youth program, tours, vendors, a daily newspaper "The Snooper," after parties as well as chapter and representative meetings, a Parade of States and the Annual Meeting.
